

## Legislative Updates

Updated April 20, 2021

### Alabama

*April 13, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On April 7, 2021, Gov. Kay Ivey, announced the 26<sup>th</sup> supplemental emergency proclamation called the [Safer Apart Order](#). Facial masks are no longer required, but are encouraged when in public and close contact with others.

### Alabama

*April 13, 2021 – City of Birmingham*

On April 6, 2021, the City Council extended the City's mask ordinance through May 24, 2021.

### Alabama

*April 13, 2021 – City of Montgomery*

On April 6, 2021, the City Council approved an ordinance mandating facial masks be worn through May 9, 2021.

### Alabama

*April 13, 2021 – City of Tuscaloosa*

On April 7, 2021 Mayor Walt Maddox announced that the City will follow State guidance and not institute a mask mandate.

### Alabama

*April 6, 2021 – Madison County*

On April 1, 2021, the County Board of Health announced that the County would end its mask requirement, in conjunction with the State requirement, on April 9, 2021.

### Alabama

*March 9, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 3, 2021, Gov. Kay Ivey [extended](#) the "Safer at Home" order and mask mandate until April 9, 2021.

## Alabama

### *January 26, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On January 21, 2021, Gov. Kay Ivey extended the State's safer-at-home order and mask requirement through March 5, 2021.

## Alabama

### *January 5, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective January 1, 2021, businesses may file formation, amendment and dissolution documents electronically with the State, rather than with their county probate offices (Act 2020-73).

## Alabama

### *December 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 9, 2020, Gov. Kay Ivey announced that the State's "Safer at Home" order was extended until January 22, 2020.

## Alabama

### *November 24, 2020 – Grants*

On November 18, 2020, Gov. Kay Ivey introduced the "Revive Plan," a \$200 million program for organizations with less than 50 employees. Grants are available for up to \$20,000 for expenses that have incurred due to operational interruptions caused by the pandemic and related business closures.

## Alabama

### *November 10, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 5, 2020, Gov. Kay Ivey announced that the "Safer at Home" order was extended to December 11, 2020. Capacity rates for retail establishments, gyms/fitness centers and entertainment venues were removed.

## Alabama

### *October 6, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 30, 2020, Gov. Kay Ivey announced that the statewide health order requiring masks was extended to November 8, 2020.

## Alabama

### *September 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 27, 2020, Gov. Kay Ivey extended the State's facemask order until October 2, 2020.

## **Alabama**

*September 1, 2020 – Auburn*

On August 26, 2020, Mayor Ron Anders announced that bar patrons are not permitted to order at the bar. A \$500 fine can be assessed to the individual or establishment for non-compliance.

## **Alabama**

*September 1, 2020 – Tuscaloosa*

On August 25, 2020, Mayor Walt Maddox announced the closure of bar service at restaurants and bars for the next two weeks.

## **Alabama**

*August 11, 2020 – Schools*

On August 3, 2020, the Department of Public Health released a school reopening toolkit containing guidelines and recommendations.

## **Alabama**

*August 4, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 28, 2020, Gov. Kay Ivey announced that the State's "Safer at Home" order would be extended to August 31, 2020. The original order has been amended to include a face-covering requirement for schools.

## **Alabama**

*July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective July 16, 2020, individuals are required to wear a facemask in public. Violating the order can bring a \$500 fine or jail time. The State has produced notification signs for businesses and [can be found by clicking here](#).

## **Alabama**

*July 7, 2020 – Mobile*

On June 1, 2020, the City passed an ordinance requiring individuals over the age of 10 to wear a face covering through the month of July.

## Alabama

*July 7, 2020 – Jefferson County*

Effective June 29, 2020, all individuals are required to wear a mask when in a public space.

## Alabama

*July 7, 2020 – Tuscaloosa*

Effective July 6, 2020, individuals are required to wear a mask when in public. The law is punishable by a \$25 fine and is expected to last at least 30 days.

## Alabama

*July 7, 2020 – Madison County*

Effective July 7, 2020, County Health Officer Dr. Karen Landers announced that residents are required to wear face coverings in public.

## Alabama

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, bowling alleys, arcades, concert venues, theaters, auditoriums, performing centers, tourist attractions (including museums and planetariums), racetracks, commercial or public playgrounds, adult entertainment venues, casinos, and bingo halls may reopen at 50 percent capacity.

## Alabama

*May 19, 2020 – Covid-19 Lawsuits*

Effective immediately, the Alabama Emergency Management Act of 1955 is amended to provide liability protections for businesses and healthcare providers. A claimant will be required to show clear and convincing evidence that a death, injury or damage was caused by the business, healthcare provider or covered entity's wanton, reckless, willful or intentional misconduct. Where liability is established (and there is not a serious physical injury), the covered entity's liability shall be limited to actual economic compensatory damages.

## Alaska

*April 20, 2021 – City of Anchorage*

On April 12, 2021, the City Assembly approved an extension to the City's declaration of emergency until June 11, 2021.

## Alaska

*March 30, 2021 – City of Anchorage*

On March 23, 2021, Acting Mayor Austin Quinn-Davidson announced that employees with verified COVID vaccinations are not required to wear a face mask when in their own workspace.

## Alaska

*March 9, 2021 – City of Anchorage*

On March 4, 2021, Acting Mayor Austin Quinn-Davidson announced that gatherings are limited to 25 people indoors with food, or 35 people indoors without food, 60 outdoors with food and 100 outdoors without food. Alcohol may now be served after 12:00 a.m.

## Alaska

*February 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 14, 2021, Gov. Mike Dunleavy issued a directive to continue following all policies regarding COVID-19 that were in place under the COVID-19 disaster declaration. In addition, the state released the following Health Advisories:

- **Health Advisory No. 1: Recommendations for Keeping Alaskans Safe**, provides recommendations to all Alaskans on how to protect themselves, their loved ones, and their community. [Click here to read Health Advisory 1.](#)

## **Alaska**

*February 2, 2021 – City of Anchorage*

On January 27, 2021, City Chief of Staff Jason Bockenstedt announced that hospitality businesses including restaurants and bars may increase capacity to 50%. In addition, businesses selling alcohol may remain open until 12:00 a.m. Retail businesses, salons and personal care service providers, entertainment facilities and gyms/fitness centers can operate at 50 percent capacity.

## **Alaska**

*January 5, 2021 – City of Anchorage*

On December 29, 2020, acting Mayor Austin Quinn-Davidson announced that effective January 1, 2021 bars, restaurants and breweries are permitted to reopen at 25% of their building occupancy capacity but must close at 11:00 p.m. Retail stores, fitness centers/gyms, personal care businesses can increase capacity to 50%.

## **Alaska**

*December 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 10, 2020, Gov. Mike Dunleavy announced that he extended the “Public Health Emergency Disaster” until January 15, 2020.

## **Alaska**

*December 22, 2020 – City of Juneau*

On December 14, 2020, the City and Borough of Juneau Assembly voted to extend its mask mandate for an additional six months. Masks are required in public when social distancing requirements cannot be met.

## Alaska

### *November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective November 16, 2020, Gov. Mike Dunleavy issued eight health orders:

- **Order No. 1:** Suspension of Regulations and Statutes, suspends certain regulations and statutes to allow agencies to best address the COVID-19 emergency.
- **Order No. 2:** Telehealth & Courtesy Occupational Licenses, authorizes telemedicine, access to licensees from other jurisdictions, and flexibility to certain licensing boards.
- **Order No. 3:** Virtual Meetings & Electronic Communications for Boards, allows business to be conducted virtually and via electronic communications for boards of corporations, non-profit, and ANCs.
- **Order No. 4:** Non-Congregate Sheltering, provides FEMA reimbursement eligibility for temporary sheltering and quarantine.
- **Order No. 5:** Critical Infrastructure, provides guidance for critical infrastructure workers in Alaska. Appendices with specific guidance for the following industries: commercial fishing, independent harvesters, and seafood processing plants.
- **Order No. 6:** International & Interstate Travel, provides guidelines for residents and non-residents traveling into Alaska.
- **Order No. 7:** Online Raffles & Prize Drawings, allows charitable gaming permittees to conduct raffles, lotteries and other contests online.
- **Order No. 8:** Intrastate Travel, specifies the limitations on community restrictions, and that Critical Infrastructure must be allowed to travel into rural towns, but follow safety plans; defines critical personal needs for residents that need to leave communities; and implements a testing strategy and protocols for individuals traveling from road system communities to off-road system.

## Alaska

### *November 17, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective November 11, 2020, Gov. Mike Dunleavy's announced a 30-day Declaration of Public Health Disaster Emergency.

## Alaska

### *November 10, 2020 – City of Anchorage*

Effective November 9, 2020, Acting Mayor Austin Quinn-Davidson announced that all individuals over the age of five are required to wear a facial mask when in public.

## **Alaska**

### *September 1, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective August 31, 2020, businesses that received any amount of the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) or Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) funds will become eligible to apply for AK CARES grants. This also applies to businesses that provide secondary sources of income. [Click here to visit the application portal.](#)

## **Alaska**

### *August 18, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 11, 2020, Gov. Mike Dunleavy announced updated travel constraints. Visitors are required to take a COVID-19 test within 72 hours of departure and upload the results to the Alaska Travel Portal or provide results of the test to an airport screener. Visitors who arrive without having taken a test can buy one for \$250. Travelers testing negative must social distance for 14 days or until receiving a second, negative test result taken between 7-14 days after arrival.

## **Alaska**

### *July 28, 2020 – Anchorage*

Effective July 24, 2020, Mayor Ethan Berowitz ordered that the following are required to limit gathering size: Restaurants (indoor capacity of 50 percent), bars/nightclubs (25 percent of indoor and outdoor capacity), Gyms (50 percent capacity) and Theaters (50 percent capacity). These establishments are required to maintain a log of all adult customers or clients that includes: first and last name, phone number, and email address in case it is needed for State or local contact tracing efforts.

## **Alaska**

### *July 28, 2020 – Juneau*

Effective July 20, 2020, the Juneau Assembly enacted an ordinance requiring face coverings for individuals when in public. Violators are subject to a fine of \$25.

## **Alaska**

### *June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, out-of-state visitors can avoid the State's 14-day quarantine requirement if they can provide screeners in the airport with a recent negative COVID-19 test result.



## Alaska

*May 26, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, the State will move to Phase 3, removing coronavirus restrictions on businesses.

## Alaska

*May 19, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, workers in industries that support critical infrastructure are not required to adhere to the State's mandate that all out-of-state visitors and returning residents self-quarantine for 14 days. Employees working for companies located outside of Alaska, who support critical infrastructure, are required to submit a plan to minimize coronavirus to health authorities.

## Arizona

*April 13, 2021 – Business Operations*

On April 9, 2021, Gov. Doug Ducey signed legislation that would not require a business to enforce a mask requirement. [AZ H.B. 2770](#)

## Arizona

*April 13, 2021 – City of Phoenix*

On April 6, 2021, the City Council announced that the City would continue with its mask requirement until the council votes to amend or terminate it.

## Arizona

*April 13, 2021 – City of Tempe*

On April 8, 2021, the City Council announced that the City would continue its mask mandate for individuals in public places and businesses.

## Arizona

*April 6, 2021 – Pima County*

On March 30, 2021, Chief Medical Officer Francisco Garcia announced that the County would keep its mask requirement in place, despite the fact that Arizona Gov. Doug Ducey issued an order prohibiting local governments from enacting their own legislation.

## Arizona

### *March 30, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 25, 2021, Governor Doug Ducey [announced](#) that counties, cities and towns are prohibited from enforcing their mask mandates, except in government buildings and on public transportation. However, businesses have the option to require masks and social distancing on their properties in accordance with their store policies and may turn away customers who refuse to comply. Events larger than 50 people no longer need state approval.

## Arizona

### *March 30, 2021 – City of Sierra Vista*

On March 25, 2021, Mayor Rick Mueller terminated the City's COVID-19 emergency declaration.

## Arizona

### *March 30, 2021 – City of Yuma*

On March 25, 2021, Mayor Douglas Nicholls announced that he was terminating the City's mask mandate.

## Arizona

### *March 9, 2021 – Schools*

On March 3, 2021, Gov. Doug Ducey issued an [executive order](#) requiring public schools reopen for in-person classes by March 15, 2021. High schools and middle schools in high transmission counties are exempt from the order.

## Arizona

### *March 9, 2021 – Business Operations*

On March 5, 2021, Gov. Doug Ducey issued an [executive order](#) allowing restaurants, bars, fitness centers/gyms, theaters, water parks and bowling alleys to open at 100% capacity. Spring Training will be allowed to operate as long as safety precautions are met. Mask requirements will stay in effect.

## Arizona

### *January 19, 2021 – City of Scottsdale*

On January 13, 2021, Mayor David Ortega reinstated the City's facial mask mandate for individuals over the age of six when in public and social distancing is not possible.

## Arizona

### *January 5, 2021 – Employer Liability*

On December 31, 2020, Gov. Doug Ducey extended his "Good Samaritan" executive order providing civil liability protection to health care workers and facilities in treatment of COVID-19 patients.

## Arizona

### *December 8, 2020 – Business Operations*

On December 2, 2020, Gov. Doug Ducey issued an executive order allowing restaurants to extend their premises.

## Arizona

### *December 8, 2020 – Grants*

On December 2, 2020, the Arizona Commerce Authority launched the Safest Outside Restaurant Assistance Program, funding up to \$10,000 for items restaurants need to extend their outdoor dining premises, including outdoor furniture, barriers, patio heaters and patio covers. ## Arizona

### *December 8, 2020 – City of Tucson*

Effective December 4, 2020, the City Council authorized curfew that bars individuals from public spaces from 10:00 p.m. – 5:00a.m.

## Arizona

### *December 1, 2020 – Graham County*

On November 25, 2020, the County Board of Supervisors voted to institute a mask mandate for the next six weeks.

## Arizona

### *December 1, 2020 – City of Flagstaff*

Effective November 30, 2020, Mayor Coral Evans returned the City to Phase 2 of its re-entry plan.

## Arizona

### *November 10, 2020 – City of Sierra Vista*

On November 6, 2020, Mayor Rick Mueller announced that the City's mask mandate had been reinstated.

## Arizona

*October 13, 2020 – City of Lake Havasu*

On October 5, 2020, Mayor Cal Sheehy suspended the proclamation requiring individuals to wear face coverings.

## Arizona

*October 6, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 1, 2020, the Arizona Department of Health Services announced that all 15 counties in the State met the requirements to allow businesses and activities at movie theaters, gyms and food service at bars to reopen.

## Arizona

*September 22, 2020 – Tucson*

Effective immediately, the Tucson Police department announced that they would enforce the City's mask ordinance and issue a \$50 fine for noncompliance.

## Arizona

*September 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 27, 2020, Gov. Doug Ducey signed an executive order for bars, movie theaters and water parks to be open at 50% capacity in approved counties. Gyms and indoor fitness centers are permitted to open at 25% capacity in approved counties.

## Arizona

*September 1, 2020 – Maricopa County*

On August 27, 2020, bars that serve food, gyms/fitness centers, movie theaters, and water parks may reopen as long as they follow state health requirements. Businesses must also complete and post a required Department of Health Services notice ([made available by clicking here](#)).

## Arizona

*September 1, 2020 – Pima County*

On August 27, 2020, bars that serve food, gyms/fitness centers, movie theaters, and water parks may reopen as long as they follow State health requirements as well as complete and post a required Department of Health Services notice ([click here to view/download](#)).

## Arizona

*September 1, 2020 – Apache County*

On August 27, 2020, bars that serve food, gyms/fitness centers, movie theaters, and water parks may reopen as long as they follow State health requirements as well as complete and post a required Department of Health Services notice ([click here to view/download](#)).

## Arizona

*September 1, 2020 – Cochise County*

On August 27, 2020, bars that serve food, gyms/fitness centers, movie theaters, and water parks may reopen as long as they follow State health requirements as well as complete and post a required Department of Health Services notice ([click here to view/download](#)).

*September 1, 2020 – La Paz*

*September 1, 2020 – Navajo County*

On August 27, 2020, bars that serve food, gyms/fitness centers, movie theaters, and water parks may reopen as long as they follow State health requirements as well as complete and post a required Department of Health Services notice ([click here to view/download](#)).

## Arizona

*September 1, 2020 – Yavapai County*

On August 27, 2020, bars that serve food, gyms/fitness centers, movie theaters, and water parks may reopen as long as they follow State health requirements as well as complete and post a required Department of Health Services notice ([click here to view/download](#)).

## Arizona

*August 25, 2020 – Business Operations*

On August 19, 2020, the Department of Health Services announced the reopening of 31 gym/fitness centers, 2 movie theaters and 5 bars based on community metrics.

## **Arizona**

*July 28, 2020 – Business Operations*

On July 23, 2020, Gov. Doug Ducey announced the continued closure of bars, gyms, theaters and water parks.

## **Arizona**

*July 21, 2020 – Scottsdale*

Effective immediately, Mayor Jim Lane has extended the City's face covering ordinance until August 20, 2020.

## **Arizona**

*July 14, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective July 11, 2020, restaurants are limited to a maximum capacity of 50 percent for indoor dining.

## **Arizona**

*June 30 – Safety Precautions*

Effective June 29, 2020, Gov. Doug Ducey announces closure of bars, gyms and theaters.

## **Arizona**

*June 23, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, Governor Doug Ducey's executive order permits the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) to implement a Statewide system for case investigation and contact tracing. In addition, the order allows a county, city or town to stipulate the wearing of face coverings in public.

## **Arizona**

*June 23, 2020 – Maricopa County*

Effective June 20, 2020, individuals 6 years of age and older are required to wear face coverings in a place of public accommodation.

## **Arizona**

*May 19, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, fitness centers and pools may reopen if they adhere to health official's recommendations.

## Arkansas

*April 6, 2021 – City of Little Rock*

On March 30, 2021, Mayor Frank Scott Jr. announced that the City would continue its mask requirement despite the fact that the State's mask mandate terminated on March 31, 2021.

## Arkansas

*April 6, 2021 – City of Fayetteville*

On March 30, 2021, the City issued a press release confirming the they would still enforce their facemask mandate despite the statewide requirement being lifted.

## Arkansas

*March 30, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 29, 2021, Gov. Asa Hutchinson announced the extension of the State's public health emergency for an additional 60-days. In addition, the Governor announced that the State's mask mandate would terminate on March 31, 2021.

## Arkansas

*March 2, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 26, 2021, Gov. Asa Hutchinson announced that the State's public health emergency is extended through March 31, 2021.

## Arkansas

*February 23, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 16, 2021, Gov. Asa Hutchinson announced that moving forward gatherings with 10 or more individuals no longer require State approval. However, gatherings of 100 or more will require approval.

## Arkansas

*February 9, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 2, 2021, Gov. Asa Hutchinson announced an end to the 11:00 p.m. curfew for certain restaurants and bars.

## Arkansas

*November 24, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective November 20, 2020, Gov. Asa Hutchinson's order requires restaurants, bars, and clubs that serve alcohol to close by 11 p.m. until January 3, 2021.

## Arkansas

*September 1, 2020 – Pulaski County*

On August 25, 2020, the County Quorum Court announced that face coverings are required inside businesses in the unincorporated areas of the County. The Sheriff's Office is tasked with educating and encouraging the public and removing them from businesses if they do not comply to the ordinance.

## Arkansas

*August 18, 2020 – Schools*

On August 13, 2020, Gov. Asa Hutchinson released the "Arkansas Ready to Learn Health School Guide" supporting teachers and administrators. [Click here to view and/or download the guide.](#)

## Arkansas

*July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 16, 2020, Gov. ASA Hutchinson issued an order requiring individuals to wear a face covering in public.

## Arkansas

*July 14, 2020 – Schools*

Gov. Asa Hutchinson announced that schools would reopen August 24, 2020 instead of August 13, 2020.

## Arkansas

*June 23, 2020 – Workers' Comp*

Effective immediately, Gov. Asa Hutchinson's executive order creates an exception to workers' compensation law that typically does not cover ordinary diseases of life. An employee that can show that they contracted Covid-19 at work may be entitled to coverage.

## Arkansas

*June 23, 2020 – Workplace immunity*

Effective immediately, Gov. Asa Hutchinson's executive order provides protection for liability for healthcare workers and providers operating as emergency workers with Covid-19-related duties.



## Arkansas

*June 23, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective June 14, 2020, the 14-day quarantine for out-of-state travelers expired.

## Arkansas

*June 23, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective July 1, 2020, long-term care facilities may accept visitors while having to continue to meet all other State guidelines.

## Arkansas

*June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, the State will enter Phase Two of its reopening plan. The individual capacity for restaurants, retail and malls is increased from 30 percent up to 60 percent. Gyms/fitness centers and personal care services remain at 30 percent.

## Arkansas

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, bars may operate at 33 percent of seating capacity with social distancing guidelines for table and bar service. Patrons are required wear masks until food or drink is served.

## California

*April 20, 2021 – Redwood City*

On April 12, 2021, the City Council voted to require drug and grocery stores with more than 750 employees nationwide, to pay employees that interact with the public an extra \$5.00 in hazard pay.

## California

*April 13, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On April 6, 2021, Gov. Gavin Newsom [announced](#) that he plans to remove all State restrictions effective July 15, 2021, subject to ongoing conditions.

## California

*April 13, 2021 – City of Richmond*

On April 6, 2021, the City Council voted to install an emergency ordinance requiring grocery stores with 15,000 square feet in size, that have at least 500 employees nationwide and dedicate at least 10% of their interior space to selling groceries to pay employees an extra \$5.00 in hazard pay.

## California

*April 6, 2021 – Orange County*

On March 31, 2021, County Supervisor Doug Chaffee announced that the County was being transitioned to tier Orange of the State's reopening plan. Restaurants can expand indoor dining to 50%, wineries can offer indoor service at 25%, bars not serving food can reopen outdoors for the first time. Retail stores may open without limits, churches, movie theaters, museums, zoos and aquariums can expand to 50% capacity.

## California

*April 6, 2021 – City of Concord*

On March 30, 2021 the City Council voted to mandate that grocery stores with more than 300 employees nationwide are required to pay workers an additional \$5.00 per hour in hazard pay.

## California

*April 6, 2021 – Los Angeles County*

## California

*April 6, 2021 – Los Angeles County*

On April 5, 2021, Public Health Director Barbara Ferrer announced updated travel guidelines that permit individuals to travel if they wear a mask and are fully vaccinated. Fully vaccinated residents who return from traveling without symptoms are not required to quarantine or get tested for COVID-19.

## California

### *March 30, 2021 – Paid Sick Leave*

On March 19, 2021, Gov. Gavin Newsome signed legislation providing employees with additional paid sick leave benefits in order to assist with the financial ramifications of COVID-19, including time spent being vaccinated. Supplemental sick leave is provided to employees through September 30, 2021 under the law. The law's provisions apply retroactively back to January 1, 2021 and requires employers (25 or more employees, those over 25 can provide and are eligible for a tax credit) to compensate employees taking leave moving forward and for those that took unpaid time off prior to the law's enactment so long as the employee took this time for one of the specified purposes. Employers are not required to begin providing paid sick leave until after March 29 due to a grace period provision of the law. Employers are required to provide employees with a written notice of available leave balances under the supplemental sick leave requirement. Full-time employees (working an average of 40 hours per week in the two weeks prior to leave) must be provided 80 hours of supplemental paid sick leave.

### *March 30, 2021 – City of Los Angeles*

Effective March 30, 2021, the COVID-19 Emergency Renters Relief Program is available to residents in need of assistance. The City will make available grants in the amount of \$10,000.

## California

### *March 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

The State Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH) released updated [guidance](#) detailing the agency's position on an employer's ability to mandate the COVID-19 vaccination for its employees. The guidance confirms that employers are generally allowed to mandate FDA-approved COVID-19 vaccines as long as the employer provides reasonable accommodations.

## California

### *March 23, 2021 – Disneyland*

On March 17, 2021, the Company announced that it would reopen in a limited capacity on April 30, 2021.

## California

*March 23, 2021 – County of San Diego*

Effective March 17, 2021, all public and private schools in the County may reopen due to the County being transitioned to the red tier of the State's reopening plan.

## California

*March 23, 2021 – City of West Hollywood*

On March 15, 2021, the City Council voted to add new categories to the \$5.00 per hour hero pay legislation. Moving forward, retail and drug store employers with 300 or more employees nationally or 15 locally (non-management) are required to pay the extra \$5.00 per hour. Retail stores 85,000 square feet or larger and that dedicate more than 10% of their sales floor to retailing food products or drug retail products are also eligible.

## California

*March 16, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 12, 2021, the Department of Public Health announced that the following counties are transitioning from the Purple tier to the Red tier.

Amador, Colusa, Contra Costa, Los Angeles, Mendocino, Mono, Orange, Placer, San Benito, San Bernardino, Siskiyou, Sonoma and Tuolumne.

## California

*March 16, 2021 – City of Long Beach*

On March 16, 2021, Mayor Robert Garcia will present to the City Council a \$207 million COVID-19 relief program for businesses and individuals (The Long Beach Recovery Act).

On March 9, 2021, the City Supervisors approved an emergency ordinance requiring drug and grocery store employers with 500 or more employees to pay employees earning less than \$35 per hour or \$75,000 per year an extra \$5.00 per hour in hazard pay.

*March 16, 2021 – City of Santa Monica*

On March 9, 2021, the City Council approved an ordinance creating a temporary \$5.00 per hour (hazard pay) bonus for workers at local grocery and drug stores.

*March 9, 2021 – City of Santa Ana*

On March 2, 2021, the City Council approved an ordinance to provide \$5.00 per hour in hazard pay for grocery and pharmacy store employees.

*March 9, 2021 – City of Los Angeles*

On March 3, 2021, the City Council approved an ordinance to provide \$4.00 per hour in hazard pay for grocery and pharmacy store employees.

## California

*March 9, 2021 – City of San Diego*

On March 4, 2021, the City Council announced an extension to its ordinance requiring hotels to rehire veteran workers that were laid off due to COVID-19.

*March 2, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 23, 2021, the Board of Supervisors approved an ordinance requiring grocery and drug retailers in unincorporated areas to pay workers an additional \$5.00 per hour in hero pay.

## California

*March 2, 2021 – City of Irvine*

On February 23, 2021, the City Council voted to require grocery and pharmacies to pay workers an additional \$4.00 per hour for hero pay.

## California

*March 2, 2021 – City of West Hollywood*

On February 16, 2021, the City Council passed an ordinance requiring grocery stores with fifteen or more employees per store to pay workers an additional \$5.00 per hour for hero pay.

## California

*March 2, 2021 – City of San Francisco*

On February 23, 2021, Acting Health Officer Dr. Susan Philip announced the end of the City's travel quarantine.

## California

*March 2, 2021 – Santa Clara County*

On February 23, 2021, the Board of Supervisors mandated that large grocery stores and Pharmacies with 300 or more employees nationwide or 15 in unincorporated areas provide workers with an additional \$5.00 per hour for hazard pay.

## California

*March 2, 2021 – City of Berkeley*

On February 23, 2021, the City Council approved an ordinance to pay grocery store workers an additional \$5.00 per hour in hazard pay. Employers with 300 employees and have a physical location with 25,000 square feet are affected.

## California

*March 2, 2021 – City of Santa Barbara*

On February 23, 2021, the City Council approved an extension to the City's COVID-19 emergency ordinance.

## California

*February 23, 2021 – Schools*

On February 12, 2021, Gov. Gavin Newsom released the [Safe Schools Reopening Map](#). The map includes reopening statuses and safety planning protocols for school districts, charter schools, and private schools.

## California

*February 23, 2021 – State Stimulus*

On February 17, 2021, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced the availability of the Golden State Stimulus, a \$600 payment for individuals with a low income and 2.1 billion in grants for small business.

## California

*February 23, 2021 – City of Pleasanton*

On February 16, 2021, the City Council voted to not have citations issued for non-compliance with the state mask mandate. The mandate affects businesses with more than 15,000 square feet that primarily sell food, or those of 85,000 square feet with at least 10% of square feet set aside for food sales, or retail food businesses that employ at least 300 people nationwide.

## California

*February 23, 2021 – City of San Leandro*

On February 16, 2021, the City Council approved temporary "hazard pay" in the amount of \$5.00 per hour to employees of grocery stores.

## California

*February 23, 2021 – Marin County*

On February 9, 2021, the Board of Supervisors approved \$30 million in grants to be provided to small businesses impacted by COVID-19.

## California

*February 16, 2021 – City of San Francisco*

On February 9, 2021, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors approved an extension to the time period for employees to use the City’s Public Health Emergency Leave.

## California

*February 9, 2021 – San Benito County*

On January 31, 2021, the Board of Supervisors approved an additional offering of small business grants. Businesses that have been directly impacted by the regional stay-at-home order may apply for grants between \$5000 and \$15,000. [Details available here.](#)

## California

*February 9, 2021 – City of Oakland*

On February 2, 2021, the City Council approved an ordinance requiring large (500 or more employees nationwide) grocery stores to pay workers an extra \$5.00 per hour in “hazard” or “hero” pay.

## California

*February 9, 2021 – City of Santa Rosa*

On February 2, 2021, the City of Santa Rosa passed a new local urgency ordinance temporarily reinstating employer provided COVID-19-related paid sick leave for employees within Santa Rosa city limits. The ordinance mirrors the provisions of the federal Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA), though it is applicable to all businesses within Santa Rosa city limits, regardless of size or sector.



## California

*February 2, 2021 – Los Angeles County*

On January 26, 2021, the County of Los Angeles approved an ordinance requiring employers in unincorporated parts of the County to provide supplemental COVID-19 related paid sick leave.

## California

*January 26, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On January 25, 2021, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced that the State's stay-at-home order had been terminated along with the 10:00 p.m. – 5:00 a.m. curfew. All counties will remain in the "Purple Zone" in the State's reopening plan.

## California

*January 26, 2021 – City of Oakland*

On January 19, 2021, the City Council extended an ordinance requiring businesses with 50 or more employees to provide 80 hours of paid sick leave to workers affected by COVID-19.

## California

*January 26, 2021 – City of Long Beach*

On January 19, 2021, the City Council approved an ordinance requiring grocery stores with 300 or more employees nationwide or fifteen employees in a location to compensate their employees temporarily with an additional \$4.00 per hour.

## California

*January 19, 2021 – Sacramento Region*

On January 12, 2021, the State ended the stay-at-home order for the thirteen counties that make up the region.

## California

*January 19, 2021 – City of San Diego*

On January 12, 2021, the City Council approved an extension to its temporary ordinance allowing certain businesses to apply to use outdoor parkland during the COVID-19 pandemic. The ordinance waives park fees and will remain in effect until businesses can resume indoor operations or December 31, 2021.

## California

*January 19, 2021 – San Benito County*

On January 15, 2021, County supervisors approved an emergency ordinance to fine individuals \$100 for their first offense and \$500 for their third if they do not adhere to facial mask requirements. A business can be fined up to \$5,000 for their third violation, and \$10,000 for their fourth.

## California

*January 5, 2021 – Schools*

On December 30, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced a phased reopening plan for schools. Individual schools are required to submit a safety plan to State and local governments. If not disapproved within five days of submission, schools will be allowed to open, subject to monitoring by local health departments. Schools may remain open if they sustain a level of Covid-19 infection below 28 people per 100,000.

## California

*January 5, 2021 – Sacramento Region*

On January 2, 2021, Health and Human Services Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly announced that the region will extend its stay-at-home order.

## California

*January 5, 2021 – Los Angeles County*

On December 28, 2020, the County Department of Public Health announced that any individual traveling outside of the region is required to quarantine for ten days when returning.

## California

*January 5, 2021 – Southern California*

On December 29, 2020, Health and Human Services Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly announced that the region will extend its stay-at-home order.

## California

*January 5, 2021 – San Joaquin Valley*

On December 29, 2020, Health and Human Services Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly announced that the region will extend its stay-at-home order.

## California

*December 29, 2020 – City of Laguna Beach*

Effective December 23, 2020, the City Council's relief package is available for small businesses and nonprofits to help relieve the financial burden due to the regional stay-at-home order. [Click here to view/complete the application.](#)

## California

*December 29, 2020 – San Mateo County*

Effective until June 30, 2021, the County has extended its supplemental paid sick leave in unincorporated areas.

## California

*December 22, 2020 – Los Angeles County*

On December 17, 2020, the County Board of Supervisors enacted an ordinance creating "Public Health Councils." The council is made up of employees that monitor their employer's compliance with Covid-19 protocols.

## California

*December 22, 2020 – City of San Francisco*

On December 16, 2020, the Department of Health issued a travel order requiring anyone traveling, moving, or returning to San Francisco from outside the 10-county Bay Area to quarantine for 10 days in order to limit the spread of the coronavirus.

## California

*December 22, 2020 – City of Sacramento*

On December 15, 2020, the City Council approved an extension to its ordinance requiring employers to comply with specific health and safety protocols that include cleaning, disinfecting and giving employees the ability for handwashing. Violations of the protocols can result in penalties, including fines up to \$25,000.

## California

*December 22, 2020 – Bay Area*

Effective December 17, 2020, the state added the Bay Area Region to its regional stay at home order. The order is in effect through January 7, 2020.

## California

*December 15, 2020 – Lake Tahoe*

On December 9, 2020, Lake Tahoe closed for vacation travel for the next three weeks. Outdoor recreation facilities may remain open only for facilitating physically distanced exercise. Restaurants are open only for takeout or delivery. Hotels can only accommodate essential workers. Museums, movie theaters, wineries and breweries must cease operations.

## California

*December 15, 2020 – City of Carlsbad*

On December 8, 2020, the City Council passed an ordinance requiring hotels (200 or more guest rooms) to ensure that positions are available for employees that have been furloughed or laid off due to COVID-19.

## California

*December 15, 2020 – Sacramento County*

Effective immediately, a "Stay at Home" order has been issued for the greater Sacramento region. Individuals living in the Region are to stay home unless for essential activities and cease all gatherings with members of other households. The following industries must cease operations: amusement parks, bars, breweries, distilleries, wineries, family entertainment centers (e.g. arcades, batting cages, bowling alleys, and kart racing), hair salons, barbershops, museums, zoos, aquariums and personal care services (e.g. body piercing, body waxing, estheticians, massage therapy, nail salons, and tattoo). Restaurants may operate for takeout and delivery only. Any dine-in (indoor or outdoor) is prohibited.

## California

*December 8, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 3, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced a regional stay at home order to be based on ICU capacity. If enacted a region will operate under the "stay at home" regulations for three weeks. [Click here for details.](#)

*December 8, 2020 – City of San Francisco*

On December 4, 2020, Mayor London Breed and Area Health Officials announced that the City would implement California's "stay at home" order immediately. Bars, wineries, personal services, hair salons and barbershops would be ordered to temporarily close. Retail stores could operate at reduced capacity and restaurants can only offer take-out and delivery.

## California

*December 8, 2020 – City of Berkeley*

Effective December 7, 2020, the City's "shut down" prohibits gatherings with people outside their household. Bars, wineries, personal services, hair salons and barbershops are ordered to temporarily close. Retail stores may operate at a 20% capacity.

## California

*December 8, 2020 – County of Alameda*

Effective December 7, 2020, the City's "shut down" prohibits gatherings with people outside their household. Bars, wineries, personal services, hair salons and barbershops are ordered to temporarily close. Retail stores may operate at a 20% capacity.

## California

*December 8, 2020 – County of Santa Clara*

Effective December 6, 2020, the City's "shut down" prohibits gatherings with people outside their household. Bars, wineries, personal services, hair salons and barbershops are ordered to temporarily close. Retail stores may operate at a 20% capacity.

Effective December 6, 2020, grocery stores can operate at a 20% capacity. Restaurants may provide outdoor dining. Individuals not adhering to the face mask ordinance can be fined up to \$500. Businesses may be fined up to \$10,000.

*December 8, 2020 – Southern California*

Effective December 6, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsom's "stay at home" order took effect in certain counties. Bars, wineries, personal services, hair salons and barbershops are ordered to temporarily close. Retail stores may operate at a 20% capacity. Affected counties include:

## California

*December 1, 2020 – Los Angeles County*

On November 27, 2020, the County announced a “stay at home” recommendation for all residents to stay home “as much as possible” and to wear a face mask when in public. The ordinance prohibits individual gatherings in public or private and runs through December 20, 2020.

## California

*December 1, 2020 – Alameda County*

Effective immediately, small business are eligible for a \$5000 CARES Grant due to economic, health or safety issues arising due to Covid-19. [Click here for Grant information details.](#)

## California

*November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 18, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsom ordered a 10 p.m. – 5:00 a.m. curfew effective November 21, 2020 until December 21, 2020 for non-essential workers in purple tiered counties.

## California

*November 24, 2020 – Cal/OSHA*

On November 19, 2020, the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (Cal/OSHA) approved a COVID-19 emergency regulation that requires a written “COVID-19 Prevention Program,” that is similar to California’s Injury and Illness Prevention Plan requirements. Employers must provide notification of a potential exposure within one business day to exposed; employees, independent contractors and authorized representatives. In addition, records are required to be provided to the local health department, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH), Cal/OSHA, and the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) upon request.

## California

*November 24, 2020 – Los Angeles County*

Effective November 25, 2020, the County Public Health Officer announced that restaurants, breweries, wineries and bars will only be able to offer take-out, drive thru, and delivery services. Wineries and breweries may continue their retail operations adhering to current protocols. In person dining will not be allowed, at minimum, for the next 3 weeks.

## California

*November 17, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 16, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced that over 94 percent of the State was being moved to the most restrictive tier in their reopening guidelines. In addition, individuals are required to wear a mask when not in their homes. [Click here to see the "Blueprint for a Safer Economy."](#)

## California

*November 17, 2020 – City of San Francisco*

On November 16, 2020, Mayor London Breed announced that non-essential offices be closed and that indoor dining at restaurants is prohibited. Fitness Centers/Gyms will remain open at a maximum capacity of 10 percent of maximum capacity.

*November 10, 2020 – City of Los Angeles*

On November 4, 2020, the City Council announced that businesses have the ability to refuse service to customers that do not abide by facial covering statutes.

## California

*October 27, 2020 – City of San Francisco*

Effective November 8, 2020, under Ordinance 208-20, tourist hotels are required to Disinfect porous/non-porous surfaces using the appropriate disinfectant, make available hand sanitizer at the main entry and exits, disinfect restrooms in guest rooms at least once per day, prepare compliance logs and have written protocols in place for cleaning and disease prevention standards.

## California

*October 27, 2020 – Yolo County*

On October 21, 2020, the County's public health officer restricted gatherings to a maximum of 16 people, this includes everyone present including hosts and attendees.

## California

*October 27, 2020 – Shasta County*

On October 24, 2020, County CEO Matt Pontes announced that the County would remain in California's Red Tier.



## California

*October 20, 2020 – City of Burbank*

Effective October 16, 2020, individuals not complying with state facial covering regulations are subject to a \$100 fine for a first violation, a second violation is \$200. Additional violations of the ordinance will cost \$500 each within a 12-month period.

## California

*October 20, 2020 – San Mateo County*

On October 14, 2020 the County Manager Mike Callagy announced that the county would launch on October 19, 2020, a COVID-19 compliance unit to warn and cite businesses that are not adhering to the county's pandemic-related health order.

## California

*October 13, 2020 – County Assignments*

On October 6, 2020, the Department of Health reassigned counties within its reopening plan:

- Purple Tier - Tehama County
- Red Tier – Shasta, Ventura, Merced and Yuba Counties
- Orange Tier – Inyo County
- Yellow Tier – Humboldt, Plumas, Siskiyou and Trinity Counties

## California

*October 6, 2020 – Santa Barbara*

On September 29, 2020, the County was moved to the State's red tier of its reopening plan.

## California

*September 29, 2020 – Workers' Compensation*

Effective immediately, **SB 1159** expands Workers' Compensation coverage for Covid-19. The term injury includes illness or death resulting from the novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19) under specified circumstances, until January 1, 2023. Creating a disputable presumption, as specified, that the injury arose out of and in the course of the employment and is compensable, for specified dates of injury.

## California

*September 29, 2020 – Cal/OSHA*

Effective January 21, 2021, if the California Division of Occupational and Health (Cal/OSHA) determines that an employer's workplace, operation or process caused exposure or risk due to Covid-19 and suspends or restricts workplace access, Cal/OSHA will send a notice to the employer that must be conspicuously posted by the employer in its workplace.

## California

*September 29, 2020 – Cal/OSHA*

Effective January 1, 2021, employers that receive a "notice of potential exposure" from Cal/OSHA are required to distribute a written notice to employees/subcontractors that an individual at the same worksite has had a laboratory-confirmed case of COVID-19 and they may have been exposed. In addition, employers must provide information regarding COVID-19-related benefits to which the employees may be entitled under applicable federal, state or local law and additional options.

## California

*September 29, 2020 – County Reopening*

Effective September 22, 2020, the following counties are approved to move to the **red** phase of reopening: Alameda, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Riverside, Solano

Effective September 22, 2020, the following counties are approved to move to the **orange** phase of reopening: El Dorado, Lassen, Nevada

Effective September 22, 2020, the following county is approved to move to the **yellow** phase of reopening: Mariposa

## California

*September 29, 2020 – Sacramento County*

Effective October 1, 2020, employers located in the unincorporated areas of Sacramento County, must implement specified social distancing, mitigation, and cleaning protocols/practices in the workplace. In addition, an employer with 500 or more total employees is required provide full-time employees with 80 hours of paid sick leave, while part-time employees must receive paid time off equal to their average number of hours worked over a two-week period if the worker is: subject to Covid-19 quarantine; taking care of a family member; or caring for a minor child because the child's school or daycare is closed due to COVID-19.

*September 22, 2020 – Paid Sick Leave*

*September 22, 2020 – Safety Precautions.*

On September 15, 2020, Director of Health and Human Services Dr. Mark Ghaly announced that the County was moved from the purple to red tier, allowing movie theaters to reopen with restrictions.

## California

*September 22, 2020 – Marin County*

On September 15, 2020, Director of Health and Human Services Dr. Mark Ghaly announced that the County was moved from the purple to red tier, allowing movie theaters to reopen with restrictions.

## California

*September 22, 2020 – Tehama County*

Effective September 16, 2020, the Butte Business Stabilization Small Business Grant made available up to \$25,000 in grants for small businesses needing support due to Covid-19.

*September 22, 2020 – Berkeley*

On September 15, 2020 the City Council voted to fine individuals \$100 for non-compliance with the existing mask ordinance.

## California

### *September 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 4, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsom introduced the State's updated reopening plan moving to a county-tiered system. The new system is based on the number of new cases per 100,000 residents.

## California

### *September 15, 2020 – Paid Sick Leave*

Effective immediately, AB 1867 requires private sector employers with 500 or more employees in the United States to provide up to 80 hours of supplemental paid sick leave to employees who leave their homes to perform work.

## California

### *September 15, 2020 – Amador County*

On September 7, 2020, the County was moved from the Red to Purple tier of the State's new reopening plan.

## California

### *September 15, 2020 – Orange County*

On September 7, 2020, the County was moved from the Red to Purple tier of the State's new reopening plan.

## California

### *September 15, 2020 – Placer County*

On September 7, 2020, the County was moved from the Red to Purple tier of the State's new reopening plan.

### *September 15, 2020 – Santa Clara County*

On September 7, 2020, the County was moved from the Red to Purple tier of the State's new reopening plan.

## California

### *September 15, 2020 – Santa Cruz County*

On September 7, 2020, the County was moved from the Red to Purple tier of the State's new reopening plan.

## California

*September 15, 2020 – San Diego*

On September 8, 2020, the City Council voted to require organizations with 500 or more employees to provide workers who contract Covid-19, or have a family member who has contracted it, with 80 hours of paid sick leave.

## California

*September 15, 2020 – San Diego*

On September 8, 2020, the City Council passed an ordinance designed to ensure that hotels first bring back their longest-tenured workers that have been laid off due to Covid-19.

## California

*September 8, 2020 – San Francisco*

On September 1, 2020 the City approved an ordinance to prevent an employer from terminating or discriminating against an employee who has or had Covid-19. Employers face fines of \$1000 for a first incident, a \$5000 fine for the second one and \$10,000 fine for the third.

## California

*September 8, 2020 – Santa Clara*

On September 1, 2020, the City Council voted to cap fees for third party delivery services at 15 percent.

## California

*September 8, 2020 – Alameda*

On September 1, 2020, the Alameda City Council voted to implement fines for individuals not adhering to Alameda County's mask requirements. The fines range from \$250 to \$1000.

## California

*September 1, 2020 – Mono County*

On August 24, 2020, the County was removed from the State's Covid-19 watchlist due to a decrease cases and hospital visits. If the County remains off the monitoring list for 14 days in a row, schools teaching any grade level would have the green light to reopen.

## California

*September 1, 2020 – Orange County*

On August 24, 2020, the County was removed from the State's Covid-19 watchlist due to a decrease cases and hospital visits. If the County remains off the monitoring list for 14 days in a row, schools teaching any grade level would have the green light to reopen.

## California

*September 1, 2020 – Sierra County*

On August 24, 2020, the County was removed from the State's Covid-19 watchlist due to a decrease cases and hospital visits. If the County remains off the monitoring list for 14 days in a row, schools teaching any grade level would have the green light to reopen.

## California

*August 25, 2020 – Orange County*

On August 24, 2020, the County's plan to move to Phase 2 of the State's reopening plan was approved. Restaurants will be permitted to reopen (with social-distancing) for dine-in as will retail (shopping malls and swap meets).

## California

*August 25, 2020 – Paid Sick Leave*

On August 18, 2020, County Supervisors approved an ordinance, requiring employers to provide at least 80 hours of paid sick leave to employees who are sick with COVID-19 or need to care for a child or senior family member because a school or caregiving facility is closed due to coronavirus.

## California

*August 18, 2020 – San Francisco*

The Office of Economic and Workforce Development released a webpage and FAQs in order to provide information on the city's Back to Work ordinance. [Click here to view the webpage](#) and/or [here to view the FAQs](#).

## California

*August 18, 2020 – CalSavers*

Effective September 30, 2020, the deadline for an employer with 100 or more eligible employees to register for the CalSavers retirement savings program is extended from June 30, 2020, to September 30, 2020, due to Covid-19.

## California

*August 11, 2020 – Schools*

On August 7, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsome announced guidance on the opening of colleges and universities. Indoor lectures and dining for schools that reside in counties that have spent three consecutive days on the monitoring list is not allowed. Students and staff must wear a mask while in all indoor public spaces. Instructors teaching indoors may wear a face shield if they are able to maintain a six-foot distance.

## California

*August 11, 2020 – San Mateo County*

On August 4, 2020, the County Supervisors approved an ordinance for fines to be assessed for not wearing a mask in public. The fines will range from \$100 through \$500.

## California

*August 11, 2020 – San Diego*

On August 4, 2020, the City Council approved an ordinance allowing barbershops/ hair salons, gyms/fitness centers and faith-based groups to reopen if they conduct business outside.

## California

*August 11, 2020 – Chula Vista*

On August 4, 2020, the City Council approved an ordinance allowing barbershops, nail salons, gyms, bars, breweries, wineries, massage and tattoo parlors to operate outside.

## California

*August 11, 2020 – Santa Cruz County*

On August 4, 2020, the Board of Supervisors voted to institute fines for individuals not wearing a face covering. The first violation is a \$100 fine. The second is \$200 and the third moves to \$500.

## California

*August 4, 2020 – San Francisco*

On July 17, 2020, Mayor London Breed signed the Healthy Buildings Ordinance creating requirements for cleaning and employee training. Large non-city-owned commercial office buildings and tourist hotels are required to provide: Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and testing for COVID-19 (at no cost to employees).

## California

*August 4, 2020 – Hermosa Beach*

On July 28, 2020, the City Council voted to enforce face-covering mandates with a fine of \$100 for a first offense, \$200 for the second offense and \$350 for each additional offense.

## California

*August 4, 2020 – Contra Costa County*

On July 28, 2020, the Board of Supervisors implemented fines for businesses up to \$1000 for violating face covering laws or not adhering to social distancing. In addition, individuals not abiding by the face covering law face tickets of \$100 for their first violation, \$200 for their second, and \$500 for any after that. Enforcement officers also have the discretion to issue a "notice of violation."

*July 28, 2020 – Costa Mesa*

On July 21, 2020, Mayor Katrina Foley announced that the city would fine individuals for not complying with the statewide face covering order. Fines of \$100 for the first violation, \$200 for the second and \$500 to \$1000 for subsequent violations.

## California

*July 28, 2020 – Glendale*

On July 21, 2020 the City Council put in place a series of fines for individuals not utilizing a mask. The first offense will result in a \$400 fine, the second a \$1,000 fine and \$2,000 for a third offense. The fines are the same for businesses.



## California

*July 28, 2020 – Santa Barbara County*

Effective July 23, 2020, the County adopted the State of California's face covering requirements. Masks are to be worn by County residents whenever they are around others in public places, such as inside businesses, when conducting business through a car window or when waiting in line. Drivers must also wear a face-covering while driving or operating a vehicle.

## California

*July 21, 2020 – Mendocino County*

Effective immediately, individuals can be fined \$100 for not adhering to a facemask requirement. In addition, a business can deny entry to any individual not wearing a mask, even if they have a medical condition.

## California

*July 21, 2020 – Manhattan Beach*

Effective immediately, any individual not wearing a mask and qualifying for an exemption is subject to a \$100-\$300, depending upon the number of violations.

## California

*July 21, 2020 – San Mateo County*

Effective July 16, 2020, a long-term care home may receive visitors after receiving permission. Friends and family may visit as long as they are socially-distanced and masked while outdoors.

## California

*July 21, 2020 – Schools*

On July 17, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced that students would begin the school year working online if they reside in a county that is on the State's coronavirus watch list.

## California

*July 14, 2020 – Contra Costa County*

Face coverings should be worn in businesses and in areas where people wait in line to enter businesses, and that everyone should wear a mask or face covering whenever they are within six feet of another person who is not a member of their household.

## California

*July 14, 2020 – Sacramento*

Effective immediately, the Sacramento Worker Protection, Health and Safety Act requires that most employers with 500 or more employees, must provide supplemental paid sick leave (SPSL) to employees. An employee working 40 or more hours per week is eligible for 80 hours of SPSL. Part time employees can receive an amount of SPSL hours equal to the number of hours they work on average over a two-week period. In addition, the Law mandates that employers implement various safety practice and protocols.

## California

*July 14, 2020 – San Mateo County*

Effective immediately, most employers with 500 or more employees are required to provide full-time employees, normally scheduled to work 40 or more hours per week, 80 supplemental paid sick leave (SPSL) hours. Part time employees receive an amount no greater than the average number of hours they work in a two-week period.

*July 14, 2020 – Santa Clara County*

Effective July 13, 2020, employers are required to develop and submit an updated Social Distancing Protocol and post a "Covid-19 Prepared Sign and Social Distancing Protocol Visitor Information Sheet" by the entrance of their workplace.

*July 14, 2020 – Los Angeles*

Los Angeles Unified School District announced that all classes this fall would be conducted remotely.

## California

*July 14, 2020 – San Diego*

San Diego Unified School District announced that all classes this fall would be conducted remotely.

## California

*July 14, 2020 – Business Operation*

On July 13, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsome announced the closure of restaurants, bars, museums, zoos, family entertainment centers and movie theaters.

## California

### *July 7, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

The California Department of Public Health issued guidance for a company that responds to a Covid-19 Outbreak. [Click here to view.](#)

## California

### *July 7, 2020 – Safety Procedures*

Effective July 1, 2020, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced that 19 counties must close indoor sectors for restaurants, wineries, movie theaters, family entertainment, zoos, museums and card-rooms. These counties include: Contra Costa - Fresno - Glenn - Imperial - Kern - Kings - Los Angeles - Merced - Orange - Riverside - Sacramento - San Bernardino - San Joaquin - Santa Barbara - Santa Clara - Solano - Stanislaus - Tulare - Ventura.

## California

### *July 7, 2020 – San Francisco*

Effective June 23, 2020, employers with 100 or more workers must adhere to the Temporary Right to Re-employment ordinance, following a layoff due to Covid-19. The ordinance issues a right to re-employment for certain employees laid off due to the COVID-19 pandemic if their employer seeks to fill the same position previously held by the laid-off worker, or a substantially similar position.

## California

### *June 30, 2020 – Disneyland*

Originally scheduled to reopen on July 17, 2020, the Park's reopening will be delayed until government approval is received.

## California

### *June 30, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, Gov. Gavin Newsome closes bars, breweries and pubs in the following counties: Fresno, Imperial, Kern, Kings, Los Angeles, San Joaquin and Tulare.

## California

*June 23, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, the California Department of Public Health announced that all individuals are required to use a face covering. An employee is required to wear a face covering in the workplace unless they are in a workspace that is not open to or visited by individuals and they are maintaining proper physical distancing (at least 6 feet). *June 23, 2020 – Los Angeles County*

*June 2, 2020 – Long Beach*

Effective immediately, employers with 500 or more employees are required to provide paid supplemental sick leave to employees affected by Covid-19.

## California

*June 2, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, employees and customers at reopening hair salons/barbershops are required to wear face coverings that cover the mouth and nose. Services that would require the removal of such face coverings are prohibited.

*June 2, 2020 – San Diego County*

Effective immediately:

- Any individual over the age of two must wear a face covering whenever they are in a business or within six feet of another person who is not a member of their family or household. All essential businesses that allow members of the public to enter a facility must prepare and post a "Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol" policy.
- The Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol policy must be posted at or near the entrance of the relevant facility, and shall be easily viewable by the public and employees. A copy of the Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol must also be provided to each employee performing work at the facility.
- All reopened businesses, with the exception of restaurants providing dine-in services, must prepare and post a "Safe Reopening Plan."
- Restaurants providing dine-in services must prepare and post a "COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol."
- Employees working at essential and reopened business are required to wear face coverings and be subject to temperature screening.

Effective immediately, Covid-19-related illnesses will be considered to have arisen out of, and in-the-course-of, employment for the purposes of awarding workers' compensation benefits if the following criteria are met:

- The employee tested positive for, or was diagnosed with, COVID- 19 within 14 days after a day that the employee performed labor or services at the employee's place of employment, at the employer's direction, and taking place after March 19, 2020.
- The employee's place of business is not his/her home or residence.

The diagnosis was provided by a physician or surgeon with a California Medical Board license.

Effective January 1, 2021, employers with 16 or more employees must begin accruing at least one hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours worked, up to 48 hours total.

## Colorado

*July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 16, 2020, Gov. Jared Polis issued an executive order mandating that all individuals, statewide and over the age of 10, wear face coverings.

## Colorado

*July 21, 2020 – Whistleblower Protection*

Effective July 11, 2020, employers are prohibited from discriminating, taking adverse action or retaliating against any employee for raising a concern about health or safety violations, making health emergency related reports regarding health/safety, or wearing personal protective equipment recommended by a federal, State or local public health agency.

## Colorado

*July 14, 2020 – Englewood*

Effective July 9, 2020, individuals are required to wear a face covering when inside a business, government office and public transportation.

## Colorado

*July 14, 2020 – Adams, Arapahoe & Douglas Counties*

The Tri-County Health Department mandated facemasks in public places and business when social distancing cannot be maintained in the three counties. Municipalities have the ability to opt out of the requirement.

## Colorado

*July 7, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective June 30, 2020, Gov. Jared Polis announced that bars and nightclubs would be required to close again. Establishments serving food are permitted to remain open with social distancing requirements in place.

## Colorado

*July 7, 2020 – Boulder County*

The County extends its face covering requirements indefinitely. All individuals over the age of 12 year must wear a face covering whenever in public.

## Colorado

*June 23, 2020 – Paid Sick Leave*

Effective January 1, 2021, the Healthy Families and Workplaces Act gives employees in Colorado basic paid sick leave as well as additional paid sick leave during a public health emergency. Through the Act, an employee can accumulate up to 48 hours of basic paid leave per year. In a public health emergency companies are required to provide to employees a one-time allotment of two weeks additional paid sick leave.

## Colorado

### *June 9, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, Gov. Jared Polis' order allows vulnerable Colorado residents to leave their homes for outside recreation, as long as they wear face coverings and practice social distancing. In addition, short-term rentals, playgrounds and swimming pools are permitted to reopen. Childcare facilities may remain open at full capacity, while personal care services may begin operating at 50 percent capacity.

## Colorado

### *June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, dining rooms are permitted to reopen at 50 percent capacity with a table limit of eight people and tables spaced at least six feet apart.

## Colorado

### *May 19, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, the "Safer at Home Order" has been modified. Moving forward, an employer will have the option to have employees conduct a self-assessment at home for symptoms and temperature prior to coming to work where worksite checks are "not practicable." An employer with more than 50 lives may develop and implement a policy that requires employees to self-screen at home each work day and to report the results to the employer prior to entering their place of work.

## Connecticut

### *March 23, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective March 19, 2021, Gov. Ned Lamont [changed restrictions](#) for restaurants, offices, and personal care service businesses allowing them to operate at full capacity. Gatherings at private residences can move to 25 individuals indoors or 100 outdoors. Social gatherings at commercial venues can expand to 100 individuals indoors or 200 outdoors.

## Connecticut

### *March 23, 2021 – Travel Restrictions*

Effective March 19, 2021, Gov. Ned Lamont [changed](#) the State's travel restrictions from required to recommended guidance. Visitors and returning residents are no longer required to self-quarantine for 10 days or provide a negative COVID-19 test upon entering the State.

### *March 16, 2021 – Travel Restrictions*

On March 15, 2021, Gov. Ned Lamont announced that effective March 19, 2021, the State's travel advisory mandate would end. Travelers to the State will no longer be required to provide a negative test or to quarantine for 10 days.

Effective December 17, 2020, visitors from the following states are not required to adhere to Covid-19 restrictions.

## Connecticut

### *December 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective November 26, 2020, Gov Ned Lamont increased the fine that a business may receive (up to \$10,000) for not adhering to reopening rules.

### *November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 16, 2020, Gov. Ned Lamont announced that Vermont had been added to their travel restriction list.

*November 24, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective November 23, 2020, The Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD) requires all fitness centers/gyms to require that all patrons wear a facial mask. Group fitness, dance studios, yoga and martial arts centers may conduct classes if they operate at a 25% capacity and maintain social distancing protocols.

Any outdoor venue hosting more than 150 people must still have a plan approved by DPH to mitigate spread of COVID-19. Outdoor venues with fire occupancy restrictions and with less than 100,000 square feet of public space must limit occupancy to 75 percent of stated fire capacity.

On February 19, 2021, Gov. John Carney approved the [Omnibus Emergency Order](#) expanding the capacity of gatherings at businesses and other indoor spaces to a maximum of 25 people or 50% of the stated fire occupancy restrictions, whichever is less. Organizers may submit a plan to the Division of Public Health (DPH) to host larger events up to 150 people. Outdoor gatherings are limited to 50 people, or up to 250 with an approved plan from DPH. Businesses with greater than 100,000 square feet are limited to 20% of stated fire capacity. A first violation of the restrictions will result in an immediate civil fine. A second violation will result in closure, until the establishment submits a reopening plan approved by DPH.

*November 3, 2020 – City of Venice*

On October 27, 2020, the City Council voted not to continue with its facial mask ordinance.

## Florida

*November 3, 2020 – Pinellas County*

On October 27, 2020, the County Commissioners extended the Covid-19 state-of-emergency for an additional week.

## Florida

*November 3, 2020 – City of Jacksonville*

On October 27, 2020, Mayor Lenny Curry announced the extension of the City's facial mask mandate through November 27, 2020.

## Florida

*October 27, 2020 – Pinellas County*

On October 20, 2020, the County Commissioners extended the Covid-19 state-of-emergency for an additional week.

## Florida

*October 27, 2020 – City of Pensacola*

On October 22, 2020, the City Council extended its facial mask requirement through December 10, 2020.

## Florida

*October 20, 2020 – Martin County*

On October 13, 2020, the County Commissioners voted to discontinue the county's facial mask requirement.

## Florida

*October 13, 2020 – City of Lakeland*

On October 5, 2020, the City's mask mandate expired.

## Florida

*October 13, 2020 – City of St. Augustine*

On September 29, the City announced that businesses are no longer required to enforce a facial mask mandate.

*October 13, 2020 – Nassau County*

On October 7, 2020, the Board of County Commissioners voted to terminate its facial mask mandate.

## Florida

*October 13, 2020 – City of Miami*

On October 9, 2020, Mayor Francis Suarez announced that restaurants were permitted to operate at 100 percent capacity with social distancing guidelines in place. In addition, restaurants may also have up to ten individuals per table.

## Florida

*October 13, 2020 – Manatee County*

On September 29, 2020, the County Commissioners voted to eliminate its facial mask mandate.

## Florida

*October 13, 2020 – City of Cocoa Beach*

On October 5, 2020, the City Commission announced that the City's face mask mandate would not be continued.

## Florida

*October 13, 2020 – City of Winter Haven*

On October 7, 2020, the City Commission announced that the City's face mask mandate would not be continued.

## Florida

*October 13, 2020 – City of Fernandina Beach*

On October 6, 2020, the City Commission approved an extension of its facial covering mandate for an additional 30 days.

## Florida

*October 13, 2020 – City of Lakeland*

On October 5, 2020, the City Commissioners did not renew the City's facial mask requirement that had been in place since July.



## Florida

*October 6, 2020 – Pinellas County*

On October 1, 2020, County Administrator Barry A. Burton announced that the County's State of Local Emergency for COVID-19 is extended through October 9, 2020.

## Florida

*September 29, 2020 – Schools*

On September 22, 2020 the Miami-Dade County Public School Board approved in class instruction for pre-kindergarten, kindergarten, first grade and special needs students starting October 14, 2020. The remaining students return on October 21, 2020.

## Florida

*September 29, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 25, 2020, Gov. Ron DeSantis announced that the State would move to Phase 3 of its reopening plan.

## Florida

*September 29, 2020 – Business Operations*

On September 25, 2020, Gov. Ron DeSantis announced that bars and restaurants may operate at full capacity. The order also blocks cities and counties from ordering restaurants to close, unless they can justify a closure for economic or health reasons.

## Florida

*September 29, 2020 – City of Jacksonville*

On September 28, 2020, Mayor Lenny Curry extended the emergency executive proclamation that face coverings be worn (when social distancing isn't possible) in public indoor settings for an additional 30 days.

## Florida

*September 29, 2020 – Palm Beach County*

On September 21, 2020, the County Commissioners extended the County's facial mask requirement until October 22, 2020.

## Florida

*September 29, 2020 – City of Punta Gorda*

On September 22, 2020, the City Council approved an extension of the City's face covering mandate through the Council's next meeting on October 21, 2020.

## Florida

*September 22, 2020 – Winter Haven*

On September 15, 2020, the City Commission voted to extend its mask requirement for an additional 30 days. The ordinance requires the wearing of a facial mask when in a public building.

## Florida

*September 15, 2020 – Business Operations*

On September 14, 2020, bars were permitted to reopen at 50 percent capacity.

## Florida

*September 15, 2020 – Pinellas County*

On September 10, 2020, the Board County Commissioners voted to extend the local state-of-emergency through September 18, 2020.

## Florida

*September 15, 2020 – Lakeland*

On September 8, 2020, the City Council extended its facial covering mandate.

## Florida

*September 8, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 1, 2020, Gov. Ron DeSantis announced that long-term care facilities would be able to reopen to visitors that wear a face covering, pass a temperature check and go through a Covid-19 symptom screening.

## Florida

*September 8, 2020 – Collier County*

On September 3, 2020, the County Commissioners voted to extend its facial covering ordinance until October 22, 2020.

## Florida

*September 8, 2020 – Palm Beach County*

Effective September 8, 2020, the County will begin the process of moving into Phase 2 of the State's reopening plan.

## Florida

*September 1, 2020 – Miami-Dade County*

Effective August 31, 2020, restaurants in the County are permitted to reopen dine-in services at 50 percent capacity.

## Florida

*September 1, 2020 – Nassau County*

The County Board of County Commissioners extended the “state of emergency order,” which calls for every operator, employee, customer or patron over the age of six (of a business establishment) wear a face covering at all times while indoors.

## Florida

*September 1, 2020 – Orange*

On August 25, 2020, the City Council voted to extend its face covering ordinance for an additional 60 days.

## Florida

*August 25, 2020 – Monroe County*

On August 18, 2020, the County Commissioners announced that restaurants would be able to extend their hours by 1 hour (12:00 AM) through Labor Day.

## Florida

*August 25, 2020 – Pinellas County*

On August 20, 2020, the Board of County Commissioners extended their face covering mandate through August 28, 2020.

## Florida

*August 25, 2020 – Sarasota*

On August 19, 2020, the City Commissioners extended their face covering for an additional 60-days.

## Florida

*August 25, 2020 – Ocala*

On August 18, 2020, the City Council updated its face covering ordinance to exclude churches and to allow businesses to request that a customer wear a face mask.

## Florida

*August 18, 2020 – Cocoa*

Effective August 15, 2020, individuals violating the face-covering mandate three times or more are subject to a \$50 fine.

## Florida

*August 18, 2020 – Ocala*

Mayor Kent Guinn has vetoed a mask ordinance approved by the city council on August 4, 2020.

## Florida

*August 18, 2020 – Panama City Beach*

On August 13, 2020, the City's mask mandate was extended until August 28, 2020.

## Florida

*August 11, 2020 – Ocala*

On August 4, 2020, the City Council voted to require face coverings by all individuals over the age of seven when at an indoor location. Individuals not complying with the ordinance will receive a verbal warning for their first violation, a written warning for their second and a \$25 fine for subsequent violations.

## Florida

*August 11, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 5, 2020, Gov. Ron DeSantis announced that Connecticut, New Jersey and New York were removed from the state's quarantine list.

## Florida

*August 4, 2020 – Manatee County*

On July 27, 2020, the County Commission approved a resolution requiring individuals over the age of 6 to wear facemasks in private businesses.

## Florida

*July 28, 2020 – Miami*

The City released new penalties for individuals not wearing a face covering in public.

First Offense: \$50 fine. Second Offense: \$100 fine. Third Offense: \$500 fine.

Additional Offenses: Arrest/Notice to Appear

## Florida

*July 28, 2020 – Jacksonville*

On July 20, 2020, Mayor Lenny Curry announced that face coverings are required for those 6 years or older when in an indoor public space.

## Florida

*July 28, 2020 – Osceola County*

Effective July 24, 2020, individuals 2 years of age or older, not utilizing a face covering, are subject to penalties of \$25-\$50.

## Florida

*July 21, 2020 – Panama City Beach*

Effective July 20, 2020, indoor amusements, restaurants, retail businesses, and bars must operate at 50 percent of their indoor capacity. Employees of the affected businesses are required to wear masks.

## Florida

*July 21, 2020 – Daytona Beach*

Effective July 16, 2020, any individual not wearing a mask and not qualifying for an exemption is subject to a fine of \$50-\$150 depending on the number of violations.

## Florida

*July 14, 2020 – Schools*

The Florida Department of Education announced that schools must physically open for 5 days per week starting August 2020.

## Florida

*July 14, 2020 – Martin County*

Face coverings are required throughout Martin County. A civil fine of \$50-\$250 may be assessed for non-compliance.

## Florida

*July 14, 2020 – St. Lucia County*

Effective immediately, face coverings are required for individuals who are employed and work in restaurants, grocery stores, food service, salons, gyms and other retail establishments, as well as businesses open to the public where social distancing cannot be maintained.

## Florida

*July 14, 2020 – Disney World*

Effective July 15, 2020, visitors will be able to access the parks but are required to wear masks and observe social distancing protocols.

## Florida

*July 7, 2020 – Sarasota*

Effective July 1, 2020, the Sarasota City Commission created an ordinance requiring individuals to wear masks when they are in public.

## Florida

*July 7, 2020 – Indian River County*

Effective immediately, workers serving the public in restaurants and stores are required to wear facial coverings.

## Florida

*July 7, 2020 – Palm Beach, Orange, Seminole, County*

Effective immediately, individuals are required to wear face coverings in public when a social distance cannot be maintained.

## Florida

*July 7, 2020 – Leon County*

Effective immediately, residents and visitors to Leon County are required to wear masks when in public indoor spaces under an emergency declaration. Businesses are required to post signs about the mask requirement.

## Florida

*July 7, 2020 – Jacksonville*

Effective July 29, 2020, individuals over the age of six are required to wear face coverings in public or in any area in which social distancing cannot be maintained.

## Florida

*July 7, 2020 – Lakeland*

The City of Lakeland announced that individuals could be fined for not wearing a face covering.

## Florida

*July 7, 2020 – Miami-Dade County*

Mayor Carlos Gimenez announced that the following businesses be shut down: restaurants (closed dining rooms), gyms, casinos, movie theaters and strip clubs. Masks are required in all public places.

## Florida

*June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On June 25, 2020, Gov. Ron DeSantis confirmed that the State would not be moving forward in its reopening process. In addition, the Department of Business and Professional Regulation suspended the drinking of alcohol at bars.

## Florida

*June 30, 2020 – Hillsborough, Pasco and Pinellas Counties*

Effective immediately, these counties require face coverings in most indoor settings where social distancing (six feet) cannot be maintained. The ordinances suggest that companies create a health and safety plan requiring face coverings and abide by Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines.

## Florida

*June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, visitors from Louisiana do not have to abide by a 14-day self-quarantine. The quarantine stays in effect for visitors from Connecticut, New Jersey and New York.

## Florida

*June 9, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, with the exception of Broward, Miami-Dade and Palm Beach counties, the following businesses are permitted to reopen at 50 percent capacity: movie theaters, bowling alleys and bars with service only for seated customers, full capacity outdoors and 50 percent indoors. Louisiana has been taken off the list of states in which visitors to Florida must self-isolate.

## Florida

*May 19, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, restaurants may operate at 50 percent capacity up from 25 percent. Fitness Centers will be allowed to reopen with social distancing guidelines while museums and libraries at 50 percent of capacity. In addition, theme parks may begin submitting their reopening plans for approval.

*April 20, 2021 – Cherokee County*

The County announced that their online portal was available for residents looking for rental assistance due to the Coronavirus. [Click here to apply.](#)

*April 13, 2021 – Chatham County*

On April 6, 2021, the County Council extended its mask mandate through April 30, 2021.

## Georgia

*April 13, 2021 – City of Savannah*

On April 8, 2021, the City Council extended its mask requirement through May 6, 2021.

## Georgia

*April 6, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 31, 2021, Gov. Brian Kemp [extended](#) the State's public health emergency until April 30, 2021.

## Georgia

*April 6, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective April 8, 2021, Gov. Brian Kemp's [executive order](#) eliminates the gathering and shelter-in-place requirements. In addition, law enforcement is prohibited from closing businesses and organizations that do not comply with COVID-19 restrictions.

## Georgia

*March 16, 2021 – City of Savannah*

On March 11, 2021, the City Council approved an extension of its mask mandate through April 6, 2021.



## Georgia

*March 9, 2021 – Chatham County*

Effective March 8, 2021, the County Commissioners extend their State of Emergency until April 6, 2021, requiring that individuals wear a facial covering in public.

## Georgia

*March 2, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 26, 2021, Gov. Brian Kemp extended the state of emergency.

## Georgia

*February 23, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 15, 2021, Gov. Brian Kemp [announced an order](#) requiring restaurants and other non-critical businesses to ensure that ventilation systems operate properly and increase circulation and purify air within facilities as practicable.

## Georgia

*February 16, 2021 – City of Savannah*

On February 11, 2021, the City Council renewed its mask mandate until March 7, 2021. Non-compliance with the mandate can bring a fine of up to \$500.

## Georgia

*February 2, 2021 – Chatham County*

On January 29, 2021, the Board of Commissioners Chairman Chester Ellis extended the County mask mandate.

## Georgia

*January 26, 2021 – Business Operations*

On January 22, 2021, Gov. Brian Kemp announced that healthcare workers (physician assistants, nurses, medical assistants) are not required to be directly supervised to administer the COVID-19 vaccine.

## Georgia

*January 26, 2021 – Butts County*

On January 15, 2021 the Board of Commissioners enacted a mask requirement for all individuals. The mandate will remain in place until the Board votes to terminate it.

## Georgia

*January 26, 2021 – City of Atlanta*

On January 22, 2021, Superintendent of Atlanta Public Schools announced a delay in beginning in class instruction. Grades 3–5 will return on February 8, 2021. Grades 6–12 will return on February 16, 2021.

## Georgia

*January 19, 2021 – City of Atlanta*

On January 25, 2021, Pre-K, grades 1 and 2, and special education students will be permitted to attend in-school classes. Beginning February 1, 2021 Grades 3–12 will be able to return for in-class sessions.

## Georgia

*January 12, 2021 – City of Rome*

On January 8, 2021, the City Commission approved an extension of its mask requirement until February 7, 2021.

## Georgia

*December 15, 2020 – City of Atlanta*

On December 7, 2020, the City Council approved an ordinance allowing restaurants and bars to provide seating on city streets. On-street dining is permitted Sunday through Thursday, from 7 a.m. - 11 p.m., and on Friday and Saturday, from 7 a.m. - 12 a.m. Permits are still required.

## Georgia

*December 15, 2020 – City of Albany*

On December 9, 2020, the City Commission extended its mask ordinance for individuals over the age of ten.

## Georgia

*December 15, 2020 – City of Rome*

On December 10, 2020, the City Commission issued an order that face masks be worn when individuals are in public.

## Georgia

*December 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 1, 2020, Gov. Brian Kemp extended the “state of emergency” through January 8, 2021.

## Georgia

### *November 17, 2020 – Safety Requirements*

On November 14, 2020, Gov. Brian Kemp issued an executive order that maintains the gathering limit to 50 individuals. Local governments are still permitted to enact their own facial covering policies.

## Georgia

### *November 17, 2020 – City of Savannah*

On November 14, 2020, the City Council voted to extend the City's mask mandate through December 10, 2020.

## Georgia

### *November 3, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 30, 2020, Gov. Brian Kemp extended the State's health emergency until December 9, 2020 and the state's Covid-19 emergency order through November 15, 2020.

## Georgia

### *October 27, 2020 – City of Columbus*

On October 22, 2020, Mayor Skip Henderson announced that enforcement of the City's mask requirement would be terminated.

## Georgia

### *October 20, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 15, 2020, Gov. Brian Kemp extended his Covid-19 executive order through October 31, 2020.

## Georgia

### *September 22, 2020 – Business Operations*

On September 15, 2020, Gov. Brian Kemp issued an order setting up a three-phase system for in-person nursing home visits based on the rate of coronavirus testing, the length of time the home has gone without a new case and community spread.

## Georgia

### *September 8, 2020 – Albany*

On September 3, 2020, the City Commission voted to approve facial coverings for individuals in public places where social distancing is not possible. Those who do not comply can face a fine of \$25 for a first offense and \$50 for subsequent offenses.

## Georgia

*September 1, 2020 – Baldwin County*

On August 25, 2020, the County Board of Commissioners voted to require face coverings for individuals over the age of 10 when in public. Violators will receive one warning then receive a fine of \$25 for a first offense and a \$50 fine for the next offense.

## Georgia

*September 1, 2020 – Bibb County*

On August 24, 2020, the County Commissioners mandated that all individuals two years of age and older wear a face mask when in a government building and when out in public, when social distancing cannot be maintained.

## Georgia

*August 25, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 15, 2020, Gov. Brian Kemp issued an executive order giving local governments the ability to enact face covering ordinances. In addition, the order limits fines to individuals to \$50 and prevents businesses from being subjected to penalties.

## Georgia

*August 25, 2020 – Baldwin County*

On August 24, 2020, the Board of Commissioners approved an ordinance requiring members of the public to wear a face covering or mask within the County. After a warning, violators face a \$50 fine for non-adherence.

## Georgia

*August 25, 2020 – Athens*

On August 18, 2020, the Athens-Clarke County Mayor and Commission mandated that individuals over the age of 10 wear facemasks in public spaces.

## Georgia

*August 25, 2020 – Columbus*

On August 21, 2020, Mayor Skip Henderson issued an emergency order requiring individuals to wear a face covering. Violation of the order can result in a \$50 fine.

## Georgia

*August 25, 2020 – Newton County*

Effective August 19, 2020, all individuals over the age of 8 are required to wear a face covering in the unincorporated sections of the county.

## Georgia

*August 25, 2020 – Sandy Springs*

On August 20, 2020, the City Council passed a measure that mandates that businesses that do not require masks within their facilities post a clearly legible sign in one-inch Arial font at all public entrances stating, "This location does not require the use of masks or facial coverings upon this property." In addition, individuals are required to wear a face-mask when in an entity or public place and social distancing is not possible.

## Georgia

*August 18, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On Aug. 15, Gov. Brian Kemp's executive order allowing local governments to enact face covering mandates was signed.

## Georgia

*August 18, 2020 – Rockdale County*

On August 12, 2020, the County made it mandatory for all individuals over the age of eight to wear a face covering in public. Employers are prohibited from forcing an employee to not utilize a mask unless it prevents the worker from performing an essential job function.

## Georgia

*August 11, 2020 – Workplace Liability*

On August 5, 2020, Georgia Gov. Brian Kemp signed the Covid-19 Pandemic Business Safety Act. The Act provides immunity to businesses, healthcare facilities and employees from Covid-19 litigation unless the claimant proves that the actions of the defendant showed "gross negligence, willful and wanton misconduct, reckless infliction of harm, or intentional infliction of harm."

## Georgia

*August 11, 2020 – Atlanta*

Atlanta Public Schools has pushed the start of the class year to August 24, 2020.

## Georgia

*August 11, 2020 – Augusta*

On July 5, 2020, Mayor Hardie Davis announced that they will no longer issue warnings to businesses in regard to safety precautions. Businesses will be cited for infractions. A business receiving two or more citations may be shut down.

## Georgia

*August 4, 2020 – Athens*

Effective July 31, 2020, restaurants and bars must stop selling alcohol after 9:00 p.m. The City will credit/refund half of the establishments pro-rated monthly license fee to every license holder for each month that this remains in effect.

## Georgia

*August 4, 2020 – Chatham County*

Effective August 1, 2020, all individuals must wear a face mask when in a public space, commercial business and in gatherings of 10 or more people.

## Georgia

*July 28, 2020 – Bibb County*

On July 21, 2020, the County Board of Commissioners requires individuals over the age of 10 to wear a face covering when outside of their vehicle or home. Individuals can be fined for not wearing a mask.

## Georgia

*July 21, 2020 – DeKalb*

On July 14, 2020, the County Board of Commissioners enacted a face-covering requirement for unincorporated sections of the County. The ordinance includes a warning for initial violations and a \$250 fine for additional violations.

## Georgia

*July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 15, 2020, Gov. Brian Kemp issued an executive order prohibiting local governments from creating face-covering ordinances.

## Georgia

*July 14, 2020 – Atlanta*

On July 8, 2020, Mayor Keisha Lance Bottoms announced that masks are required to be worn by individuals when in a public space.

## Georgia

*July 7, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On June 29, 2020, Gov. Brian Kemp extended the State's social distancing rules for an additional two weeks. In addition, the public health emergency has been extended to August 11, 2020.

## Georgia

*July 7, 2020 – Savannah*

Effective July 1, 2020, Mayor Van Johnson mandated that individuals wear masks when in public.

## Georgia

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, bars, nightclubs, overnight summer camps, professional sports, and amateur sports are permitted to open (25 people maximum).

## Hawaii

*April 13, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On April 9, 2021, Gov. David Ige extended the State's COVID-19 [emergency order](#) through June 8, 2021.

## Hawaii

*April 13, 2021 – Kauai County*

Effective immediately, travelers are no longer required to quarantine for 10 days without a negative COVID-19 test. However, visitors can take a free test when they arrive. Those that take the test receive the [Kauai Card](#).

## Hawaii

*February 23, 2021 – City of Honolulu*

On February 15, 2021, Mayor Rick Blangiardi announced an extension of the City's COVID-19 restrictions until March 15, 2021.

## Hawaii

*February 2, 2021 – Travel Restrictions*

Effective February 5, 2021, travelers from Korea will no longer be required to quarantine if they have taken and passed a COVID-19 test with 72 hours of departure.

## Hawaii

*February 2, 2021 – City/County Honolulu*

The Immediate Response Incentive Mastercard (City Card) program is being expanded to give individuals extra time to spend the preloaded \$500 to be spent at grocery and convenient stores.

## Hawaii

### *December 22, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective December 17, 2020, Gov. David Ige's executive order takes place reducing the quarantine period for inter-island visitors and out of state travelers to ten days.

## Hawaii

### *December 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective December 2, 2020, Gov. David Ige announced that intercounty and out-of-state travelers arriving in Kauai are required to self-quarantine for 14 days regardless of a negative test result.

## Hawaii

### *November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 16, 2020, Gov. David Ige issued COVID-19 an emergency proclamation that extends and clarifies the statewide mask mandate as agreed to by all four counties and the state. The proclamation requires a face covering to be worn when in public. Businesses should refuse admission or service to any individual who fails to wear a face covering. Hotel operators must adopt a COVID-19 Health and Safety Plan for each property. The plan must address guidance from the CDC, identify measures enacted in response to COVID-19 and what guests/employees may expect in terms of service, accommodations and safety protocols.

## Hawaii

### *November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 19, 2020, Gov. David Ige announced that trans-Pacific travelers to the state are required to present proof of a negative coronavirus test on arrival to avoid the state's 14-day self-quarantine requirement. Moving forward, travelers cannot submit test results after they arrive.

## Hawaii

### *November 3, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 27, 2020, Gov. David Ige announced that visitors from Japan would not have to quarantine for 14-days if they present a negative Covid-19 test. The test would have to be taken 3 days prior to entry.



## Hawaii

### *October 20, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective October 15, 2020, visitors to the state have the ability to provide negative COVID-19 test results (within 72 hours) upon entry and are not required to abide by the 14-day quarantine requirement.

## Hawaii

### *October 20, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 13, 2020, Gov. David Ige signed a supplementary emergency proclamation extending the emergency period until November 30, 2020.

## Hawaii

### *September 29, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 23, 2020, Gov. David Ige signed the State's 13th supplementary emergency proclamation to extend the Covid-19 emergency period until October 31, 2020.

## Hawaii

### *September 22, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective October 15, 2020, visitors to the State that present a negative COVID-19 test (taken within 72 hours of arrival) can avoid the 14-day quarantine requirement.

### *September 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective September 1, 2020, out-of-state visitors and inter-state travelers are required to complete a safe travels application online. [Click here to view or complete.](#)

Effective August 27, 2020, residents must stay at home for the next two weeks as Mayor Kirk Caldwell implemented a "Stay at Home" order. All travel, including, but not limited to, travel on foot, bicycle, scooter, motorcycle, automobile, or public transit, except for "Essential Travel and Essential Activities" is prohibited.

### *August 25, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 18, 2020, Gov. David Ige announced that Out-of-State visitors are required to self-quarantine for 14 days through September.

On August 20, 2020, Gov. David Ige, announced the extension of the State's Covid-19 emergency period until September 30, 2020.

### *August 11, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective August 11, 2020, Individuals traveling to the counties of Kaua'i, Hawai'i, Maui, and Kalawao must self-quarantine for 14 days upon arrival.

## Hawaii

### *August 4, 2020 – Oahu*

On July 31, 2020, Mayor Kirk Caldwell announced that bars are to closed for the next three weeks. Restaurants may not sell or serve alcohol to customers after 10 p.m.

## Hawaii

### *July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Gov. David Ige announced a quarantine extension for out-of-state travelers. Visitors are required to quarantine when arriving in the State through September 1, 2020.

## Hawaii

### *June 30 ,2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective August 1, 2020, out-of-state travelers are not required to self-quarantine for 14 days if they provide proof of a recent negative coronavirus test.

### *June 23, 2020 – Oahu County*

Effective June 19, 2020, arcades, bars, bowling alleys, fitness facilities and outdoor team sports are permitted to reopen.

### *June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, the State's mandatory 14-day quarantine for those traveling to Hawaii from international or out-of-state locations has been extended through July 31, 2020. The National Guard will check passengers' temperatures arriving through Daniel K. Inouye International Airport.

Effective June 19, 2020, bars, bowling alleys and movie theaters will reopen.

*June 9, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective June 16, 2020, the 14-day self-quarantine requirement for inter-island travelers is scheduled to be eliminated. Restrictions on out-of-state travel will remain in effect. Commercial and recreational boats can now carry up to 10 people.

Effective immediately, medium-risk businesses and activities can restart under state guidelines. Kauai provided for the immediate reopening of pools, religious services, outdoor tours, salons, barbershops, cleaning and construction, and one-on-one personal services (such as fitness classes, tutoring, and music lessons).

On April 1, 2021, the City Council approved an extension of the City's mask requirement through the month of June.

On February 19, 2021, the Central District Health Board terminated the County's mask mandate.

On February 19, 2021, the Central District Health Board terminated the County's mask mandate.

*February 16, 2021 – Bonneville County*

On February 8, 2021, the Health Board agreed to remove the County's mask requirement. The County had reached two weeks straight with less than 15 active cases per 10,000 people.

## Idaho

*February 9, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 2, 2021, Gov. Brad Little transitioned the State into Stage 3 of its reopening plan. Up to 50 individuals may now attend a gathering.

## Idaho

*November 24, 2020 – City of Boise*

On November 23, 2020, Mayor Lauren McLean announced a health order takes effect. Businesses can have their license suspended for up to 10 days for a first violation, 20 days for the second and a year revocation on a third violation.

*November 3, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 26, 2020, Gov. Brad Little, signed a statewide public health order moving the State into a modified Stage 3 of their reopening plan. Indoor gatherings are limited to 50 people and outdoor gatherings are limited to 25 percent capacity.

Effective October 26, 2020, the city council's enacted mask mandate took effect for a period of 90 days. Violators of the mask mandate may be subject to a \$100 fine.

On October 22, 2020, The Panhandle Health District board voted to rescind the facemask mandate in Kootenai County.

## Idaho

*October 20, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 15, 2020, Gov. Brad Little announced that the state would remain in stage 4 of its reopening plan for an additional two weeks.

## Idaho

*October 20, 2020 – City of Boise*

On October 14, 2020, Mayor Lauren McLean extended the ordinance that allows businesses on 8th Street to extend their patio dining areas into the street.

*October 6, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 1, 2020, Gov. Brad Little announced that the State would remain in Phase Four for an additional two weeks.

*September 22, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 14, 2020, an order of restriction was announced by the District Board of Health. All individuals over the age of two are required to wear a face covering when social distancing is not possible. On September 14, 2020, an order of restriction was announced by the District Board of Health. All individuals are required to wear a face covering by individual over the age of two when social distancing is not possible. ### *September 8, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 3, 2020, Gov. Brad Little announced that the State would remain in Stage 4 of the Idaho Rebounds Plan.

### *August 25, 2020 – Unemployment Benefits*

On August 17, 2020, Gov. Brad Little announced that the State of Idaho will participate in the Trump Administration's plan to offer extended unemployment benefits. Under the new program, citizens receiving a weekly benefit amount of at least \$100 and who self-certify they are unemployed due to COVID-19 will receive the extra \$300 per week. The Governor intends to seek five weeks of assistance and will evaluate again after that point.

### *August 25, 2020 – Business Operations*

On August 21, 2020, Gov. Brad Little announced that the State would remain at Phase 4 of its reopening plan for the next two weeks.

On July 21, 2020, all individuals are required to wear a face covering when in a public place when other non-household members are present and physical distancing of 6 feet cannot be maintained.

*July 28, 2020 – Kootenai County*

On July 23, 2020, the Health District's Board of Health mandated that every person over the age of 2, is required to wear a face covering that completely covers the person's nose and mouth when in a public place and physical distancing of 6 feet cannot be maintained.

## Idaho

*July 28, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 23, 2020, Governor Brad Little announced that the State would remain in Phase 4 of its reopening plan.

## Idaho

*July 7, 2020 – Boise*

Effective immediately, Mayor Lauren McLean announced that individuals in the City of Boise would be required to wear a face covering in public.

*June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective June 25, 2020, Gov. Brad Little will keep the State in Phase 4 due to the failure to meet certain metrics.

An Idaho employer can apply for the bonuses for their eligible employees on a first come first served basis until funds are depleted. Awards will be \$1,500 for full-time work, minimum of 30 hours per week, and \$750 for part-time work, minimum of 20 hours per week, over the four weeks following return to work. The Illinois Department of Labor released [guidance](#) on compensation/paid leave for employees receiving the COVID-19 Vaccine. Under the Illinois Minimum Wage Law (IMWL) and the federal Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), if an employer requires employees to get vaccinated, the time the employee spends obtaining the vaccine is likely compensable, even if it is non-working time.

On February 9, 2021, Mayor Lori Lightfoot announced that restaurants would now be able to accommodate up to 50 individuals per room.

On February 2, 2021, Region 4 (Bond, Clinton, Madison, Monroe, Randolph, St. Clair, and Washington counties) transitioned from Tier 1 mitigation to Phase 4.

*January 26, 2021 – City of Springfield*

On January 20, 2021, the City Council extended its mask requirement and non-adherence fines. In addition, bars may now remain open until 1:00 a.m. while obeying State health guidelines.

On January 23, 2021, the Department of Health announced that restaurants and bars that serve food may reopen for indoor dining. Capacity is limited to 25% or 25 individuals.

*January 19, 2021 – City of Peoria*

On January 12, 2021, the City Council approved a 50% fee reduction for liquor licenses and video gaming license renewal in certain cases.

*January 19, 2021 – City of East Dubuque*

On January 12, 2021, the City Council voted to allow businesses to serve customers in parking spaces beginning May 1, 2021 through October 24, 2021.

*January 19, 2021 – Macon County*

On January 14, 2021, the County Board voted to allow businesses to open up at 25% capacity as long as social distancing protocols are practiced.

*January 12, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On January 4, 2021, Gov. JB Pritzker announced that the State was extending its mask mandate for an additional 150 days.

*December 22, 2020 – Jackson County*

On December 14, 2020, the County Board voted to give the Jackson County Health Department the ability to enforce orders/directives from the Illinois Department of Public Health effective January 1, 2021.

### *November 24, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective November 20, 2020, Gov. J.B. Pritzker mandated that indoor services at bars and restaurants were prohibited. Fitness centers/gyms may not provide indoor classes. Retail establishments have a maximum capacity of 25%. Casinos and museums must cease operations.

### *November 24, 2020 – City of Springfield*

On November 17, 2020, the City Council approved an addendum to its mask mandate, moving forward, facial coverings must be worn in all indoor places. Effective November 11, 2020, Gov. J.B. Pritzker's mitigations take effect for Region 5 (Southern Illinois), Region 7 (Wil & Kankakee counties) and Region 8 (Kane & DuPage). Bars and restaurants are required to reduce party size to 6 people and the indoor/outdoor gathering size maximum is 10 individuals.

## Illinois

### *November 17, 2020 – City of Chicago*

Effective November 13, 2020, the City's Emergency Travel Order took place creating categories for states (Yellow, Orange, Red). Individuals arriving from red state are required to quarantine for 14 days. Those traveling from a state classified as orange are required to test negative for COVID-19 within 72 hours prior to their arrival in Chicago or quarantine for 14-days. Those arriving from a yellow state are not subject to a quarantine or COVID-19 testing.

On November 4, 2020, the City Council mandated that facial coverings be worn in all retail establishments or be subjected to a fine. Fines are up to \$50 for an individual and up to \$500 for a business.

Effective October 28, 2020, Gov. JB Pritzker, put mitigation measures in place for Regions 4 (Metro East) and 10 (Suburban Cook County). Measures were enacted for Regions 9 and 11 (City of Chicago) on October 30, 2020. Bars and restaurants are prohibited from serving customers indoors and must close by 11:00 p.m., while tables must be six feet apart and all guests are required to have a reservation. Effective November 1, 2020, Region 3 and on November 2, 2020, Region 6, bars and restaurants are prohibited from offering indoor service while outdoor service will have to close by 11 p.m. Gatherings are limited to 25 people or 25 percent of a room's capacity.

On November 25, 2020, Gov. John Bel Edwards announced that restaurants, retailers, gyms, personal care businesses, and movie theaters are limited to 50% capacity. Bars are permitted to remain open at a 25% capacity if they are in a parish that has a positivity rate of 5% or less. Indoor and outdoor gatherings are limited to 25% capacity or a maximum of 75 individuals indoors or 150 people outdoors.

## Louisiana

### *November 10, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 5, 2020, Gov. John Bel Edwards announced that the State would remain in Phase 3 and keep its current COVID-19 mitigation measures in place for another 28 days.

## Louisiana

### *October 27, 2020 – City of New Orleans*

On October 22, 2020, Mayor LaToya Cantrell announced that she had instructed the police to issue citations to individuals not wearing a face mask. The maximum fine amount is \$500.

## Louisiana

### *October 13, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 8, 2020, Gov. John Bel Edwards announced that the State would remain in Phase 3 of its reopening plan until November 6, 2020.

## Louisiana

### *October 13, 2020 – Assumption Parish*

On October 7, 2020, bars in the Parish are permitted to reopen due to positive health benchmarks being met.

## Louisiana

*October 13, 2020 – Vermilion Parish*

On October 7, 2020, bars in the Parish are permitted to reopen due to positive health benchmarks being met.

## Louisiana

*October 6, 2020 – Iberia Parish*

On September 30, 2020, Louisiana Department of Health made the parish eligible to have bars reopen.

## Louisiana

*October 6, 2020 – St. Martin Parish*

On September 30, 2020, Louisiana Department of Health made the parish eligible to have bars reopen.

## Louisiana

*September 29, 2020 – Jefferson Parrish*

Effective September 23, 2020, bars in the Parish may resume operations at 25 percent capacity or 50 customers total indoors. Outdoor seating cannot not exceed 50 customers.

## Louisiana

*September 22, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective September 18, 2020, in parishes in which bars are permitted to operate, bars, restaurants and casinos can provide alcoholic beverages onsite until 11 p.m.

## Louisiana

*September 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective September 11, 2020, the State (with the exception of New Orleans), will enter a modified Phase 3 reopening, with bars allowed to reopen at 25 percent capacity (with a maximum of 50 people) if their parish's positivity rate remains at or below 5 percent for 14 days.

## Louisiana

*September 15, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective September 11, 2020, restaurants, churches, salons, spas, and gyms are allowed to expand their capacity to 75 percent.



## Louisiana

### *September 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective August 28, 2020, Phase 2 of the State's reopening plan is extending for an additional two weeks.

## Louisiana

### *August 18, 2020 – Unemployment Benefits*

On August 13, 2020, Gov. John Bel Edwards announced that the State has filed paperwork necessary to distribute the federal unemployment benefit extension of \$300 per week.

## Louisiana

### *August 11, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 4, 2020, Gov. John Bel Edwards announced that he would extend his Phase Two order, including the statewide mask mandate including the closure of bars to on-site consumption and crowd size limits of no more than 50 people for at least another 21 days.

## Louisiana

### *July 28, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 21, 2020, Gov. John Bel Edwards on Tuesday announced that he will extend Louisiana's current Phase Two order, which also includes a statewide mask mandate, limits indoor social gatherings to 50 people and prohibits on-premise consumption of alcohol at bars for another two weeks.

## Louisiana

### *July 21, 2020 – Schools*

The Louisiana State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education approved reopening guidelines that would require students and staff, grades 3-12, to wear face coverings.

## Louisiana

### *July 14, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective July 13, 2020, Gov. John Bel Edwards issued an executive proclamation requiring individuals to wear a facemask when visiting an indoor or outdoor public space. A parish can opt out if they have fewer than 100 cases per 100,000 people for the past two weeks. Gatherings are limited to 50 individuals or fewer.

## Louisiana

### *June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, Gov. John Bel Edwards announced the State would remain in Phase 2 due to a rise in Covid-19 cases.

## Louisiana

### *June 23, 2020 – Workplace Immunity*

Retroactive to March 11, 2020, HB 826 provides for the limitation of liability due to the Covid-19 public health emergency. An employee that acquires COVID-19 in the workplace has no tort remedy against the employer unless the virus was contracted through an intentional act (the business failed to properly comply with the applicable COVID-19 procedures established by the federal, state or local agency that governs the business).

## Louisiana

### *June 9, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, as the State moves into Phase 2, the following business will be permitted to open at 50 percent capacity: aquariums, bars and breweries (food permits), barbershops, bowling alleys, esthetician services, event centers, fitness centers, gyms, movie theaters, museums, outdoor playgrounds, racetracks (no spectators), restaurants, shopping malls and zoos.

## Louisiana

### *June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective June 5, 2020, the State is expected to enter Phase 2. Restaurants, malls, gyms/fitness centers, barbershops and nail salons, movie theaters, racetracks (without spectators), museums, zoos, aquariums, bars/breweries (food permits), massage establishments, spas, tattoo parlors, esthetician services, pool halls, bowling alleys, skating rinks, event centers, wedding venues, and outdoor playgrounds are permitted to open at a maximum 50 percent capacity.

## Maine

### *April 20, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On April 14, 2021, Gov. Janet Mills extended the [State of Civil Emergency](#) until May 13, 2021.

## Maine

*March 30, 2021 – Business Operations*

On March 24, 2021, the State of Maine updated the [Seated Food and Drink Service Checklist](#).

In addition, outdoor entertainment venues were permitted to operate at 75% capacity on March 26, 2021 and will be able to fully reopen May 24, 2021.

## Maine

*March 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 17, 2021, Gov. Janet Mills [extended](#) the state-of-civil-emergency until April 15, 2021.

## Maine

*March 9, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 5, 2021, Gov. Janet Mills announced the reopening plan, "[Moving Maine Forward](#)."

## Maine

*March 9, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective March 26, 2021, Gov. Janet Mills permits indoor venues the ability to host 50% of its permanent capacity. It is set to increase to 75% on May 24th, 2021.

## Maine

*February 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 17, 2021, Gov. Janet Mills extended the [State of Civil Emergency](#) through March 18, 2021.

## Maine

*February 2, 2021 – Business Operations*

On January 28, 2021, Gov. Janet Mills announced that businesses are no longer required to close at 9:00 p.m.

## Maine

*January 26, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On January 19, 2021, Gov. Janet Mills extended the State's COVID-19 emergency order until February 17, 2021.

## Maine

### *January 5, 2021 – Business Operations*

On December 30, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills extended the State's order requiring restaurants, bars, and indoor/outdoor amusement venues to close at 9 p.m.

## Maine

### *December 29, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 22, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills extended the State of Civil Emergency through January 20, 2021.

## Maine

### *December 15, 2020 – Unemployment Benefit*

On December 9, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills announced that the State would provide a one-time \$600 direct payment to individuals through the Pandemic Relief Program (PRP).

## Maine

### *December 15, 2020 – Business Operations*

On December 11, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills announced that owners and operators of all indoor public spaces must refuse access to individuals not wearing a face covering.

## Maine

### *December 8, 2020 – Business Operations*

On December 4, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills announced the continuance of her order requiring all seated food and drink service and indoor and outdoor entertainment venues to close by 9 p.m.

## Maine

### *December 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 24, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills extended the state's civil emergency until December 23, 2020.

## Maine

### *November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective November 16, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills announced that Massachusetts was no longer included in the state's travel restrictions.

## **Maine**

### *November 24, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective November 20, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills placed a mandatory close time for all outdoor and indoor amusement venues, movie theaters, performing arts venues, casinos, and businesses that provide seated food and drink service. Included are social clubs, restaurants, and bars and tasting rooms currently open for outdoor service.

## **Maine**

### *November 10, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective November 4, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills places mitigation policies on the State, limiting indoor gatherings to 50 people. Bars will remain closed. Facial coverings are required in public spaces regardless of social distancing ability.

## **Maine**

### *November 10, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective November 4, 2020, travelers to the State must quarantine for 14 days or present a recent negative test on arrival. Visitors from New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut are required to adhere to the travel restrictions as well.

## **Maine**

### *November 3, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 29, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills extended the State's civil emergency until November 27, 2020.

## **Maine**

### *October 13, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 6, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills expanded her executive order requiring certain businesses to enforce the State's face covering requirement. During the summer months, the enforcement mandate was required only in Maine's coastal counties and more populous cities. It is now required statewide. [A copy of the order can be found here.](#)

## **Maine**

### *October 13, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective October 13, 2020, the State enters Stage 4 of its reopening plan. Under Stage 4, restaurants, movie theaters, and religious gatherings can operate up to a 50 percent capacity or up to 100 individuals. For non-seated indoor activities, such as physical activity in gyms, the limit remains 50 percent, while the limit for outdoor gatherings remains 100. Retailers continue to be subject to the occupancy limit of 5 people per 1,000 square feet of shopping space.

### *September 29, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 22, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills announced that visitors from Massachusetts would no longer be required to test negative or self-quarantine when entering the State.

## **Maine**

### *September 22, 2020 – Paid Leave*

Effective January 1, 2021, an employer with greater than 10 employees is required to provide one hour of paid leave for every 40 hours worked up to 40 hours per year.

## **Maine**

### *September 15, 2020 – Sanford*

On September 10, 2020, the City Council approved an emergency ordinance requiring face-coverings in all public settings where social distancing is not possible.

## **Maine**

### *September 8, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 1, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills announced the extension of the State's "Civil Emergency" through October 1, 2020.

## **Maine**

### *August 25, 2020 – CARES Act*

On August 20, 2020, Gov. Janet Mills announced \$200 million in grant money is being made available to small businesses. The grants come from the Federal CARES ACT Relief fund. For an organization to be eligible, they are required to have 50 employees or contracted employees on its payroll, been in operation for at least one year (as of Aug. 1, 2020), not be in bankruptcy, be in good standing with all taxes and have a Covid-related financial hardship.

## Maine

*July 14, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Gov. Janet Mills, expanded the enforcement provisions for the state's existing face-covering requirement in the following areas: Waldo, Knox, Lincoln, Sagadahoc, Cumberland, York counties and in the cities of Bangor, Brewer, Lewiston, Auburn, and Augusta. The following businesses must ensure face coverings are worn, retail (greater than 50,000 square feet of shopping space), restaurants, outdoor bars and tasting rooms and lodging establishments.

## Maine

*July 7, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Travelers from Connecticut, New Jersey and New York are no longer required to maintain a 14-day quarantine or test policy.

## Maine

*June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, Gov. Janet Mills announced that indoor service at bars would be postponed due to the higher risk of Covid-19. Out-of-state visitors must complete a 14-day quarantine upon arrival in Maine unless they receive a negative Covid-19 test 72 hours prior to entering the State.

## Maine

*June 30, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective July 1, 2020, the following businesses may reopen with a 50-person capacity: personal services, indoor amusement facilities, movie theaters and casinos. Outdoor amusement centers are permitted to reopen with a 25-person capacity.

## Maine

*June 23, 2020 – Androscoggin, Cumberland, and York Counties*

Effective immediately, restaurants may provide dine-in service.

## Maine

*June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, visitors from other states that have proof of a recent negative COVID-19 test will not have to comply with Maine's 14-day self-quarantine requirement.

## Maine

### *June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, visitors from New Hampshire and Vermont will no longer have to abide to a 14-day self-quarantine. Visitors from other states are required to quarantine for 14 days unless they have recently taken a COVID-19 test and tested negative.

## Maine

### *June 9, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective June 12, 2020, tasting rooms, bars (outside service); gym/fitness centers, nail salons; and tattoo and piercing parlors may reopen but not in Androscoggin, Cumberland or York Counties.

## Maine

### *June 2, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, social gatherings must have a maximum limit of 50 people.

## Maine

### *June 2, 2020 – Androscoggin, Cumberland & York Counties*

Effective June 1, 2020, restaurants are limited to outdoor seating only.

## Maine

### *May 26, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, campgrounds are permitted to reopen.

## Maryland

### *March 23, 2021 – Wage Garnishment*

On March 15, 2021, Gov. Larry Hogan signed an [executive order](#) preventing stimulus payments from being garnished. Banks are prevented from using the stimulus payments to satisfy debts that are subject to legal garnishment.

## Maryland

### *March 23, 2021 – City of Baltimore*

Effective March 26, 2021, Mayor Brandon Scott, permits indoor dining to resume at 50% capacity and outdoor dining to increase to 75% capacity.



## Maryland

*March 16, 2021 – Business Operations*

On March 9, 2021, Gov. Larry Hogan [removed](#) capacity limits on the majority of businesses and opened up large indoor and outdoor venues at 50% capacity.

## Maryland

*March 16, 2021 – Travel Restrictions*

On March 9, 2021, Gov. Larry Hogan announced that the state's quarantine requirements for out-of-state travelers would be terminated.

## Maryland

*March 16, 2021 – Anne Arundel County*

On March 10, 2021, County Executive Steuart Pittman announced that he will issue a new executive order that will keep the county's social gathering limits at a maximum of 10 people indoors and 25 people outdoors.

## Maryland

*March 16, 2021 – Howard County*

On March 10, 2021, County Executive Calvin Ball announced that capacity limits on restaurants, retail, religious facilities, fitness centers, and personal services had ended.

## Maryland

*March 2, 2021 – Schools*

On February 23, 2021, Gov. Larry Hogan, announced an order requiring individuals over the age of five to wear a facial mask on school property, including in classrooms, cafeterias, hallways, gyms, buses and auditoriums.

## Maryland

*February 23, 2021 – Grants*

On February 15, 2021 Gov. Larry Hogan signed the Relief Act of 2021, providing \$500 for families and \$300 for individuals. In addition, the act provides tax relief for those on unemployment and small businesses, expanding the earned income tax credit and providing \$100 million in additional grants to businesses and nonprofits. *February 23, 2021 – City of Baltimore*

On February 22, 2021, Mayor Brandon Scott removed the 1-hour maximum time limit for patrons at bars and restaurants.

## **Maryland**

*February 16, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 11, 2021, Gov. Larry Hogan issued an order allowing hospitals and nursing homes to receive visitors effective March 1, 2021.

## **Maryland**

*February 2, 2021 – Business Operations*

On January 28, 2021, Gov. Larry Hogan announced that he was cancelling the statewide curfew on restaurants and bars. Restaurants and bars will no longer be required to close at 10:00 p.m. but may only service up to a 50% capacity.

## **Maryland**

*February 2, 2021 – Schools*

On January 25, 2021, Gov. Larry Hogan announced COVID-19 funding for public (20.7 million) and private schools (35.8 million) in order to assist with reopening.

## **Maryland**

*January 26, 2021 – City of Baltimore*

Effective January 22, 2021, Mayor Brandon Scott allows restaurants to reopen for indoor and outdoor service. Customers are limited to one hour and are required to give their contact information upon entry.

## **Maryland**

*December 22, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 17, 2020, Gov. Larry Hogan issued an order for out-of-state visitors and returning residents to test negative for COVID-19 or self-quarantine for 10 days upon entering the State. In addition, individuals should refrain from attending public and private gatherings of more than 10 people in one location and should practice physical distancing to the maximum extent possible.

## **Maryland**

*December 15, 2020 – City of Baltimore*

Effective December 11, 2020, Mayor Brandon Scott's executive order closes indoor and outdoor dining at all restaurants. The restaurants will still be able to provide takeout, drive-thru and delivery services. Religious buildings, fitness centers/gyms, malls, and museums may remain open with a maximum capacity of 25%.

## **Maryland**

*December 15, 2020 – Prince George's County*

On December 10, 2020, County Executive Angela Alsobrooks announced that restaurants would no longer be able to provide indoor dining. Capacity for retail establishments and fitness centers/gyms is reduced to 25%.

## **Maryland**

*December 15, 2020 – Anne Arundel County*

On December 10, 2020, County Executive Steuart Pittman announced that restaurants may only provide take-out dining. Capacity for retail establishments, fitness centers/gym and personal services is reduced to 25%.

## **Maryland**

*December 1, 2020 – Montgomery County*

On November 24, 2020, Health Official Travis Gayles issued a health directive prohibiting indoor gatherings of 10 individuals or more in a private residence. In addition, businesses are limited to 25 people indoors and outdoors gatherings have a maximum of 25 individuals.

## **Maryland**

*December 1, 2020 – Montgomery County*

On November 20, 2020, the County Council amended its "Ban the Box" legislation. The definition of an employer is expanded to include one or more full-time employees in Montgomery County. In addition, a background check may only be conducted after a conditional offer has been made.

## **Maryland**

*November 24, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective November 20, 2020, Gov. Larry Hogan's emergency order takes place requiring restaurants and bars to close at 10:00 p.m. Capacity at retail establishments is limited to 50%.

## **Maryland**

*November 17, 2020 – Business Operations*

On November 10, 2020, Gov. Larry Hogan announced that restaurants and bars open for indoor service have a maximum capacity of 50 percent.

## **Maryland**

*November 17, 2020 – Prince George's County*

On November 14, 2020, County Executive Angela Alsobrooks issued an executive order reducing gatherings to 10 individuals indoors and 25 outdoors. Restaurants are reduced to a capacity of 50 percent outdoors and 25 percent indoors.

## **Maryland**

*November 17, 2020 – Baltimore County*

On November 14, 2020, County Executive Johnny Olszewski announced that indoor gatherings were limited to 10 individuals and outdoor gatherings are limited to 25 individuals. Restaurants and bars are required to close at 12:00 a.m.

## **Maryland**

*November 17, 2020 – Anne Arundel County*

On November 14, 2020, County Executive Stuart Pittman announced that outdoor gatherings were reduced to 25 individuals. Restaurants are reduced to a capacity of 25 percent of the maximum.

## **Maryland**

*November 17, 2020 – Montgomery County*

On November 13, 2020, County Executive Marc Elrich ordered that gatherings be limited to a capacity of 25 individuals.

## **Maryland**

*November 10, 2020 – Grants*

On November 5, 2020, Gov. Larry Hogan announced that a \$250 million economic recovery package was being made available to restaurants, independent artists, art organizations, entertainment venues, and "main street" businesses across the State.

## **Maryland**

*November 10, 2020 – City of Baltimore*

Effective November 12, 2020, Mayor Jack Young limits indoor and outdoor gatherings to ten individuals. In addition, foodservice facilities, malls, fitness centers/ gyms, churches and casinos will be limited to 25 percent of their maximum capacity. Restaurants are required to stop food service at 10 p.m.

## **Maryland**

*November 3, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 30, 2020, Gov. Larry Hogan extended the Covid-19 state-of-emergency.

## **Maryland**

*October 27, 2020 – State Grant*

On October 22, 2020, Gov. Larry Hogan announced that \$250 million from Maryland's Rainy-Day Fund would be used for small businesses effected by the Covid-19 pandemic.

## **Maryland**

*October 20, 2020 – Covid-19 Relief*

On October 19, 2020, Gov. Larry Hogan announced the creation of the \$10 Million Maryland Farmer COVID-19 Relief Program.

On September 8, 2020, the City Council approved an ordinance to increase fines up to \$1000 for violators of the City's Covid-19 safety mandates.

*September 8, 2020 – Baltimore*

Effective September 4, 2020, the City will move to Phase 3 of the State's reopening plan.

## **Maryland**

*September 8, 2020 – Schools*

On September 1, 2020, the State Board of Education announced schools must be open for at least 180 days and offer at least six hours of instruction, of which 3.5 hours must be synchronous instruction (all students taught at the same time) for grades K-12.

## **Maryland**

*September 8, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective August 4, 2020, with the exceptions of Montgomery and Prince George's County, the state enters Phase 3 of its reopening plan. Movie theaters and indoor entertainment venues are permitted to reopen at 50 percent capacity or up to 100 people, Outdoor venues may allow a maximum of 250 individuals, retail stores can increase capacity to 75 as well as religious services.

## **Maryland**

*August 11, 2020 – Montgomery County*

In August 4, 2020, county executive Marc Elrich announced that restaurants would no longer sell alcohol after 10:00 PM. In addition, individuals over the age of two are required to wear a mask. Businesses providing tanning, tattooing, waxing, threading, electrolysis, cryotherapy, and facial and massages can reopen by appointment only. Fitness centers/gyms can reopen with a limit of one person per 200 square feet of indoor space.

On July 22, 2020, Mayor Bernard Young announced that bars and restaurants would no longer be allowed to provide indoor dining. In addition, individuals over the age of 2 are required to wear a mask when social distancing is not possible.

Effective July 23, 2020, residents ages 2 and up are required to wear face coverings in any indoor business, service, organization, or establishment that serves the general public.

Effective July 24, 2020, County Executive Steuart Pittman announced that restaurants and bars that sell food must be closed by 10:00 p.m. every day. In addition, indoor social gatherings are limited to 25; outdoor gatherings are limited to 50.

*June 23, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, subject to local approval, the following industries are allowed to reopen at 50 percent maximum capacity: gyms/fitness centers, martial arts studios, and dance studios. Nursing home facilities are permitted limited outdoor visits, if the facilities are not experiencing an ongoing COVID-19 outbreak and have not had a case of COVID-19 within the last 14 days.

## **Maryland**

*June 16, 2020 – Baltimore*

Effective immediately, retail locations are permitted to reopen at 50 percent capacity.

*June 16, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, indoor dining (50 percent capacity) and outdoor amusements, such as go-karts and mini-golf are permitted to reopen once local approval has been granted. Gyms/fitness centers may reopen at 50 percent capacity on June 22, 2020.

## **Maryland**

*June 9, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, the State will enter Stage 2 of its reopening plan. The following businesses may reopen at 50 percent capacity and by appointment only; personal service businesses including nail salons, massage parlors, tanning salons, and tattoo parlors.

## **Maryland**

*June 9, 2020 – Baltimore*

Effective immediately, the City of Baltimore begins a modified Phase 1 reopening. The following business may reopen: hair salons and barbershops (appointment only, 5 customer maximum per 1000 feet), retail establishments (curbside pickup), childcare centers and day camp (10 people).

## **Maryland**

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective October 1, 2020, employers in business for a year or more, with 50 or more employees, operating in commercial industrial or business enterprises, must provide 60 days' advance written notice to affected employees before implementing a reduction in operations.

## **Maryland**

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, outdoor dining at restaurants and social clubs (outdoor dining only), outdoor youth sports and outdoor activities at youth day camps and drive-in movie theaters are permitted to reopen.

## **Maryland**

*May 19, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, the following industry sectors will be allowed to reopen: retail stores, manufacturing, personal services, churches and houses of worship. Safety guidelines for each sector can be found here:

## **Maryland**

### *May 19, 2020 – Employee Layoff*

Effective October 1, 2020, an employer with a full operational closure, partial closure (impacting 15 employees or more) or relocation, must provide 60 days' advance notice to employees and others. Additionally, the employer is required to provide continuation of health, pension, severance and/or other benefits to affected employees. Maryland's Secretary of Labor will provide terms at a later date.

## **Massachusetts**

### *March 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 17, 2021, Gov. Charlie Baker [announced](#) that the State was transitioning to Step 1 of

Phase 4 of its reopening plan. Effective March 22, 2021, gathering limits for event venues and in public settings will increase to 100 people indoors and 150 people outdoors. Outdoor gatherings at private residences and in private backyards will remain at a maximum of 25 people, with indoor house gatherings remaining at 10 people.

## **Massachusetts**

### *March 23, 2021 – Travel Restrictions*

On March 18, 2021, Gov. Charlie Baker announced that visitors to the State are no longer required to quarantine or provide a negative test.

## **Massachusetts**

### *March 16, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 8, 2021 the Department of Public Health included fully vaccinated individuals to its list of out-of-state travelers who are not required to quarantine. Individuals that have been fully vaccinated for 14 days are not required to quarantine for 10 days or produce a negative COVID-19 test result.

## **Massachusetts**

### *March 2, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 25, 2021, Gov. Charlie Baker announced that effective March 1, 2021 the commonwealth would enter Step 2 of Phase 3. Moving forward, restaurants are no longer required to maintain capacity limits. Indoor performance venues may operate at 50% capacity.

## Massachusetts

*February 9, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective February 8, 2021, Gov. Charlie Baker increased capacity limits to 40% for restaurants, bars and fitness centers/gyms.

## Massachusetts

*January 26, 2021 – Business Operations*

On January 21, 2021, Gov. Charlie Baker announced an end to the statewide business curfew and nighttime stay-at-home advisory. The 25% capacity limitation for restaurants, offices, stores and recreational businesses remains in place.

## Massachusetts

*January 26, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On January 21, 2021, Gov. Charlie Baker announced that the State would remain in the first step of Phase 3 of its reopening plan.

## Massachusetts

*January 12, 2021 – Business Operations*

On January 7, 2021, Gov. Charlie Baker announced an extension to the State's Covid-19 restrictions through January 24, 2021. Restaurants, movie theaters, performance venues, casinos, offices, places of worship, retail businesses, fitness centers, health clubs, libraries, golf facilities, museums, and "sectors not otherwise addressed" have a maximum capacity of 25%.

## Massachusetts

*January 12, 2021 – City of Boston*

On January 5, 2021, Mayor Martin Walsh announced that the City will remain in a modified Phase Two, Step Two of the Reopening Massachusetts plan for at least three more weeks.

## Massachusetts

*January 5, 2021 – Tele-Health*

On January 1, 2021, Gov. Charlie Baker enacted a requirement for insurance companies to cover tele-health visits the same way they cover in-person care, and provide a short-term model for how those services will be paid.

## Massachusetts

*December 29, 2020 – Business Operations*

On December 22, 2020, Gov. Charlie Baker (R) announced that restaurants, movie theaters, fitness centers/gyms, offices, and venues, must limit capacity to 25%.

## Massachusetts

*December 22, 2020 – City of Boston*

Effective December 16, 2020, the Public Health Commission enacted an order prohibiting bar seating unless a waiver is provided by the Licensing Board. In addition, fitness centers/gyms may only provide appointment only training with one customer or two from the same household. Outdoor training may take place with a maximum of 25 individuals. Museums, aquariums, movie theaters, and indoor historic sites must cease operations. Indoor gatherings are limited to 10 individuals and outdoor gatherings are limited to 25 individuals.

## Massachusetts

*December 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 8, 2020, Gov. Charlie Baker announced that the State would return to Phase 3/Step 1 of its reopening plan. Individuals planning a gathering with more than 25 people must notify their local health board. Museums, aquariums, bowling alleys, movie theaters, gyms and fitness centers are required to close.

## Massachusetts

*December 15, 2020 – City of Gloucester*

On December 8, 2020, the City Council approved an ordinance allowing businesses to provide seating, displays, or takeout using public or private sidewalks, parking lots and parking spaces.

## Massachusetts

*December 15, 2020 – City of Boston*

On December 14, 2020, Mayor Marty Walsh announced that the City was moving back to Phase 2, Step 2 of the State's reopening plan.

## Massachusetts

### *December 8, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 3, 2020, the Department of Health announced that 17 communities were being moved back to Phase 3/Step 1 in the State's reopening plan. The affected communities are:

On December 3, 2020, the Department of Health announced that 23 communities were being moved into the state's high-risk category. The affected communities are:

## Massachusetts

### *November 10, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective November 6, 2020, Gov. Charlie Baker announced that a stay-at-home order had been put in place instructing individuals to stay home between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. Restaurants are required to close at 9:30 p.m. Gatherings are reduced to 10 individuals, and the limit at outdoor events is now 25.

## Massachusetts

### *October 20, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 16, 2020, the Department of Public Health announced that California, Hawaii, New Jersey and Washington were given low-risk status. Visitors from these states are no longer required to complete the Massachusetts Travel Form.

## **Massachusetts**

*October 13, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective October 5, 2020, the Commonwealth issued guidance for businesses moving to Step 2 of Phase 3. Retailers in lower-risk communities are permitted to open fitting rooms. Previously they were permitted to utilize fitting rooms only if the rooms were necessary for their operations. Lodging establishments may resume providing non-essential amenities such as coffee and water, while gyms/fitness centers in lower risk communities are able to increase to maximum capacity for group exercise classes (if 14 feet of social distance can be maintained).

## **Massachusetts**

*October 13, 2020 – Boston*

On October 7, 2020, Mayor Marty Walsh announced a delay in the reopening of the City's schools. Pre-Schoolers and kindergarteners were scheduled to begin October 15, 2020.

## **Massachusetts**

*October 6, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective October 5, 2020, cities and towns designated as "lower risk" on the State's community spread may progress to Step 2 of the reopening plan's Phase 3.

## **Massachusetts**

*September 29, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 23, 2020, Gov. Charlie Baker announced that restaurants would be able to seat up to 10 people at a table on September 28, 2020.

## **Massachusetts**

*September 29, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 19, 2020, Wyoming was removed as a low-risk state. As a result, visitors are required to quarantine for 14 days.

## **Massachusetts**

*September 8, 2020 – Somerville*

Effective September 8, 2020, the City will enter Phase 3 of the State's reopening plan.

## **Massachusetts**

*September 1, 2020 – Schools*

On August 28, 2020, Gov. Charlie Baker issued an executive order for after school/out of school to provide programs during the school day.

## **Massachusetts**

*August 25, 2020 – Unemployment Benefits*

The State has been approved to provide an additional \$300 in weekly benefits to the unemployed.

## **Massachusetts**

*August 11, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 7, 2020, Gov. Charlie Baker reduced the gathering size of individuals from 100 to 50, In addition, local and state police have been authorized to issue fines if the restrictions are not met.

## **Massachusetts**

*August 11, 2020 – Schools*

All schools are required to submit their opening plans by August 14, 2020 to the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

## **Massachusetts**

*August 11, 2020 – Everett*

Effective August 10, 2020, the city's facial covering requirement is now mandatory. Individuals over the age of 2 must wear the covering in parks, businesses, outdoor spaces, and public spaces. Violators may be fined up to \$300.

## **Massachusetts**

*August 4, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective August 1, 2020, Gov. Charlie Baker's executive order stipulates that visitors to the Commonwealth can be subject to a daily fine of \$500 for not adhering to the 14-day quarantine requirement.

## **Massachusetts**

*August 4, 2020 – State Holiday*

On July 24, 2020, Gov. Charlie Baker signed a measure making June 19<sup>th</sup> (Juneteenth) an official State holiday.

## Massachusetts

*August 4, 2020 – Somerville*

On July 31, 2020, the City announced that they would not be moving to "Phase 3, Step 1" of the Commonwealth's reopening plan.

## Massachusetts

*July 28, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective August 1, 2020, visitors and residents returning to the state, are required to fill out and submit an online Massachusetts travel form and quarantine for 14 days. Travel from any of the following states waives the requirements: Connecticut, Hawaii, Maine, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, and Rhode Island.

## Massachusetts

*July 14, 2020 – Boston*

Effective July 13, 2020, the City of Boston enters Phase 3 of the Commonwealth's reopening plan.

## Massachusetts

*July 14, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective Monday, July 6, 2020 the Commonwealth enters Phase 3 of its reopening plan. Phase 3 allows the following businesses to reopen: gyms, fitness centers, movie theaters and museums.

## Massachusetts

*July 7, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Visitors from Connecticut, Maine, New Jersey, New Hampshire, New York, Rhode Island and Vermont are no longer required to self-quarantine for 14 days.

## Massachusetts

*July 7, 2020 – Telehealth*

The Massachusetts Board of Registration in Medicine (BORIM) approved its permanent telehealth policy. The policy states that a face-to-face meeting is not a prerequisite for a visit and that the standard of care applicable to the physician is the same whether the patient is seen in-person or via telemedicine.

## Massachusetts

### *June 23, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective June 22, 2020, Massachusetts Gov. Charlie Baker moved the State to Phase 2, Part 2 of the four-phase reopening plan. Updated opening guidelines include: offices (50 percent capacity), restaurants (indoor table service), retail (dressing room by appointment only) and personal services. ## Massachusetts

### *June 16, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, bars that do not serve food have been moved to Phase 4 in the State's reopening plan.

## Massachusetts

### *June 16, 2020 – Boston*

Effective immediately, the City has approved over 200 requests by restaurants to temporarily expand their outdoor dining service into public spaces.

## Massachusetts

### *June 9, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, the State moves to Phase 2 of its reopening plan. The following businesses are approved to reopen: retail, outdoor dining, hotels, personal services, funeral homes, outdoor recreation facilities and warehouses.

## Massachusetts

### *June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, non-essential retail businesses are no longer limited in the number of employees allowed on site for online/telephone fulfillment. Employees are still required to maintain a social distance of six feet.



## Massachusetts

### *May 26, 2020 – Reopening*

Effective May 25, 2020, offices may reopen with a max capacity of occupants of 25 percent. The offices must be located outside the City of Boston. Offices located in Boston will be permitted to reopen on June 1, 2020. Hair salons, barbershops, and pet grooming may re-open, but must conduct business via appointment only. Car washes (exterior only), recreation and outdoor services (such as beaches, parks, some athletic field and courts, and other outdoor activities), certain additional healthcare providers and other retail establishments who must utilize remote fulfillment and curbside pickup, may also re-open.

## Massachusetts

### *May 19, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, manufacturing facilities, construction, places of worship, hospitals and community health centers (high-priority preventative, pediatric, and treatment care for high-risk patients) may reopen under Phase 1.

## Michigan

### *April 20, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On April 13, 2021, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer extended [workplace coronavirus restrictions](#) for an additional six months. Employers are required to create a preparedness plan, have procedures for dealing with infected employees and procedures for cleaning and disinfection. In addition, employers prohibit office work if employees' jobs can feasibly be done remotely.

## Michigan

### *April 6, 2021 – Genesee County*

The County's Small Business Assistance Program is making grants (up to \$10,000) available to small businesses that have low or moderate income, have less than 25 employees and show loss of revenue due to COVID-19. Send an email to request more information, [by clicking here](#).

## Michigan

### *March 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 19, 2021, the Department of Health and Human Services announced that individuals may remove face masks during residential gatherings if all in attendance have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

## Michigan

### *March 16, 2021 – Relief Bill*

On March 9, 2021, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer approved a \$2.5 billion COVID-19 relief bill, which includes funding for rental assistance, vaccine administration, and testing and tracing.

## Michigan

### *March 9, 2021 – Business Operations*

On March 2, 2021, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that restaurants and bars will now operate at 25% capacity inside, will have a 50% restriction and will be able to provide services to up to 100 customers. In addition, the State curfew is moved back to 11:00 p.m. Retail stores will have a 50% capacity limit, fitness center/gym capacity is raised to 30%. Movie theaters, bowling alleys and banquet halls may now service up to 300 individuals inside or 1,000 outdoors.

## Michigan

### *March 9, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 2, 2021, the Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) announced that indoor gatherings at residential venues are limited to 15 individuals from no more than 3 households, while outdoor gatherings at residential venues are limited to 50 individuals.

## Michigan

### *March 2, 2021 – City of East Lansing*

On February 23, 2021, the City Council approved an extension of its mask mandate until March 16, 2021.

## Michigan

### *February 2, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective February 1, 2021, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer's order allowed indoor dining to resume. Patrons are required to wear a mask when not eating or drinking. In addition, the order allows for non-residential gatherings of up to 10 people from two households.

## Michigan

### *February 2, 2021 – City of East Lansing*

On January 28, 2021, the City Council approved an emergency ordinance requiring compliance with public health orders. Individuals can be fined up to \$500 for non-compliance with COVID-19 protocols.

## Michigan

### *January 26, 2021 – Business Operations*

On January 21, 2021, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that indoor dining can resume on February 1, 2021. In addition, an order will be issued permitting gatherings of up to ten individuals from two households to occur.

## Michigan

### *January 26, 2021 – City of East Lansing*

On January 19, 2021, the City Council extended the state of emergency and mask requirement for the downtown area until February 28, 2021.

## Michigan

### *January 5, 2021 – Unemployment Benefits*

On December 28, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer extended benefits to self-employed and gig workers and provided all unemployment recipients with an additional \$300 per week.

## Michigan

### *January 5, 2021 – Assistance Funds*

On December 29, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that she has signed a bill to provide \$55 million to help small businesses impacted by COVID-19 in grants up to \$20,000. The bill also includes \$3.5 million for grants of up to \$40,000 each for live music and entertainment venues, and includes \$45 million in direct payments to workers who have been laid off or furloughed as a result of the virus.

## Michigan

### *December 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 7, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that the State would continue its partial lockdown until December 20, 2020.

## Michigan

### *December 15, 2020 – Schools*

Effective immediately, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer suspends in-person learning for high-school students until December 20, 2020.

## Michigan

*December 15, 2020 – Taxes*

On December 10, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that small business restaurants could postpone their monthly sales, use and withholding tax until January 20, 2020.

## Michigan

*December 8, 2020 – Grants*

On November 30, 2020, The Pure Michigan Small Business Relief Initiative was announced by the Michigan Strategic Fund making available \$10 million in grants for small businesses affected by Covid-19.

## Michigan

*December 8, 2020 – City of Lansing*

On November 30, 2020, the City Council voted to issue misdemeanors for individuals violating public health orders. Violators can be fined up to \$500.

## Michigan

*December 8, 2020 – Oakland County*

On December 1, 2020, County Executive David Coulter announced the availability of grants through the Oakland Together Restaurant Relief Program. Beginning December 15, 2020 interested bar and restaurant owners can obtain information by going to. [Click here for details.](#)

## Michigan

*November 17, 2020 – Grants*

The Small Business Association of Michigan and the Department of Labor and Economic Opportunity announced the availability of 41,000 - \$10,000 grants for small businesses to expand their outdoor capacities. [Information on the Grants can be found by clicking here.](#)

## Michigan

*November 17, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 15, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced a Three Week "Pause," mandating that the following close: theaters, stadiums, arenas, dine-in restaurants, bars, bowling centers, ice skating facilities, indoor water parks and group fitness classes.

## Michigan

*November 3, 2020 – Grants*

On October 27, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced the Teacher COVID-19 Grant and the Support Staff COVID-19 Grant programs to provide financial support to teachers and staff.

## Michigan

*November 3, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective November 2, 2020, all dine-in establishments must keep customers' names and phone numbers for contact-tracing purposes.

## Michigan

*November 3, 2020 – Safety Procedures*

Effective October 28, 2020, the Department of Health and Human Services issued an order for indoor venues without fixed seating to have a maximum capacity of 50 individuals.

## Michigan

*October 27, 2020 – Unemployment Benefits*

On October 20, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer signed SB 886 to amend the Michigan Employment Security Act. Under the bill, the period of benefit eligibility in a benefit year increases to 26 weeks from 20, increases eligibility for unemployment benefits for individuals leaving work for Covid-19 related issues and relieves employers from being charged for benefits paid through December 31, 2020.

## Michigan

*October 27, 2020 – Business Liability*

On October 22, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer signed HB 6030, COVID-19 the Response and Reopening Liability Assurance Act, providing immunity to compliant businesses and individuals that "had not been denied legal effect at the time of the conduct or risk that allegedly caused harm." Immunity is not denied because of an isolated, de minimis deviation.

## Michigan

*October 27, 2020 – Business Liability*

On October 22, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer signed HB 603, amending the Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Act (MIOSHA), providing liability for an employee's exposure to COVID-19 "had not been denied legal effect at the time of the exposure."

## Michigan

*October 27, 2020 – Worker Protection*

On October 22, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer signed HB 6032 providing protections (termination, disciplining, retaliating) to employees not going to work due to having been exposed or are exhibiting symptoms, or have tested positive for COVID-19.

## Michigan

*October 20, 2020 – OSHA*

Due to the Coronavirus the Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration (MIOSHA) has issued emergency health and safety rules.

Employers are required to:

- Designate one or more onsite safety coordinators who is responsible for implementing, monitoring, and reporting on COVID-19 preparedness and response.
- Provide training to employees on COVID-19 infection-control practices, including personal protective equipment and how to report unsafe working conditions.
- Keep records for one year on training, employee and visitor screening as well as provided notices.

## Michigan

*October 20, 2020 – Public Meetings*

On October 16, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer approved SB 1108 allowing public bodies to conduct public meetings remotely during the COVID-19 pandemic.

## Michigan

*October 20, 2020 – East Lansing*

On October 12, 2020 the city council voted to approve an emergency ordinance requiring individuals to comply with public health orders. A civil fine of \$500 may be assessed for violations.

## Michigan

*October 13, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 9, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer's executive order permit's indoor entertainment venues and movie theaters to reopen with a maximum of 20 individuals per 1000 feet.

## Michigan

*October 13, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 5, 2020, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) Director Robert Gordon announced the following:

- Indoor gatherings of up to 10 individuals are permitted at a residence.
- Indoor gatherings of up to 10 persons occurring at a non-residential venue are permitted (with face coverings mandatory).
- Venues with fixed seating are limited to 20 percent capacity. (Up to 25 percent in Region 6.)
- In venues without fixed seating, attendance is limited to 20 persons per 1,000 square feet, per occupied room. (25 persons per 1,000 square feet in Region 6.)
- Individuals over the age of five are required to wear a facial mask.
- Food service establishments are required to close indoor common areas where people could congregate, dance, or otherwise mingle. They also must prohibit indoor gatherings anywhere alcoholic beverages are sold for consumption onsite (except where parties are seated and separated by at least six feet, and do not intermingle.)

## Michigan

*October 13, 2020 – City of Detroit*

On October 9, 2020, Mayor Mike Duggan announced that individuals are required to wear a face mask when in public. In addition, the maximum capacity for restaurants and bars is 50 percent.

## Michigan

*October 13, 2020 – Washtenaw County*

On October 5, 2020, the County Health Department ordered that individuals should continue to wear a facial mask and indoor/outdoor gatherings have a maximum capacity of 50 percent.

## Michigan

*October 13, 2020 – Wayne County*

In October 8, 2020, County Executive Warren Evans announced that an executive order had been put in place requiring individuals to wear a face covering when out in public. Gatherings are limited to ten people or twenty percent capacity per 1,000 square feet of space.

## Michigan

*October 13, 2020 – Oakland County*

On October 3, 2020, County Health Officer Leigh-Anne Stafford issued an order requiring residents five years of age and older to wear a facial mask when in public.

## Michigan

*October 13, 2020 – Macomb County*

On October 5, 2020, County Executive Mark Hackel announced that the County would not be implementing a facial mask mandate.

## Michigan

*October 6, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 2, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that the Upper Peninsula region was moving back to Phase 4 following an uptick in Covid-19 cases.

## Michigan

*September 29, 2020 – Business Operations*

On September 25, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that entertainment venues including: movie theaters, performance venues, ice rinks, bowling centers and outdoor venues can resume operations on October 9, 2020.

## Michigan

*September 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 9, 2020, the Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration (MOSHA) released reopening guidelines for gyms, bowling alleys, swimming pools and other similar businesses, setting a maximum capacity of 25 percent. [Detailed guidelines may be found here.](#)

*September 8, 2020 – Business Operations*

On September 3, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer issued an executive order allowing gyms/fitness centers and pools to reopen if meeting safety protocols.

## Michigan

*September 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 27, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer issued an executive order designed to keep sick residents' home if they have a fever, uncontrolled cough or shortness of breath.



## Michigan

*September 1, 2020 – Ann Arbor*

On August 24, 2020, the City Council approved a temporary emergency ordinance that makes face coverings mandatory and limits gatherings to a maximum of 25. Violating the ordinance carries a civil infraction with a fine between \$100 and \$250.

## Michigan

*August 25, 2020 – Ingham County*

On August 18, 2020, the County Health Department issued an emergency order that limits gatherings to 25 people or less.

## Michigan

*August 11, 2020 – Business Operation*

Effective August 5, 2020, casinos are allowed to open but their occupancy will be limited to 15% capacity. Casinos must conduct a daily entry screening protocol for customers and employees that includes temperature screening. Patrons are required to wear a face covering, except while eating or drinking or for identification purposes.

## Michigan

*August 11, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 6, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer's executive order makes it mandatory for employees and children over the age of two to wear facemasks at Michigan camps and childcare centers.

## Michigan

*August 11, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 5, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that the state would remain in a "state of emergency" until September 4, 2020.

## Michigan

*August 4, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective July 31, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer issued an executive order for Regions 6 and 8 that limit indoor gatherings to 10 individuals. The capacity for an outdoor gathering is 250 individuals. Bars operating indoors with at least 70 percent of sales being alcohol must close.

## Michigan

*July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 17, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that public safety officers wear face coverings unless doing so would interfere with their responsibilities.

## Michigan

*July 21, 2020 – Business Operations*

Grocery stores and pharmacies are required to set aside two hours per week in order for vulnerable customers to shop. Businesses may not assume that an unmasked customer cannot medically tolerate a face covering, though they can accept a customer's verbal representation to that effect.

## Michigan

*July 14, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective July 13, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer issued an executive order requiring individuals to wear a mask in indoor settings and requires businesses to refuse entry or service to individuals not wearing face coverings. Violation of the executive order is a misdemeanor punishable by a \$500 fine.

## Michigan

*July 7, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 1, 2020, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer issued an executive order closing indoor services at bars. This order affects bars in the south and central parts of Michigan.

## Michigan

*June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that the State's regions would not progress to the next reopening plan phase. However, professional sports teams are allowed to resume operations.

## Michigan

*June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Overnight residential, travel, and troop camps were allowed to reopen on June 15. Northern Michigan has entered Phase 5 of the State's reopening plan. Gyms/fitness centers, movie theaters and pools are allowed to open with no restrictions.

## Michigan

*June 9, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer's executive order moves the State into Phase 4 of its reopening plan. Retail stores are permitted to reopen - occupancy is limited to 25 percent for stores with 50,000 floor space or less, and 4 customers per 1000 feet at larger stores. In addition, outdoor public swimming pools (50 percent capacity), day camps, libraries and museums will reopen.

## Michigan

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, the state's "stay at home" order has been extended to June 12, 2020. Individuals are required to wear face coverings when entering any enclosed public space. Indoor social gatherings are limited to 10 people or less. Outdoor social gatherings are limited to no more than 100 people.

*May 26, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, retail establishments, offices, restaurants and bars in the following counties will be allowed to reopen: Alger, Alpena, Antrim, Baraga, Benzie, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Chippewa, Crawford, Delta, Dickinson, Emmet, Gogebic, Grand Traverse, Houghton, Iron, Kalkaska, Keweenaw, Leelanau, Luce, Mackinac, Manistee, Marquette, Menominee, Missaukee, Montmorency, Ontonagon, Otsego, Presque Isle, Roscommon, Schoolcraft, and Wexford. Restaurants and bars are subject to a 50 percent capacity limit.

## Minnesota

*April 20, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On April 14, 2021, the Executive Council expanded Gov. Tim Walz's emergency powers for an additional thirty days.

## Minnesota

*April 20, 2021 – City of Minneapolis*

Effective May 1, 2021, the Hospitality Worker Right to Recall takes effect requiring hospitality and event centers employers to recall employees, if and when they are needed in reverse order of seniority.

## Minnesota

### *March 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 15, 2021, Gov. Tim Walz issued an [executive order](#) extending the State's COVID-19 peacetime emergency until April 14, 2021.

## Minnesota

### *March 23, 2021 – Freeborn County*

On March 17, 2021, the Board of Commissions voted to terminate the County's COVID-19 state-of-emergency.

## Minnesota

### *March 16, 2021 – Business Operations*

On March 12, 2021, Gov. Tim Walz announced that restaurants and bars may expand their indoor capacity to 75%. Indoor social gatherings can expand to 15 individuals with no household limit. Outdoor gatherings can expand to 50 individuals without a household limit.

## Minnesota

### *February 23, 2021 – Schools*

On February 17, 2021, Gov. Tim Walz announced his plan to [return students to the classroom](#), updating the Safe Learning Plan. Beginning, February 22, 2021 all middle and high school students can return to the classroom for hybrid or in-person learning.

## Minnesota

### *February 16, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 12, 2021, Gov. Tim Walz issued an executive order allowing restaurants to serve up to 250 people or 50% of capacity. Indoor entertainment venues and fitness centers/gyms are permitted to serve up to 250 individuals or 25% of capacity.

## Minnesota

### *February 9, 2021 – City of Superior*

On February 2, 2021, the City Council voted to reenact the City's mask requirement. In addition, the City's state-of-emergency was extended through April 30, 2021.

## Minnesota

### *January 19, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On January 13, 2021, Gov. Tim Walz announced an extension to the State's Covid-19 emergency for an additional thirty days.

## Minnesota

*January 12, 2021 – Business Operations*

On January 6, 2021, Gov. Tim Walz announced that, effective January 11, 2021, restaurants and bars can reopen to indoor dining at 50% capacity. In addition, outdoor entertainment venues increase to 250 individuals or 25% capacity. Indoor entertainment venues, can reopen at 25% capacity.

On July 30, 2020, Gov. Tim Walz released the "Safe Learning Plan" requiring a county to have less than 9 Covid-19 cases per 10,000 residents over a 14-day period in order to reopen schools.

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, the State's "Safer at Home" policy is replaced by a "Safe Return" order. Indoor gatherings of up to 20 people and outdoor gatherings of up to 50 people are permitted. If social distancing is possible, indoor gatherings of up to 50 and outdoor gatherings of up to 100 will be allowed.

*February 23, 2021 – Kansas City*

On February 19, 2021, Mayor Quinton Lucas announced that bars and restaurants are no longer required to close at 12:00 a.m. In addition, gathering capacity levels have also been ended.

*February 16, 2021 – St. Louis County*

Effective February 11, 2021, Businesses, bars, and restaurants are permitted to operate at 50% capacity per County Executive Dr. Sam Page.

## Missouri

*February 16, 2021 – Grundy County*

On February 12, 2021, health officer Elizabeth Gibson announced that the County's public health order was extended for an additional 60 days.

## Missouri

*February 9, 2021 – Andrew County*

On February 3, 2021, the County Commissioners extended their mask requirement until February 28, 2021.

On January 19, 2021, the County Commission approved an ordinance designed to protect the 2nd Amendment rights of residents in keeping with federal acts, laws, orders, rules, and regulations.

Restaurants and other venues are required to close at 10:00 p.m. and have a maximum capacity of 50 percent. Facial coverings are required indoors and outdoors when social distancing is not possible.

Effective September 16, 2020, "small business assistance" provides emergency grants up to \$50,000 to businesses and non-profits with 100-or-fewer employees for COVID-19-related expenses.

*September 22, 2020 – Boone County*

On September 17, 2020, the County's Department of Public Health and Human Services announced that bars would be able to remain open until 10:30 p.m.

## Missouri

*September 15, 2020 – Jefferson County*

On September 8, 2020, the County Health Department placed the County into red alert status due to the amount of reported Covid-19 cases.

## Missouri

*September 15, 2020 – Branson*

On September 8, 2020, Board of Aldermen voted to extend its mask mandate until October 14, 2020.

## Missouri

*September 15, 2020 – Columbia*

On September 8, 2020, the City Council approved an extension to its existing health order limiting gatherings to 20 individuals and closing bars at 10:00 p.m.

## Missouri

*September 1, 2020 – Jefferson County*

On August 27, 2020, the County Health Department passed a face covering requirement effective August 31, 2020 for individuals over the age of 5.

## Missouri

*September 1, 2020 – Boone County*

On August 28, 2020, Health Director Stephanie Browning announced the bars and restaurants in Columbia are required to stop serving alcohol at 9 p.m. and close no later than 10 p.m. Dance floors are prohibited at entertainment venues. All food and beverages must be consumed while seated at any bar or restaurant with table seating limited to a maximum of 10.

Effective immediately, Children 6 years of age or older must wear face coverings in public. A 5-year-old attending kindergarten must also wear a face covering. Business are required to deny entry to anyone not abiding by the ordinance.

The State has been approved to participate in the Federal Lost Wages Assistance Program providing an additional \$300 in weekly benefits to the unemployed.

On July 15, 2020, Gov. Steve Bullock ordered the use of face coverings in counties with at least 4 active Covid-19 cases. The coverings are also required in outdoor places when social distancing cannot occur.

All individuals over the age of 12 are required to wear a face covering when inside in a public setting. Fines for businesses that do not adhere to the rule may be subject of fines from \$10 - \$200.

On August 31, 2020, Gov. Chris Sununu extended the "State of Emergency" until October 1, 2020.

## **New Hampshire**

*August 18, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 11, 2020, Gov. Chris Sununu announced that face coverings are to be worn at any scheduled gatherings of more than 100 people in the state.

## **New Hampshire**

*August 11, 2020 – Keene*

On August 6, 2020, the City Council approved an ordinance requiring a face covering be utilized in all indoor public spaces as well as outdoor spaces where business is conducted and social distancing is not possible.

## **New Hampshire**

*July 21, 2020 – Schools*

On June 14, 2020, Gov. Chris Sununu announced that all districts must offer "hybrid" options that include teaching in class or remote learning. Students are required to wear masks and maintain their desks three feet apart.

## **New Hampshire**

*June 30, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective June 29, 2020, the following businesses are permitted to reopen: movie theaters and performing arts (50 percent capacity), amusement parks (25 percent capacity) and hotels (full capacity).

## **New Hampshire**

*June 23, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective June 15, 2020, the State's stay-at-home order expired.

## **New Hampshire**

*June 23, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective June 29, 2020, adult day services, amusement parks and performing arts venues are permitted to reopen.

## **New Hampshire**

*June 16, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, the State's "stay at home" order expires, as does the State's maximum gathering restriction. The following businesses are permitted to reopen: amateur sports, art galleries, bowling, arcades, laser tag and billiard halls, charitable gaming, gyms and fitness centers (50 percent capacity), libraries, motorcycle rides, museums, outdoor attractions, outdoor race tracks, public, campground and commercial pools, road races and tourist trains.

## **New Hampshire**

*June 9, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, the following businesses and activities were permitted to resume per the State's Stay-at-Home 2.0 order: personal services, fitness centers/gyms at 50 percent maximum capacity. Lodging establishments are permitted to accept customers. On June 15, 2020, indoor dining is scheduled to resume in all counties at either 50 or 100 percent capacity.

## **New Hampshire**

*June 2, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

The state's "stay-at-home" order is extended to June 15, 2020.

## **New Hampshire**

*May 26, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, fishing charters, horse riding and boarding, mini-golf, driving and shooting ranges, plus bike, canoe, and kayak rentals may reopen with a maximum group of 10 customers.

## **New Hampshire**

*May 19, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, customers of restaurants are permitted to dine outside with social distancing and responsible hygiene procedures in place.

## **New Jersey**

*April 20, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On April 15, 2021, Gov. Phil Murphy [issued](#) an executive order extending the public Health Emergency until May 15, 2021.

## New Jersey

### *April 13, 2021 – Travel Restrictions*

On April 5, 2021, Gov. Phil Murphy [announced](#) that people who are fully vaccinated with an FDA-authorized vaccine, and persons who clinically recovered from COVID-19 in the past three months who are traveling domestically within the United States, do not need to be tested for COVID-19 before or after travel to New Jersey and do not need to self-quarantine upon return. Unvaccinated travelers and residents returning from any U.S. state or territory beyond the immediate region (New York, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, and Delaware) should self-quarantine at their home, hotel, or other temporary lodging.

## New Jersey

### *April 13, 2021 – Grants*

On April 12, 2021, Gov. Phil Murphy signed legislation which provides \$15 million in COVID-19 relief aid for small businesses throughout the state.

## New Jersey

### *April 6, 2021 – Vaccine Mandate*

On March 19, 2021, the State issued guidance for employers that require employees to be vaccinated for COVID-19 prior to coming back to work. An employee is not required to be vaccinated if they have a disability, if their doctor has advised them not to, if they are pregnant or breastfeeding, or due to sincerely held religious beliefs.

## New Jersey

### *April 6, 2021 – Business Operations*

On March 29, 2021, Gov. Phil Murphy signed [Executive Order No. 234](#). Effective April 2, 2021 the gathering limit (outdoors) is raised to 200 individuals. Indoor gatherings remain at 25 individuals.

### *April 6, 2021 – Grants*

On April 1, 2021, Gov. Phil Murphy signed [legislation](#) providing \$25 million in small business aid.

## New Jersey

### *March 30, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

## **New Jersey**

### *March 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 17, 2021, Gov. Phil Murphy extended the State's public health emergency through April 16, 2021.

## **New Jersey**

### *March 16, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective March 19, 2021, Gov. Phil Murphy [increases](#) the maximum capacity to 50% for bars, restaurants, personal care services and indoor recreation.

## **New Jersey**

### *February 9, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 3, 2021, Governor Murphy signed an Executive Order ending the statewide 10 p.m. curfew for in-person, indoor restaurant service. In addition, indoor capacity limits increase to 35% for food or beverage establishments, including restaurants, cafeterias, private non-profit clubs and food courts (with or without a liquor license), bars, entertainment and recreational businesses, casinos, gyms, personal care services, including barber shops and nail salons.

*December 8, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective December 7, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy's order requires outdoor gatherings to have a maximum of 25 individuals.

Effective immediately, Gov. Phil Murphy's administrative order allows indoor entertainment venues to conduct operations in an adjacent outdoor area under the same capacity limits that apply to their normal indoor operations.

On November 30, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy limited outdoor gatherings to a maximum of 25 individuals.

Effective November 12, 2020, restrictions on restaurants and bars take place. Indoor service must end at 10:00 p.m. but may remain open for outdoor services past 10:00.

On November 10, 2020, Mayor Ras Baraka announced that indoor and outdoor gatherings should not exceed 10 people, nursing homes must stop allowing family visits and all team sports must stop for 14 days. In addition, the following zip codes (07104, 07105, and 07107) must adhere to a 9:00 p.m. weekday curfew and a weekend curfew of 10:00 p.m.

*November 17, 2020 – City of Trenton*

Effective November 16, 2020, all businesses must close at 10:00 pm. Only Gas stations may stay open only to dispense gas. Restaurants may provide drive-through services until 11:00 p.m.

Effective November 5, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy's executive order mandates that employees wear face masks when entering the workplace, maintain social distancing protocols and that companies provide sanitation products to employees. On October 20, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that Arizona and Maryland were added to the State's visitor quarantine list.

*October 20, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 12, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that Rhode Island was added to the state's 14-day quarantine list and that Delaware and Washington D.C. were removed.

On September 8, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that the following states were added to the tri-states area's quarantine list: Delaware, Maryland, Ohio and West Virginia.

Effective September 4, 2020, movie theaters are permitted to reopen at 25 percent capacity or 150 viewers. In addition, restaurants may now seat patrons inside at a capacity of 25 percent with social distancing protocols in place.

### *September 1, 2020 – Schools*

On August 24, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced the release of regional metrics designed to assist school districts with their reopening plans.

## **New Jersey**

### *September 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 25, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that the following states were removed from the New Jersey quarantine list: Alaska, Arizona, Delaware, Maryland and Montana.

## **New Jersey**

### *September 1, 2020 – Business Operations*

On August 26, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that effective September 1, 2020, gyms and indoor amusements will be allowed to reopen at 25 percent capacity. Indoor dining services and movie theaters are scheduled to reopen on September 4, 2020.

On August 18, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that Delaware and Alaska had been added to the State's quarantine list and that Washington had been removed.

On August 12, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that all schools including universities would be permitted to open in September and be able to provide in-person classes. The schools must meet the Department of Education's requirements in order to provide face-to-face training.

On August 11, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy removed Alaska, New Mexico, Ohio and Rhode Island from the state's quarantine list and added Hawaii, South Dakota and the Virgin Islands.

On August 4, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that Rhode Island was added to the state's mandatory quarantine list.

## **New Jersey**

### *August 4, 2020 – Travel Restrictions*

Gov. Phil Murphy announced that Illinois, Kentucky, Minnesota, D.C., and Puerto Rico were added to the State's mandatory quarantine list.

## **New Jersey**

### *August 4, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 3, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that guests for indoor gatherings would be limited to 25 percent of a room's capacity or 25 people. The limitation does not apply to funerals, weddings or memorials.

On August 3, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that face coverings are required for all students, at all times, while inside a school building regardless of social distancing unless the student has a health issue.

## **New Jersey**

### *July 28, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 21, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that visitors from 10 additional states have been added to the joint travel advisory and are required to quarantine for 14 days upon arrival. [The current list may be viewed here.](#)

### *July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Gov. Phil Murphy announced that visitors from New Mexico, Ohio, Wisconsin and Minnesota are required to self-quarantine for 14 days upon arrival. Twenty-two states are now on the self-quarantine list.

Gov. Phil Murphy permits outdoor gathering limits to 500 people. Youth day camps and summer programs may reopen and NJ TRANSIT rail and light rail can run on a regular schedule.

On July 8, 2020, Gov. Phil Murphy announced that facial coverings are required when an individual is outside and social distancing is not possible. The New Jersey Department of Labor announced that unemployed workers are eligible for an additional 20 weeks of unemployment benefits. The State extension begins once a claimant exhausts up to 26 weeks of state unemployment plus their 13 weeks of federal Pandemic Emergency Compensation.

### *July 7, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, visitors coming from 16 states are required to quarantine for two weeks. The States include Alabama, Arkansas, Arizona, California, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Idaho, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Nevada, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Utah.

## **New Jersey**

### *July 7, 2020 – Atlantic City*

Effective immediately, casinos are permitted to reopen at 25% of maximum capacity. Guests are required to wear masks and are asked to maintain a social distance. Table games will require one empty seat between guests.

## **New Jersey**

### *June 30, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective July 2, 2020, playgrounds, waterparks and amusement parks may reopen.

## **New Jersey**

### *June 23, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective July 1, 2020, an executive order signed by Gov. Phil Murphy allows in-person clinical, lab, and hands-on programming at higher education institutions to resume and trade/technical schools to reopen. Indoor portions of retail shopping malls are permitted to reopen on June 29 at 50 percent capacity. Indoor dining and casinos are expected to reopen on July 2, 2020 at 25 percent capacity.

Effective immediately, Governor Phil Murphy eliminates the stay-at-home order as the State moves to Stage 2 of its reopening plan. In addition, the maximum capacity on outdoor gatherings was raised from 25 to 100 people. The limit on indoor gatherings is raised to 25 percent occupancy or up to 50 individuals, whichever is less. Outdoor recreation and entertainment businesses are permitted to reopen immediately, with the exception of amusement parks, water parks, and arcades.

Effective immediately, in-person sales at auto, motorcycle and boat dealerships may resume by appointment only, with social distancing in place.

Effective immediately, non-essential construction and non-essential retail businesses (curbside pick-up only) may resume operations. Construction reopening guidelines include:

- no visitors at the worksite.
- continued social distancing measures.
- stagger work start, stop and lunch times (where practicable).
- workers wear company provided facemasks.
- accessible washing stations and/or hand sanitizers.

### *April 13, 2021 – Sick Leave*

On April 7, 2021, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham signed the [Healthy Workplaces Act](#) effective July 1, 2022. Employees accrue at least one hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours worked, and are permitted to use up to 64 hours in a 12-month period.

## New Mexico

### *March 30, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 24, 2021, the Department of Health updated the [county reopening map](#). Thirteen counties are at the Turquoise Level and 10 are at the Green Level. The majority of the State's counties are now at or approaching the least restrictive levels. Ten counties are at the Yellow Level as of March 24, 2021. None are at the Red Level, signifying the highest risk. Seventeen counties advanced to a less restrictive level since the most recent biweekly map update.

## New Mexico

### *March 23, 2021 – Business Operations*

On March 16, 2021, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham signed [House Bill 255](#), allowing for home delivery of alcohol by restaurants and bars.

On March 5, 2021, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham issued an [executive order](#) extending the State's COVID-19 emergency order through April 2, 2021.

## New Mexico

### *March 2, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 24, 2021, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham announced the addition of a turquoise level to the State's risk level classification system. Four counties reached the Turquoise Level, the newly designated least-restrictive level, and four counties were at the Red Level, signifying very high risk.

- The counties that met one of the health metric thresholds and may operate at the Yellow Level beginning Feb. 24 are: **Bernalillo, Chaves, Cibola, Colfax, Curry, Grant, Guadalupe, Hidalgo, Lea, Lincoln, Luna, Rio Arriba, Roosevelt, San Juan, San Miguel, Sandoval, Santa Fe, Socorro and Valencia.**
- The counties that met both of the health metric thresholds and may operate at the Green Level beginning Feb. 24 are: **De Baca, Los Alamos, Mora, Quay, Taos and Torrance.**
- The counties that met both of the health metric thresholds for two consecutive biweekly map updates and may operate at the Turquoise Level beginning Feb. 24 are: **Catron, Harding, Sierra and Union.**
- The counties that met neither of the health metric thresholds and must operate at the Red Level are: **Doña Ana, Eddy, McKinley and Otero.**

Effective February 11, 2021, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham terminated the State's traveler quarantine requirement.

### *February 9, 2021 – Socorro County*

On January 27, 2021, the Department of Health moved the County from the red level to yellow in its reopening plan.

On November 13, 2020, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham issued an executive order advising individuals to stay at home unless it is essential to health, safety and welfare.

Restaurants may provide curbside pickup and delivery services; on-site dining is prohibited. Gatherings of up to 5 people from different households are still permitted.

*October 27, 2020 – Business Operations*

On October 23, 2020, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham amended the State's emergency public health order requiring all retail establishments to close by 10 p.m., in alignment with the State's requirement that food and drink establishments serving alcohol must close by 10 p.m. Food and drink establishments that complete [the New Mexico Safe Certification training program](#), which educates workers about the State's required and recommended COVID-Safe Practices, may continue to offer limited indoor dining at a maximum of 25 percent occupancy as of Oct. 30, 2020.

Effective September 4, 2020, places of lodging that have been safe-certified may expand maximum occupancy to 75 percent. All places of lodging must operate in accordance with COVID-Safe Practices.

- must post the Notice of Employee Rights in an employee-accessible area (and be provided to each employee at hiring).

On December 21, 2020, Gov. Roy Cooper issued an executive order permitting bars, restaurants, hotels and distilleries to package and sell mixed drinks to-go. Cocktail orders can include multiple drinks, but only one drink per person.

### *December 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 8, 2020, Gov. Roy Cooper announced a modified “stay at home” order. Individuals must stay at home from 10:00 p.m. – 5:00 a.m. Businesses are required to close by 10 p.m. and onsite alcohol sales must stop at 9 p.m.

### *November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 17, 2020, Governor Roy Cooper and Dr. Mandy Cohen, Secretary of the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (NC DHHS) announced a new COVID-19 County Alert System. [Information on the County Alert System can be found by clicking here.](#)

## North Carolina

### *December 1, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 23, 2020, Gov. Roy Cooper issued an executive order requiring individual dining at restaurants to wear a facial covering unless they are actively eating or drinking.

## North Carolina

### *November 24, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective November 25, 2020, Gov. Roy Cooper’s executive order takes place. Retail establishments with 15,000 or more square feet must have an employee stand at entrances to ensure that customers wear a face mask and adhere to capacity restrictions. Gatherings are limited to 10 individuals indoors.

## North Carolina

*November 24, 2020 – Chesterfield County*

Effective November 18, 2020, the County Council's mask mandate takes place for all individuals over the age of 10. In addition, all grocery store, pharmacy, restaurant and retail workers are required to wear masks. Individuals not adhering to the requirement may receive a \$25 fine.

## North Carolina

*November 17, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 10, 2020, Gov. Roy Cooper issued an executive order, limiting indoor gatherings to 10 individuals and keeping the state in Phase 3 of its reopening plan.

On October 21, 2020, Gov. Roy Cooper announced that the State would remain in Phase 3 of its reopening plan for at least an additional 3 weeks.

On September 30, 2020, Gov. Roy Cooper announced that the State would be moving to Phase 3 of its reopening plan on October 2, 2020. Bars are permitted to operate outdoors only at 30 percent of outdoor capacity, or 100 individuals, while the 11:00 curfew on alcohol sales stays in place. Movie theaters and conference centers may open indoor spaces up to 30 percent of capacity or 100 seated individuals.

*September 29, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective October 2, 2020, large outdoor venues, including stadiums with a capacity for 10,000 individuals may reopen at 7 percent capacity.

*September 22, 2020 – Schools*

Effective October 5, 2020, public school districts and charter schools can choose to implement Plan A for elementary schools (grades K-5). Plan A continues to include important safety measures like face coverings for all students, teachers and staff, social distancing and symptom screening, but does not require schools to reduce the number of children in the classroom.

*September 8, 2020 – Davie County*

Effective September 8, 2020, the County Emergency Ordinance and authorizing the prohibitions and restrictions during a State of Emergency, shall remain in effect with no changes.

*September 8, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective September 4, 2020, the gathering limit increased to 25 people indoors and 50 people outdoors. Museums and aquariums can reopen at 50 capacity, while gyms and indoor exercise facilities can reopen at 30 percent capacity.

On July 14, 2020, Gov. Roy Cooper announced that the State would continue in Phase 2 until August 7, 2020.

*June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Originally scheduled to move to Phase 3 in on June 26, 2020 the State will now remain in Phase 2 until July 17, 2020. Gov. Roy Cooper also announced a statewide mask requirement.

## North Carolina

*June 23, 2020 – Raleigh*

Effective June 19, 2020, individuals are required to wear facemasks or coverings when in contact with other people in a public or private space.

## North Carolina

*June 2, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, open businesses must adhere to the following:

- The emergency maximum occupancy must be posted in a noticeable place.
- A sign that reminds those entering or working about social distancing and requests that those with a fever or cough do not enter.
- Screening workers prior to entering the workplace is required.
- Cleaning and disinfecting of high-touch areas is required.

On January 7, 2021, Gov. Doug Burgum announced that bars, restaurants and other food service establishments can operate at 65% of the licensed facility capacity, not to exceed 200 patrons. Seating arrangements and tables must still allow for at least 6 feet of physical distance between individual parties; dance areas must be closed; service must be provided to seated patrons only; and masks must be worn by owners, managers and employees at all times, and by patrons except when eating or drinking.

Effective August 26, 2020, individuals over the age of 11 are required to wear face coverings while inside any indoor place open to the public.

## Oklahoma

*July 21, 2020 – Tulsa*

Effective July 16, 2020, individuals over the age of 18 are required to wear a mask in public or in an education building unless social distancing can be maintained.

## Oklahoma

*July 21, 2020 – Oklahoma City*

On July 17, 2020, the City Council passed an ordinance requiring individuals to wear a face covering when entering and while inside any indoor place open to the public. Individuals not following the ordinance may receive a fine up to \$100.

Retail operations can remain open at 50% capacity. Indoor events are limited to 10 individuals, outdoor events are limited to 50 individuals.

On November 17, 2020, the Department of Health announced that masks are still required when indoors, now requiring a facial covering anytime there is contact with a member of a separate household. This includes in an individual's own home.

On November 17, 2020, the Department of Health mandates that visitors to the state be tested for Covid-19 within 72 hours of entering the state. The order does not apply to commuters.

On November 13, 2020, the County Board of Health ordered all public and private K-12 schools to close for two weeks effective November 23, 2020.

*November 17, 2020 – City of Philadelphia*

Effective November 20, 2020, restaurants are prohibited from providing indoor dining and may only service a party of four from the same household.

*October 20, 2020 – Philadelphia*

On October 15, 2020, the city released outdoor dining guidelines for restaurants. Moving forward, restaurants will not be able to utilize any open flame source, but can use overhead coverings and heating powered by electricity, propane, or natural gas.

*October 13, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective October 9, 2020, Gov. Tom Wolfe's order permits gatherings of up to 7,500 people in large outdoor venues and 3,750 at indoor venues.

*October 13, 2020 – Montgomery County*

On October 6, 2020, the County Board of Commissioners extended the emergency disaster declaration. The declaration will remain in place for 60 days.

## **Pennsylvania**

*October 6, 2020 – Philadelphia*

Effective October 2, 2020, Health Commissioner Thomas Farley increased restaurant indoor dining capacity from 25 to 50 percent.

## **Pennsylvania**

*September 29, 2020 – City of Pittsburgh*

On September 25, 2020, Pittsburgh Public Schools and the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers announced that in person classes would begin on November 9, 2020.



## Pennsylvania

*September 22, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective September 21, 2020, restaurants are permitted expand their maximum capacity to 50 percent.

## Pennsylvania

*September 22, 2020 – Luzerne County*

On September 15, 2020, County Manager David Pedri and Penn's Northeast CEO & President John Augustine, announced the availability of \$11 million in grants to help small businesses and nonprofit organizations that have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

*September 22, 2020 – Washington County*

On September 15, 2020, the County Commissioners announced that they would make available up to \$7.5 million dollars for non-profits and small businesses. The funds come from the County's \$18.6 million Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security Act federal funding. The maximum grant to be allocated is \$25,000.

## Pennsylvania

*September 22, 2020 – Philadelphia*

On September 17, 2020, Mayor Jim Kenney approved an update to the City's paid sick and safe time law. Moving forward, new Public Health Emergency Leave (PHEL) offers two weeks paid sick leave and is available for employees, gig workers and others who do not receive leave under the Federal Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA).

## Pennsylvania

*September 15, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective September 21, 2020, restaurants may increase indoor occupancy of customers from 25 percent to 50 percent of capacity, if they certify to the State that they are complying with all public health guidelines. In addition, restaurants are required to stop selling alcohol at 10:00 p.m.

*September 15, 2020 – Berks County*

On August 20, 2020, the Department of Health removed Iowa, Nebraska, North Carolina, Utah and Wisconsin from its travel advisory list.

*August 25, 2020 – Philadelphia*

Effective September 8, 2020, restaurants may resume indoor dining but must limit capacity to a maximum of 25 percent, close by 12:00 a.m., allow no more than four at a table and maintain social distancing guidelines.

## **Pennsylvania**

*August 25, 2020 – Cambria County*

On August 18, 2020, the County announced two new programs designed to provide financial relief to businesses, organizations and municipalities that have been hurt by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The programs will be funded using federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act funds provided through the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development's COVID-19 County Relief Block Grant.

*August 25, 2020 – Montgomery County*

On August 14, 2020, the County Commissioners extended the existing emergency disaster declaration for an additional 45 days.

## **Pennsylvania**

*August 18, 2020 – Business Assistance Program*

On August 10, 2020, businesses had the ability to start the application process for the COVID-19 Relief Statewide Small Business Assistance Program. The program provides grants of \$5000 to \$50,000 to small employers.

*July 28, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective July 24, 2020, visitors from Missouri and Wyoming are required to quarantine for 14 days when entering the State.

## **Pennsylvania**

*July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 12, 2020, Iowa, Kansas and Oklahoma were added the list of recommended states requiring visitors to self-quarantine for 14 days.

Mayor Jim Kenney announced the cancellation of all large outdoor events until at least February 28, 2020. Large events include the Mummers Parade and Philadelphia Marathon.

On July 15, 2020, Gov. Tom Wolf announced that bars and restaurants would not be able to provide bar service. Capacity levels in bars and restaurants are decreasing from 50 to 25 percent. The order also requires nightclubs to close. Gatherings of up to 25 people are permitted, while gyms must prioritize outdoor fitness activities (though, indoor operations are still allowed).

*July 21, 2020 – Telework*

On July 15, 2020, Gov. Tom Wolf announced that all businesses are required to conduct their operations in whole, or in part, remotely through individual teleworking of their employees in the jurisdiction(s) in which they do business. Where telework is not possible, employees may conduct in-person business operations, provided that businesses fully comply with all substantive aspects of The Order of the Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Health Directing Building Safety Measures, issued April 5, 2020.

*July 14, 2020 – Lebanon County*

Effective July 3, 2020, the County begins the green phase of the Commonwealth's opening plan.

## Pennsylvania

*July 7, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 1, 2020, Pennsylvania, Gov. Tom Wolf announced that masks are required to be worn in public whenever anyone leaves home and can't maintain a proper social distance.

Effective immediately, visitors are urged to quarantine if they are from a State with a rolling seven-day average where new cases are 10 or more per 100,000 residents, or positive results are 10% or more of those tested.

Philadelphia Mayor Jim Kenney enacts the Employee Protections in Connection with Covid-19, bringing protections for employees from retaliatory actions if they disclose information related to non-compliance with health orders or for refusal to work under unsafe conditions due to non-compliance.

On June 5, 2020 the following areas are expected to enter the Green Phase: Berks, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Lackawanna, Lancaster, Lehigh, Northampton, Montgomery, and Philadelphia.

Effective immediately, employers designated as “yellow” in the following counties: (Allegheny, Armstrong, Bedford, Blair, Butler, Cambria, Fayette, Fulton, Greene, Indiana, Somerset, Washington, Westmoreland, Bradford, Cameron, Centre, Clarion, Clearfield, Clinton, Crawford, Elk, Erie, Forest, Jefferson, Lawrence, Lycoming, McKean, Mercer, Montour, Northumberland, Potter, Snyder, Sullivan, Tioga, Union, Venango, and Warren) are required to appoint a Pandemic Safety Officer for each location. *June 23, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, nursing homes can allow visitors if staff and residents have been tested and there have not been any new coronavirus cases in the previous 28 days.

## Tennessee

*June 16, 2020 – Shelby County*

Effective immediately, the County will move to Phase 3 of its reopening plan.

## Tennessee

*June 16, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, nursing homes as well as long-term care facilities will allow visitors on a limited basis.

## Tennessee

*May 26, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, retail establishments and restaurants are permitted to operate in full capacity in 89 counties.

## Texas

*April 13, 2021 – Health Disclosure*

On April 5, 2021, Gov. Greg Abbott issued an [executive order](#) preventing government agencies, private businesses and institutions that receive State funding, from requiring individuals to show proof of being vaccinated against COVID-19.

## Texas

*March 30, 2021 – Bastrop County*

On March 22, 2021, the County Commissioners Court eliminated the face covering requirement for employees and visitors at county facilities.

## Texas

*March 30, 2021 – City of Waco*

The City is transitioning to Phase 1 of its reopening plan. Conventions and meetings can be held at 75% occupancy with restrictions.

## Texas

*March 30, 2021 – City of Austin*

On March 26, 2021, State District Judge Lora Livingston denied the State's request on Friday to cancel the City's order allowing officials to enforce mask requirements in Austin and Travis County.

## Texas

*March 23, 2021 – City of Round Rock*

On March 10, 2021, the City Council enacted an emergency ordinance enabling the City to keep its mask mandate in place until April 29, 2021.

## Texas

*March 16, 2021 – Tarrant County*

On March 2, 2021, County Judge B. Glen Whitley issued an executive order terminating the County's mask mandate for all entities providing goods or services to the public.

## Texas

*March 16, 2021 – City of Austin*

On March 9, 2021, City Council Member Greg Casar announced that the City's mask requirement would stay in effect even though the State of Texas rescinded the mandate for the entire state.

## Texas

*March 16, 2021 – Robertson County*

Effective March 10, 2021, County Judge rescinds the County's mandated mask order matching Gov. Abbott's statewide mandate.

## Texas

*March 16, 2021 – City of Odessa*

On March 9, 2021, the City Council voted to rescind the city's emergency declaration and mask requirement.

## Texas

*March 16, 2021 – City of College Station*

On March 11, 2021, the City Council approved the termination of its face covering requirements in order to comply with the statewide mandate.

## Texas

*March 9, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 2, 2021, Gov. Greg Abbott [announced](#) that he is rescinding the State's mask mandate and resuming normal operations for all businesses effective March 10, 2021.

## Texas

*March 9, 2021 – City of Dallas*

On March 4, 2021, Mayor Eric Johnson signed an order requiring the wearing of masks throughout the City.

## Texas

*March 2, 2021 – Tarrant County*

On February 23, 2021, County Judge Glen Whitley announced that the County was extending its mask requirement through May 25, 2021. In addition, the County will extend its declaration of disaster.

## Texas

*February 23, 2021 – HIPAA*

On February 19, 2021, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced the waiver of sanctions and penalties against a covered hospital for not complying with the following provisions of the HIPAA Privacy Rule:

- The requirements to obtain a patient's agreement to speak with family members or friends involved in the patient's care.
- The requirement to honor a patient's request to opt out of the facility directory
- The requirement to distribute a notice of privacy practices
- The patient's right to request privacy restrictions
- The patient's right to request confidential communications

## Texas

*February 9, 2021 – City of Amarillo*

On February 4, 2021, the City's mask requirement ended due to the hospitalization rate falling below 15%.

## Texas

*January 12, 2021 – Business Operations*

On January 5, 2021, the County's hospitalization rate triggered Gov. Greg Abbott's executive order limiting restaurants to a capacity of 50%, suspending elective surgeries and closing bars to indoor service. The following counties are affected:

*Austin - Colorado - Fort Bend - Harris - Matagorda - Montgomery - Walker - Waller*

## Texas

*January 12, 2021 – City of El Paso*

On January 5, 2021, the City Council approved an extension of their emergency ordinance and disaster declaration.

## Texas

*December 22, 2020 – City of El Paso*

On December 16, 2020, Judge Ricardo Samaniego announced a curfew (10:00 p.m. – 5:00 a.m.) going from December 23, 2020 through December 26, 2020 and December 30, 2020 through January 4, 2020.

## Texas

*December 15, 2020 – Fort Bend County*

Effective immediately, small businesses can apply for the Fort Bend Cares Act Small Business Grants. Grants range from \$5000 - \$25,000. [Click here to email questions.](#)

## Texas

*December 8, 2020 – Business Operations*

On December 3, 2020, hospitalizations in the North Texas Region exceeded thresholds set by Gov. Greg Abbott. As a result, restaurants and fitness centers/gyms will be required to limit their capacity to 50%. Bars that receive over 51% of their revenue from alcohol must close. Licensed hospitals are required to discontinue elective surgeries.

## Texas

*December 8, 2020 – City of Fort Worth*

On December 1, 2020, the City Council voted to extend its mask mandate until March 2, 2020.

## Texas

*December 8, 2020 – City of Houston*

On December 2, 2020, the City Council voted to utilize an additional \$10 million in CARES Act money to fund the Small Business Economic Relief Program.

## Texas

*December 8, 2020 – City of Odessa*

On December 1, 2020, the City Council approved an extension of its mask mandate. Patrons of a business are required to wear a face mask and occupancy is capped at 50%. Businesses not adhering to the mandate may be fined up to \$250.

## Texas

*December 8, 2020 – City of Laredo*

Effective December 4, 2020, the City implemented a curfew for all residents that will only affect social activities outside a business between the hours of 10 p.m. to 5 a.m. Violators may face a fine of up to \$1000.

## Texas

*December 1, 2020 – Tarrant County*

On November 24, 2020, County Judge Glen Whitley announced the County's mask mandate was extended to February 28, 2021.

## Texas

*November 10, 2020 – Uvalde County*

On November 9, 2020, Mayor Don McLaughlin announced that the County would extend its mask mandate.

## Texas

*November 3, 2020 – Reeves County*

Effective November 4, 2020, the County issued a mandate that all businesses require face masks through November 30, 2020.

## Texas

*October 27, 2020 – City of El Paso*

On October 25 2020, Judge Ricardo Samaniego issued a "stay at home" order that includes a 10:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. curfew. Those failing to comply can be fined up to \$500.

## Texas

*October 13, 2020 – Business Operations*

On October 7, 2020, Gov. Greg Abbott announced the starting October 14, 2020, that bars can open at 50 percent capacity with approval from county Judges in regions with low Covid-19 hospitalization rates.

## Texas

*September 22, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective September 21, 2020, retail stores, restaurants and office buildings are permitted to operate at a 75 percent capacity in 19 of 22 hospital regions.



## Texas

### *September 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On September 7, 2020, Gov. Greg Abbott extended the State's disaster declaration.

## Texas

### *September 15, 2020 – Laredo*

On September 8, 2020, the City Council approved the extension of the City's 10:00 p.m.-5:00 a.m. curfew until October 19, 2020.

## Texas

### *September 8, 2020 – Llano County*

On August 1, 2020, County Judge Ron Cunningham announced that the County would continue to keep its mask ordinance in place.

## Texas

### *September 1, 2020 – Business Operations*

On August 25, 2020, the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission announced that bars and restaurants could reopen if they utilized the services of a food truck or other vendor.

## Texas

### *September 1, 2020 – Ft. Worth*

On August 25, 2020, the City Council extended Mayor Betsy Price's mask requirement through December 1, 2020. In addition, all businesses are required to adopt a Health and Safety Policy requiring employees and customers to wear a face mask. Businesses that do not adhere to the requirement can be assessed a fine of up to \$500.

## Texas

### *August 25, 2020 – Unemployment Benefits*

On August 21, 2020, the State was approved by the federal government to provide \$300 per week (Federal Lost Wages Assistance Programs) in benefits to uninsured individuals. Virginia, Wisconsin.

## Texas

### *August 11, 2020 – Houston*

On August 5, 2020, the City Council approved an ordinance allowing restaurants to expand outdoor dining to parking lots. Seating areas that are larger than 600 square feet will require a permit.

## **Texas**

*August 11, 2020 – Business Operations*

On August 6, 2020, the Health and Human Services Commission of Texas announced that nursing and long-term care facilities are able to allow limited visitations. At nursing facilities, visits must be conducted outdoors. Long-term care facilities can have indoor and outdoor visit. The visitations can proceed if there have not been any confirmed COVID-19 cases in the last 14 days.

*August 11, 2020 – Houston*

On August 3, 2020, Mayor Sylvester Turner announced that individuals not wearing a face covering would receive a warning or a fine up to \$250.

## **Texas**

*August 4, 2020 – Houston*

On July 29, 2020, the City Council approved a \$15 million small business relief effort. Businesses will be eligible for up to \$50,000 in funds if they make less than \$2 million in revenue. Once funded, owners can apply them to payroll, rent, mortgages, personal protective gear for employees, marketing and accounts payable.

## **Texas**

*August 4, 2020 – Denton*

On July 28, 2020, the City Council extended the City's mask ordinance through August 31, 2020. All business are to require that employees and visitors wear face coverings while on premise.

## **Texas**

*July 14, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Gov. Greg Abbott suspended elective surgeries in hospitals in 11 out of 22 of the State's trauma service areas.

## **Texas**

*July 7, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 1, 2020, Gov. Greg Abbott issued an executive order requiring all individuals to wear a face covering in public in counties that have 20 or more positive cases.

## Texas

### *June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On June 23, 2020, Gov. Greg Abbott issued an order allowing municipalities and counties to impose Covid-19 restrictions. A judge, mayor and health authority have been granted the ability to limit gatherings to less than 100 individuals.

## Texas

### *June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On June 25, 2020, Gov. Greg Abbott paused the State's reopening plans due to an uptick in confirmed coronavirus infections. In addition, the Governor prohibited elective surgeries in the counties of Bexar, Dallas, Harris and Travis. On June 26, 2020, the Governor announced that bars and certain outdoor recreation businesses are required to cease operations. Restaurants will only be able to serve at 50 percent capacity.

## Texas

### *June 23, 2020 – Bexar County*

Effective June 17, 2020, employers are required to develop, implement and post a "Health and Safety Policy" that requires all employees or visitors to wear face coverings if 6 feet of separation cannot be maintained. An employer may be fined up to \$1000 for each violation.

## Texas

### *June 23, 2020 – Dallas County*

Effective June 19, 2020, employers are required develop, implement and post a "Health and Safety Policy" that requires all employees or visitors to wear face coverings if 6 feet of separation cannot be maintained. An employer may be fined up to \$500 for each violation.

## Texas

### *June 23, 2020 – Hidalgo*

Effective June 18, 2020, employers are required develop, implement and post a "Health and Safety Policy" that requires all employees or visitors to wear face coverings if 6 feet of separation cannot be maintained. An employer may be fined up to \$1000.

## Texas

*June 23, 2020 – Travis County*

Effective June 18, 2020, employers are required develop, implement and post a "Health and Safety Policy" that requires all employees or visitors to wear face coverings if 6 feet of separation cannot be maintained. An employer may be fined up to \$1000.

## Texas

*June 16, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, restaurants will be permitted to operate at 75 percent capacity.

## Texas

*June 9, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, the State moves into Phase 3 of its reopening plan. Bars can now allow up to 50 percent capacity, so long as customers remain seated. Restaurants are permitted to now seat up to 10 people to a table.

## Texas

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, food court dining areas in malls and water parks (25 percent capacity) are permitted to reopen. Outdoor professional sporting events can have fan attendance (25 percent capacity).

*May 26, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, restaurants can operate at 50 percent capacity; bars, breweries, bowling alleys, skating rinks, and aquariums can reopen at 25 percent capacity.

*May 19, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, office spaces, fitness centers, daycare and non-essential manufacturing organizations are permitted to resume operations with a maximum customer capacity of 25 percent.

## U.S. Virgin Islands

*August 25, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective Immediately, hotels, Airbnb accommodations, and other short-term rentals are prohibited from accepting any new reservations for 30 days as a COVID-related precaution.

## Utah

*April 13, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On April 7, 2021 Gov. Spencer Cox [ended](#) the State mask requirement effective on April 10, 2021,

## Utah

*April 13, 2021 – Salt Lake County*

On April 7, 2021, the County Council voted to terminate its mask mandate on April 10, 2021.

## Utah

*April 13, 2021 – Salt Lake City*

On April 7, 2021, Mayor Erin Mendenhall announced that the City would extend its mask mandate effective April 10, 2021 even though the State and County mandate expire on the April 9, 2021.

## Utah

*April 13, 2021 – Grand County*

On April 7, 2021, the Southeast Utah Health Department and County announced that its mask mandate would remain in effect June 15, 2021.

## Utah

*April 6, 2021 – Summit County*

On March 31, 2021, the County Council said they will not extend a limited mask order when the state mandate expires on April 10, 2021.

## Utah

*March 30, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 24, 2021, Gov. Spencer Cox approved legislation removing the State's mask mandate effective April 10, 2021.

## Utah

*March 30, 2021 – Kane County*

On March 26, 2021, the County Commission announced that facial masks were no longer required to be worn in the County.

## Utah

### *December 22, 2020 – Schools*

On December 17, 2020, Gov. Gary Hebert announced that students at the elementary, junior high and high school level will not be required to quarantine if both parties were wearing a mask when a potential exposure to someone with the virus occurred at a school.

## Utah

### *December 22, 2020 – Business Operations*

On December 17, 2020, Gov. Gary Hebert announced that the statewide ban on alcohol sales after 10 p.m. was terminated.

## Utah

### *November 10, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 8, 2020, Gov. Gary Herbert announced that he had issued a new state-of-emergency enacting a statewide mask mandate. Social gatherings are limited to people in the same households and there is a temporary hold on all school extracurricular activities. Those activities include athletic and intramural events until November 23, 2020.

## Utah

### *November 3, 2020 – Iron County*

On October 29, 2020, interim director of the Utah Department of Health Rich Saunders announced that the County was no longer required to maintain a face mask requirement.

## Utah

### *October 27, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 22, 2020, the interim executive director, Utah Department of Health, Rich Saunders announced that 21 counties were designated to be high-transmission areas. They are as follows:

Beaver, Box Elder, Cache, Carbon, Davis, Emery, Garfield, Grand, Juab, Millard, Morgan, Salt Lake, San Juan, Sanpete, Sevier, Summit, Tooele, Utah, Wasatch, Washington and Weber.

## Utah

### *October 27, 2020 – Summit County*

On October 21, 2020, the County Council voted to update its public health order keeping the County's mask mandate in place.

## Utah

### *October 20, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 13, 2020, Gov. Gary Herbert announced that the state would no longer utilize the color-coded guidance system opting to move to a system based on the severity of transmission levels.

## Utah

### *September 22, 2020 – Safety Requirements*

On September 19, 2020, Gov. Gary Herbert announced that the State would remain in its, "State-of-Emergency" until October 20, 2020.

## Utah

### *September 15, 2020 – Box Elder County*

On September 11, 2020, Gov. Gary Herbert ordered the County moved into the State's green phase of opening.

## Utah

### *September 15, 2020 – Carbon County*

On September 11, 2020, Gov. Gary Herbert ordered the county moved into the State's Green phase of opening.

## Utah

### *September 8, 2020 – Salt Lake City*

Effective September 4, 2020, Gov. Gary Herbert moved the City from the Orange to Yellow Phase of reopening.

## Utah

### *September 1, 2020 – Provo*

On August 27, 2020, the Municipal Council overrode a Mayoral Veto of Michelle Kaufusi to enact a facial covering mandate when individuals are indoors and outdoors in public areas and at large gatherings. A fine of \$55 may be assessed for non-compliance.

## Utah

### *August 25, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 24, 2020, Gov. Gary Herbert issued an Executive Order adopting version 4.10 of the Phased Guidelines. The updates primarily change terminology from "risk levels" to "levels of restriction." Other changes indicate that political subdivisions may adopt mask mandates without prior approval from the Utah Department of Health.

## Utah

### *August 4, 2020 – Business Operations*

On July 27, 2020, Gov. Gary Herbert, announced that restaurants in counties that are in the orange or yellow stage of reopening may resume self-serve buffets. The restaurants are required to replace serving utensils every 30 minutes, ensure customers use hand sanitizer whenever they enter a new food bar line and even “open 24-hours a day” establishments to close for cleaning and sanitizing every morning and evening.

## Utah

### *July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 16, 2020, Gov. Gary Herbert announced that 9 counties would move to the Green Phase of the State’s reopening plan. They include: Beaver, Daggett, Duchesne, Emery, Garfield, Millard, Piute, Uintah and Wayne.

### *July 21, 2020 – Schools*

On July 17, 2020, the Department of Health mandated the use of face coverings in public and private K-12 schools.

## Utah

### *July 7, 2020 – Salt Lake & Summit Counties*

Individuals are required to wear face coverings when social distancing is not possible.

## Utah

### *June 23, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective June 19, 2020, Beaver, Daggett, Duchesne, Emery, Garfield, Millard, Piute, Uintah and Wayne counties move to the green phase of reopening.

## Utah

### *June 16, 2020 – Kane County*

Effective immediately, via executive order, the County has been moved to the green phase.

## Utah

### *June 16, 2020 – Salt Lake City*

The City remains in the Orange Phase making it the lone city in the entire State, still in this Phase.



## Utah

### *June 2, 2020 – Covid-19 Lawsuits*

Effective immediately, a person is immune from civil liability for damages or an injury resulting from exposure of an individual to COVID-19 on the premises owned or operated by the person, or during an activity managed by the person. Immunity will not be provided in cases of willful misconduct, reckless infliction of harm or intentional infliction of harm.

## Utah

### *May 19, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, all areas will move from the “Orange” to the “Yellow” Phase with the following exceptions: Salt Lake City, West Valley City, Summit County and Grand County. All qualified “Yellow” Phase businesses are permitted to reopen, though face coverings are required in public. In addition, gatherings must be capped at 50 people and industry-specific guidelines must be adhered to.

## Vermont

### *April 13, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On April 6, 2021, Gov. Phil Scott announced that the State would transition to a three-month reopening plan, the [Vermont Forward](#) plan.

## Vermont

### *March 30, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective March 24, 2021, Gov. Phil Scott’s announcement allowed bars to reopen at 50% capacity with table service ending at 10 p.m.

## Vermont

### *March 9, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 5, 2021, Gov. Phil Scott announced that fully vaccinated individuals (COVID-19) can gather with other vaccinated individuals without limitations in a group setting.

## Vermont

### *February 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 19, 2021, Gov. Phil Scott announced that out of state visitors that have completed their COVID vaccine regiment will not be required to quarantine when entering the State.

## **Vermont**

*February 23, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 15, 2021, Gov. Phil Scott extended the state's COVID-19 [state of emergency](#) through March 15, 2021.

## **Vermont**

*January 19, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On January 14, 2021, Gov. Chris Sununu announced an extension to the State's mask requirement.

## **Vermont**

*December 22, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 15, 2020, Gov. Phil Scott issued an executive order to extend the Covid-19 state of emergency until January 15, 2021.

## **Vermont**

*November 17, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 11, 2020, Gov. Phil Scott issued an executive order requiring all out-of-state travelers to self-quarantine for 14 days. Visitors can end their quarantine after seven days if they do not have symptoms and can produce a negative COVID-19 test.

*October 27, 2020 – Business Operations*

On October 20, 2020, Gov. Phil Scott announced an expansion of the State's Economic Recovery Grants, with an additional \$76 million in funds from the \$1.25 billion the State received from the Federal CARES Act. [Click here for more information.](#)

*October 20, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 15, 2020, Gov. Phil Scott extended the state of emergency until November 15, 2020.

## **Vermont**

*September 29, 2020 – Schools*

On September 22, 2020, Education Secretary Dan French announced that schools would move to step 3 of its reopening plan, bringing use of gyms and common areas for small groups of students.

## **Vermont**

### *August 18, 2020 – Business Operations*

On August 12, 2020, the Agency of Commerce and Community Development updated their guidance to businesses to support the rule that businesses, non-profit and government entities may decline service to individuals who are not wearing a mask. This includes refusing service to those who are exempt from the mask mandate. However, in such circumstances, the business shall provide an alternate way for those unable to wear a mask to access the business, such as offering curbside pick-up, delivery, or other innovative solution(s).

## **Vermont**

### *August 18, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 14, 2020, Gov. Phil Scott announced that the “state of emergency” would be extended until September 15, 2020.

## **Vermont**

### *August 4, 2020 – Schools*

On July 28, 2020, Gov. Phil Scott announced that the reopening of schools would take place on September 8, 2020. Individual school districts will decide if students will operate online or physically in the school.

## **Vermont**

### *July 28, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective August 1, 2020, Gov. Phil Scott, announced a statewide face-covering requirement. All individuals over the age of 2 must wear a mask when in public and physical distancing is not possible.

## **Vermont**

### *July 14, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective July 10, 2020, outdoor venues can exceed the 150 individual maximum capacity if there is an additional area spaced 25 feet apart with barricade.

## **Vermont**

### *June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective July 1, 2020, the state’s travel restrictions are eased to allow individuals from low risk counties in the following states Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Washington D.C. and West Virginia to travel to Vermont.

## **Vermont**

### *June 30, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective June 26, 2020, restaurants, bars and places of worship are permitted to operate at 50 percent capacity, or one person per 100 square feet, with a maximum of 75 people indoor and 150 outdoors.

### *June 23, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, long-term care facilities can allow patient visits limited to two visitors per day. Events, arts, culture, entertainment venues and restaurants can operate at 50 percent capacity beginning June 26, 2020.

### *June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

The State of Emergency has been extended to July 15, 2020. Effective immediately, visitors from other states will need to complete either a 14-day quarantine or a 7-day quarantine followed by a negative COVID-19 test result.

Effective June 8, 2020, restaurants are permitted to reopen to indoor dining at 25 percent capacity or 10 total customers and staff combined. Quarantine requirements are removed for out-of-state travelers from counties across New England that similar COVID-19 caseloads to Vermont.

### *June 2, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, social gatherings now may have up to 25 participants. Fitness centers/gyms, nail salons, galleries, museums, theaters and tattoo parlors, will be allowed to reopen at 25 percent capacity.

Effective May 22, 2020, hotels, bed & breakfasts and campgrounds are permitted to reopen and take reservations. Effective July 1, 2021, Gov. Ralph Northam approves legislation requiring paid sick leave for home health workers. To be eligible, the home health worker is required to work an average of at least 20 hours per week or 90 hours per month. [VA H.B. 2137](#)

*March 30, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 23, 2021, Gov. Ralph Northam announced that effective April 1, 2021, indoor social gatherings may increase to fifty individuals and outdoor gatherings will now allow for 100 individuals.

## Virginia

*March 30, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective March 26, 2021, the [Permanent Standard for Infectious Disease Prevention of the SARS-CoV-2 Virus that causes COVID-19](#) requires employers with or job tasks classified as "very high" or "high" exposure risk or workplace hazards to provide training to all employees working at the work site. In addition, employers with employees in the "very high" or "high" classification, or with 11 or more "medium" classified employees, are required to implement a written [Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response Plan](#).

## Virginia

*March 23, 2021 – Legislative Items*

On March 19, 2021, Gov. Ralph Northam approved the following employer related legislation:

[HB 1879](#) - Delivery and take-out of alcoholic beverages is permitted until July 1, 2022.

[SB 1205](#) - Provides programs to manage career fatigue and increase the well-being of health care providers and medical students.

[HB 2006](#) - Eligibility for the Child Care Subsidy Program designed to provide families in Virginia with access to early childcare education.

## Virginia

*March 2, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 23, 2021, Gov. Ralph Northam announced that the gathering limit on outdoor entertainment venues will increase to 30% or 1000 individuals. The outdoor gathering limit is increasing from 10 to 25 people.

## Virginia

### *February 2, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

Effective March 26, 2021 the Permanent Standard for Infectious Disease Prevention of the Sars-CoV-2 Virus that causes COVID -19 requires employers with workplace hazards or job tasks classified as "very high" or "high" exposure risk to provide training to all employees working at the work site. The Training must include:

- The signs and symptoms of COVID-19
- The characteristics and methods of transmission of COVID-19
- Risk factors for severe COVID-19 illness (i.e. underlying health conditions & advancing age)
- Safe and healthy work practices
- Personal protective equipment (PPE)
- The employer's Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response Plan, where applicable
- The anti-discrimination provisions of this Standard

### *December 22, 2020 – Accomack County*

On December 16, 2020, the Board of Supervisors extended its State of Emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

## Virginia

### *December 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective December 14, 2020, Gov. Ralph Northam announced a statewide curfew from 12:00 a.m. – 5 a.m. In addition, individuals are required to wear a face mask when outdoors and social distancing isn't possible and all indoor areas shared with others, except for households. Gatherings are limited to 10 individuals.

## Virginia

### *December 15, 2020 – Amherst County*

On December 9, 2020 Board of Supervisors announced the availability of the Back in Business Grant. [Click here for additional rant can be found here.](#)

## Virginia

### *November 17, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 13, 2020, Gov. Ralph Northham reduced the capacity of individuals permitted for an indoor gathering to 25. Restaurants are prohibited from providing alcohol after 10:00 p.m. and must close at 12:00 a.m.

## Virginia

*September 29, 2020 – City of Charlottesville*

On September 21, 2020 the City Council voted to extend its existing Covid-19 ordinance. Indoor occupancy at food establishments, micro-producers, and small breweries must not be more than 50 percent of the lowest occupancy load on the certificate of occupancy, issued by the City of Charlottesville. If the building or structure does not have an occupancy load established on a certificate of occupancy issued by the City of Charlottesville, indoor occupancy must not be more than 50 individuals.

*September 29, 2020 – Albemarle County*

On September 22, 2020, the County Board of Supervisors, approved the County Safe Spaces & Places Grant Program, designed for businesses that have temporarily expanded or will temporarily expand outdoors to serve customers due to COVID-19, is available in amounts of \$5,000 to \$25,000. On September 10, 2020, Gov. Ralph Northam announced that localities in Hampton Roads will join the rest of the Commonwealth in Phase Three of the "Forward Virginia" recovery plan.

Effective October 1, 2020, those not complying with the face covering ordinance can be fined \$100.

*September 1, 2020 – Arlington County*

On August 26, 2020, County Manager Mark Schwartz announced the county will enforce a new ordinance that prohibits groups of more than three people in areas of Wilson Boulevard, Clarendon Boulevard and Crystal City. Police officers have the ability to fine individuals up to \$100 for non-compliance.

## Virginia

*September 1, 2020 – Virginia Beach*

On August 18, 2020, the City Council passed an ordinance to provide a one-time grant to first responders that includes human services and city employees within the health department.

*August 18, 2020 – Albemarle County*

On August 14, 2020, the County announced that businesses have the ability to create or expand existing outdoor seating to better serve customers. [Click here to view or download the application for Temporary Outdoor Seating.](#)

*August 4, 2020 – Virginia Beach*

Effective July 31, 2020, Gov. Ralph Northam's executive order limits gatherings to 50 people and limits indoor dining capacity to 50 percent. In addition, the establishments are prohibited from serving alcohol after 10:00 PM.

*August 4, 2020 – Norfolk*

Effective July 31, 2020, Gov. Ralph Northam's executive order limits gatherings to 50 people and limits indoor dining capacity to 50 percent. In addition, the establishments are prohibited from serving alcohol after 10:00 PM.

## Virginia

*August 4, 2020 – Charlottesville*

Effective August 1, 2020, the maximum number of individuals allowed at a gathering is 50.

## Virginia

*August 4, 2020 – Albemarle County*

On July 27, 2020, the board of supervisors passed regulations limiting occupancy for food establishments, wineries, breweries, and distilleries to 50 percent occupancy or 50 individuals.



## Virginia

*August 4, 2020 – Arlington*

On July 31, 2020, the County Board adopted an emergency ordinance Friday, mandating that pedestrians maintain a distance of least 6 feet apart from others and do not congregate in groups of three or more individuals (otherwise risk a fine of \$100).

## Virginia

*July 21, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 16, 2020, the safety and health codes board required businesses to implement safety measures to protect employees from the spread of Covid-19. Employers must notify workers of possible exposure to infected co-workers within 24 hours, prohibit suspected Covid-19 infected employees from working onsite and maintain various sanitation rules.

*June 30, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective July 1, 2020, Gov. Ralph Northam announced the Commonwealth will enter Phase 3 of its reopening plan. Bars, retailers and restaurants will not have any capacity restrictions. The limit on gatherings will increase to 250 individuals.

Effective immediately, all of the State has entered Phase 2 of the reopening plan. Restaurants can operate at 50 percent capacity and the limit on social gatherings has been increased to 50 people.

On March 12, 2021, Gov. Jay Inslee announced on his [Twitter page](#) that he will be issuing an emergency proclamation requiring elementary schools to provide students at least two partial days of in-person instruction by April 5, 2021

On March 9, 2021, the County Council voted to have grocery store employees receive an additional \$4.00 in hazard pay.

*March 2, 2021 – Licensing Fees*

On February 28, Gov. Jay Inslee approved a bill waiving the annual liquor license for restaurants, wineries, breweries and distilleries.

## Washington

*February 16, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 11, 2021, Gov. Jay Inslee announced that the following regions: East, North, North Central, Northwest and Southwest would transition to Phase 2 of the Healthy Washington Recovery Plan. Only the South-Central region (Benton, Franklin, Columbia, Kittitas, Walla Walla and Yakima counties) remain in Phase 1.

## Washington

*February 2, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

In February 1, 2021, Gov. Jay Inslee announced a change to the state's criteria for regions to move between phases. Moving forward, a region is required to meet two of the four public health metrics to move into Phase 2.

## Washington

*February 2, 2021 – Panhandle Counties*

On January 28, 2021, the Panhandle Board of Health extended its mask mandate until April 22, 2021. The Panhandle includes the following counties; Kootenai, Shoshone, Boundary, Bonner and Benewah.

On January 28, 2021, Gov. Jay Inslee announced that restaurants can reopen for indoor dining at 25% until February 15, 2021.

## Washington

*February 2, 2021 – City of Seattle*

On January 25, 2021, the City Council voted to enact legislation providing \$4.00 per hour in hazard pay to grocery store workers. Employers with 500 or more worldwide workers are eligible.

## Washington

*January 26, 2021 – Skagit County*

On January 15, 2021, the County Board of Health announced that individuals not wearing a face mask would receive a fine.

## Washington

*January 12, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

Effective January 11, 2021, Gov. Jay Inslee put in place the “Healthy Washington” plan. The plan divides the State into eight regions, replacing the county-level reopening plan. Each region begins in Phase 1, which limits capacity at gyms and prohibits indoor dining and at-home indoor gatherings with people outside the household. Phase 2 allows restaurants to reopen at 50%.

*January 5, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On December 30, 2020, Gov. Jay Inslee announced that the State’s Covid-19 restrictions were extended until January 11, 2021.

*December 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 8, 2020, Gov. Jay Inslee announced the extension of the State's Covid-19 restrictions. Indoor gatherings are only permitted with individuals outside the household if they have quarantined for a week and received a negative COVID-19 test. Outdoor gatherings are limited to five people.

Effective November 16, 2020, social gatherings with members of a different households is prohibited unless those individuals quarantine for 14 days or quarantine for seven days and receive a negative COVID-19 test.

On November 16, 2020, Gov. Jay Inslee announced that indoor dining at restaurants and bars is prohibited and the maximum table capacity for outdoor dining is five people. Business meetings are prohibited.

*October 20, 2020 – Douglas County*

On October 13, 2020, Gov. Jay Inslee announced that the county would advance to phase 2 of the state's reopening plan.

*October 20, 2020 – Franklin County*

On October 13, 2020, Gov. Jay Inslee announced that the county would advance to phase 2 of the state's reopening plan.

The facilities are required to limit their maximum occupancy to 25 percent of their typical occupancy limit.

Effective June 26, 2020, all individuals are required to wear a face covering in both indoor and outdoor public spaces (unless a social distance of six feet is maintained). Individuals do not have to wear a covering outdoors when maintaining a distance of 6 feet from others.

*June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, Asotin County will move to Phase 3 while Chelan and Douglas Counties enter a modified Phase 1 after being approved by Secretary of State John Wiesman.

## Washington

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, the counties of Cowlitz, Grant, Island, Jefferson, Mason, Pacific and San Juan are permitted to move to Phase 2 of the State's reopening plan.

Effective immediately, family medical and dental practices may reopen if they maintain enough personal protective equipment for staff, enforce social distancing, and check patients for COVID-19 symptoms. Effective immediately, Seattle's Paid Sick and Safe Time (PSST) has been amended to permit employees to utilize their PSST if a family member or place of care has been closed. In addition, employees working at companies with 250 workers or more are allowed to use PSST if their workplace is closed for any health or safety reason.

## **Washington D.C.**

*February 9, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On February 2, 2021, the D.C. Council approved the Protecting Businesses and Workers from COVID-19 Congressional Review Emergency Declaration Resolution of 2021. The legislation extends mandates to ensure that social distancing protocols are adhered to by employers.

*January 26, 2021 – Worker Protection*

Effective February 1, 2021, the Displaced Workers Right to Reinstatement and Retention Amendment Act of 2020 requires retail and hospitality employers with fifty or more employees to reinstate workers displaced during the COVID-19 emergency before offering positions to other applicants.

## **Washington D.C.**

*December 22, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective December 23, 2020, Mayor Muriel Bower's prohibits restaurants from indoor dining.

## **Washington D.C.**

*November 10, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 4, 2020, Mayor Muriel Bowser announced that visitors to the City must take a COVID-19 test within 72 hours of arrival.

## **Washington D.C.**

*October 27, 2020 – District Poster*

The district released the "Time off to Vote Poster" [which can be found by clicking here](#).

## **Washington D.C.**

*October 20, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 19, 2020, the District's Health Department added Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Rhode Island to its self-quarantine list.

*August 25, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On August 13, 2020, the District authorized the Protecting Businesses and Workers from COVID-19 Emergency Amendment Act of 2020. The Law states that employers cannot retaliate against an employee because the employee: has tested positive or is quarantining because of COVID-19, is caring for someone who has symptoms or is quarantining because of COVID-19.

## **Washington D.C.**

*July 28, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 22, 2020, Mayor Muriel Bowser announced that residents over three years of age are required to wear a mask when leaving their home. Employers are required to provide masks for their workers.

## **Washington D.C.**

*June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, the District has moved to Stage 1 of its reopening plan. Gatherings of more than 10 people are prohibited, while individuals must wear masks or face coverings and maintain a social distance of at least 6 feet.

Effective immediately, the District enters Phase 1, allowing for gatherings up to 10 individuals, provided there is social distancing and face coverings. On January 28, 2021, the County Health Department issued a mask mandate going into effect February 1, 2021.

## West Virginia

*January 5, 2021 – Schools*

On December 30, 2020, Gov. Jim Justice announced that elementary and middle schools would reopen to in-person classes effective January 19, 2021.

*November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 13, 2020, Gov. Jim Justice issued an executive order requiring all individuals to wear a mask in indoor public spaces unless eating or drinking.

*October 13, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 5, 2020, Gov. Jim Justice issued an executive order permitting outdoor live music performances and certain indoor music performances to resume as long as safety protocols are maintained.

On October 9, 2020, Gov. Jim Justice announced that bars may reopen effective October 13, 2020.

## **West Virginia**

*September 8, 2020 – Monongalia County*

On September 2, 2020, Gov. Jim Justice once again closed all bars in the County.

## **West Virginia**

*September 8, 2020 – Morgantown*

On September 1, 2020, the City Council approved an ordinance limiting gatherings to 25 individuals. Penalties for violating the ordinance range from \$25 to \$500.

## **West Virginia**

*September 1, 2020 – Business Operations*

On August 24, 2020, Gov. Jim Justice announced that nursing home visits would be permitted in all counties with the exceptions of Monroe and Logan.

## **West Virginia**

*August 25, 2020 – Monongalia County*

Effective August 31, 2020, bars in the County are permitted to reopen based on an announcement by Gov. Jim Justice.

## **West Virginia**

*August 18, 2020 – Safety precautions*

On August 12, 2020, Gov. Jim Justice announced that nursing home visits are prohibited unless it is an emergency or life/death situation.

## **West Virginia**

*August 18, 2020 – Schools*

On August 14, 2020, Gov. Jim Justice announced a new metric and color code system that will determine how in-person instruction, athletics, and other extracurricular activities are conducted at West Virginia's pre-kindergarten through 12th grade schools, to ensure the safety of students, teachers, service personnel, and the community as a whole. Schools in green and yellow counties will be able to reopen for in-person instruction on the statewide school opening date (currently Sept. 8, but a finalized date may not be available until Sept. 1). Schools in the red and orange phase counties will be required to conduct classes online for the time being.

Public gatherings will increase from 25 to 100 people. On June 10, 2020 out-of-state visitors may utilize private campgrounds and state park campgrounds, including cabins and lodges.

## **West Virginia**

*June 2, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, zoos, museums and indoor and outdoor bars can reopen (50 percent capacity).

## **West Virginia**

*May 26, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, indoor shopping malls, restaurants, large retail stores, outdoor recreation rental businesses and tanning establishments may reopen. In addition, only State residents will be able to visit the State’s parks.

## **West Virginia**

*May 19, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, fitness centers, gymnasiums and recreation centers can reopen at 40 percent of maximum operating capacity and must keep equipment separated to allow for at least six feet of space between users.

## **Wisconsin**

*April 20, 2021 – Business Operations*

On April 14, 2021, the Supreme Court of Wisconsin announced that Gov. Tony Evers does not have the ability to issue capacity guidelines for businesses without legislative approval.

## Wisconsin

*April 6, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 31, 2021, the Wisconsin Supreme Court overturned Gov. Tony Ever's mask mandate and COVID-19 emergency order. Local governments have the ability to institute their own legislation.

## Wisconsin

*April 6, 2021 – Waukesha County*

On March 31, 2021, County Executive Paul Farrow announced that the County would not be instituting a facial mask mandate.

## Wisconsin

*April 6, 2021 – Outagamie County*

On March 31, 2021, County Executive Tom Nelson announced that the County is instituting a mask mandate for all individuals over the age of five. The cities of Appleton and the Oneida Nation will institute their own ordinances.

## Wisconsin

*April 6, 2021 – City & County of Eau Claire*

On March 31, 2021, the City and County released a press release requiring any person who is age 5 or older, and who is located indoors or in an enclosed space, other than a private residence, to wear a face covering. The ordinance is in place through June 30, 2021.

## Wisconsin

*April 6, 2021 – Portage County*

On April 1, 2021, County Executive Chris Holman announced that the County will issue a local emergency order requiring face coverings.

## Wisconsin

*April 6, 2021 – City of Green Bay*

On April 1, 2021, the City Council approved a face mask mandate through May 5, 2021.

## Wisconsin

*April 6, 2021 – Portage County*

On April 1, 2021, County Executive Chris Holman announced a local emergency order mandating masks throughout the County.

## Wisconsin

*April 6, 2021 – Pierce County*

On April 1, 2021, Public Health Director AZ Snyder announced that the County's mask mandate would remain in place for all individuals over the age of five.

## Wisconsin

*April 6, 2021 – City of Oshkosh*

On March 31, 2021, the Common Council voted to enact a mask mandate through April 30, 2021.

## Wisconsin

*March 30, 2021 – Vaccine Administration*

On March 22, 2021, Gov. Tony Evers approved legislation permitting dentists the ability to administer the COVID-19 vaccine after they have completed an eight-hour training course.

## Wisconsin

*March 30, 2021 – Dane County*

On March 24, 2021, Colin Murray, executive director of Dane Buy Local announced that the County was making available \$15 million in grant funding for small businesses. Applications are expected to be available in mid-April.

## Wisconsin

*March 23, 2021 – City of Kenosha*

On March 15, 2021, the City Council approved an extension of its mask mandate until May 27, 2021.

## Wisconsin

*March 23, 2021 – Washington County*

On March 19, 2021, County Executive Josh Schoemann announced the County would not enforce statewide rules relating to COVID-19 restrictions.

## Wisconsin

*March 23, 2021 – City of Racine*

Effective March 22, 2021, the Safer Racine Ordinance allows restaurants, gyms and religious spaces to operate at 75 percent capacity.



## Wisconsin

*March 16, 2021 – City of Oshkosh*

On March 11, 2021, the City Council approved an ordinance requiring facial masks be worn should another government entity (federal, state, county) enact legislation to end a mask requirement. The ordinance is in place through April 30, 2021.

## Wisconsin

*March 2, 2021 – Employer Liability*

On February 25, 2021, Gov. Tony Evers signed [legislation](#) providing civil liability protection for employers due to an act or failure to act resulting in or relating to an individual's exposure to COVID-19 in the course of or through the performance or provision of the entity's functions or services. The immunity is retroactive back to March 1, 2020 as long as an action has not been filed.

## Wisconsin

*March 2, 2021 – Winnebago County*

On February 23, 2021, the Board of Supervisors voted to postpone its mask mandate.

## Wisconsin

*February 23, 2021 – Winnebago County*

On February 16, 2021, the County Health Department announced that a facial coverage order would go into place if the state mask mandate was overturned.

## Wisconsin

*February 9, 2021 – Eau Claire County*

On February 2, 2021, the County Board approved a local mask mandate to be put in place if the state mask mandate expires.

## Wisconsin

*February 9, 2021 – City of Green Bay*

On February 2, 2021, the City Council extended their mask requirement through March 31, 2021.

*February 9, 2021 – Dane County*

On February 8, 2021, Public Health Madison and the County announced that 50 individuals at an indoor gathering and 150 at an outdoor gathering was permissible, if food and drink was not available. If food and drink are offered, limits shift to 25 people inside and 100 people outside.

## Wisconsin

*February 9, 2021 – La Crosse County*

On January 29, 2021, Health Director Jen Rombalski issued an advisory requiring individual over the age of five to wear a mask inside public areas.

## Wisconsin

*January 26, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On January 19, 2021, Gov. Tony Evers announced that he was extending the State's public health emergency and the statewide mask requirement until March 20, 2021.

## Wisconsin

*January 26, 2021 – City of Wausau*

On January 18, 2021, the Public Health and Safety Committee voted to extend the City's mask mandate until March 31, 2021.

## Wisconsin

*January 19, 2021 – Safety Precaution*

On January 15, 2021, Gov. Tony Evers announced an extension of the State's mask mandate for an additional 60 days.

## Wisconsin

*January 19, 2021 – City of Milwaukee*

On January 15, 2021, the City's health order limiting capacity at restaurants and bars expired allowing those with previously approved full-capacity safety plans to resume operations at full capacity.

## Wisconsin

*January 19, 2021 – City of Milwaukee*

On January 15, 2021, the Milwaukee Health Department (MHD) announced that the City was returning to Phase 4.2 of the public health and safety order "Moving Milwaukee Forward."

*January 12, 2021 – Dane County*

On January 5, 2021, County Executive Joe Parisi announced a partnership with Dane Buy Local to provide grants of up to \$50,000 for local businesses affected by Covid-19. [Click here for grant applications.](#)

## Wisconsin

*December 8, 2020 – Grants*

On December 3, 2020, Gov. Tony Evers announced the availability of grants for restaurants and specific small businesses through the We're All in for Restaurants program. Businesses will not have to apply for the grants, but will be identified and contacted directly by the Department of Revenue (DOR) based on the businesses' state tax records.

## Wisconsin

*December 8, 2020 – City of Racine*

On December 2, 2020, the City Council voted to extend the City's mask mandate through June 20, 2021. In addition, the city's emergency declaration will be extended as well.

## Wisconsin

*November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 20, 2020, Gov. Tony Evers issued an order requiring individuals over the age of five to wear a face mask when indoors and in an enclosed space.

## Wisconsin

*November 24, 2020 – City of Kenosha*

On November 14, 2020, the City Council voted to require face masks in the city. Individuals may be fined from \$25 to \$100 for violations. Businesses can receive a fine up to \$250 for not adhering to the mandate.

## Wisconsin

*November 24, 2020 – Winnebago County*

On November 17, 2020, the County Board approved an ordinance allowing its Health Officer to have the ability to enforce orders. Those not adhering to the order may be fined from \$100 to \$500 as well as license suspension.

## Wisconsin

*November 17, 2020 – City of Wausau*

On November 10, 2020, the City Council voted to proceed with a mask mandate when the statewide order expires on November 21, 2020.

## Wisconsin

*November 3, 2020 – City of Racine*

On October 28, 2020, Public Health Administrator Dottie-Kay Bowersox announced the enforcement of the “Safer Racine Rules and Mask Requirement.” City staff will be out in the community stopping by locations to monitor compliance. Violations include a forfeiture of up to \$250. And individuals violating the mask requirement may receive a \$25 fine, followed by a \$50 fine for a second offense, then \$100 for a third offense. A business can be fined from \$50 up to \$500.

*October 27, 2020 – State Poster*

Effective November 2, 2020, employers covered by Wisconsin's Unemployment Insurance (UI) law are required to display the poster in each workplace (in suitable location where all employees will readily see them). [It can be viewed/downloaded by clicking here.](#)

*October 20, 2020 – Business Operations*

On October 14, 2020, Sawyer County Circuit Judge John Yackel blocked Gov. Tony Evers order to limit the number of individuals allowed in bars, restaurants and other indoor places.

*October 13, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On October 6, 2020, Gov. Tony Evers issued an executive order limiting public gatherings to 25 percent of the total occupancy limits of a room or building.

## Wisconsin

*September 29, 2020 – Safety precautions*

On September 22, 2020, Gov. Tony Evers extended the State's enforced mask requirement until November 21, 2020. [Click here for details.](#)

*August 25, 2020 – Schools*

On August 18, 2020, the state Department of Health Services released a decision tool for individuals and families to utilize when contemplating whether to participate in an outside the home activities. [Click here to view/download the tool.](#)

Individuals that interfere with a public health investigation are subject to a fine of \$100 to \$500 for each violation.

*August 4, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective August 1, 2020, via order from Gov. Tony Evers, individuals 5 years-of-age and older are required to wear face coverings in public. Individuals not wearing a face covering are subject to fines up to \$200.

## Wisconsin

*August 4, 2020 – Milwaukee*

On July 31, 2020, the Milwaukee Health Department announced that restaurants and bars may operate at 100 percent capacity after they obtain approval from the department for their safety plan and complete the risk assessment tool. *July 28, 2020 – Door County*

Effective July 24, 2020, face coverings are required for all individuals over the age of 2 when in the public.

## Wisconsin

*July 28, 2020 – Green Bay*

Effective July 27, 2020, individuals are required to wear a face covering in public. . A business can require customers to wear masks while inside. Police could be called for people who refuse and become disruptive. They would be subject to a fine for trespassing.

## Wisconsin

*July 28, 2020 – Racine*

On July 21, 2020, the Racine Common Council approved an ordinance that requires individuals to wear a face covering when in an indoor public space, outdoor public space and six feet within another person who isn't a member of the person's family or household, or riding public transportation.

## Wisconsin

*July 21, 2020 – Ashland County*

Effective July 17, 2020 the County issued an emergency advisory requiring a face covering while in a local building.

## Wisconsin

*July 21, 2020 – Bayfield County*

Effective July 17, 2020 the County issued an emergency advisory requiring a face covering while in a local building.

## Wisconsin

*July 14, 2020 – Dane County*

Effective July 13, 2020, face coverings must be worn, indoors, with the following exceptions: if the individual is at home or 5 years-of-age or younger.

## Wisconsin

*July 14, 2020 – Milwaukee*

On July 13, 2020, The Common Council voted to make face coverings mandatory in the City. Mayor Tom Barrett has stated that he will sign the legislation later this week.

## Wisconsin

*July 7, 2020 – Dane County*

Effective July 2, 2020, County health officials announced the closing of indoor service in bars and limiting restaurants to 25 percent capacity.

## Wisconsin

*July 7, 2020 – Milwaukee*

Effective July 1, 2020, the City begins Phase 4 of its reopening plan. Effective July 1, 2020, gyms, restaurants and bars will be able to open at 50 percent capacity. Retail stores will be able to open at 75 percent.

## Wisconsin

*June 9, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective June 10, 2020, campgrounds located in state parks are allowed to reopen.

## Wyoming

*April 20, 2021 – Teton County*

On April 14, 2021, District Health Officer Travis Riddell, MD extended the County's health order through May 17, 2021.

## Wyoming

*March 16, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 8, 2021, Gov. Mark Gordon announced that the State's mask requirement will end on March 16, 2021.

## Wyoming

*March 16, 2021 – Teton County*

On March 12, 2021, County health officer Dr. Travis Riddell requested a local health order to permit the County to keep its mask mandate in place until April 16, 2021 for individuals over the age of twelve.

## Wyoming

*March 9, 2021 – Safety Precautions*

On March 8, 2021, Gov. Mark Gordon announced that effective March 16, 2021, bars, restaurants, theaters and fitness centers/gyms can resume normal operations. In addition, the state expects to remove its mask mandate.

## Wyoming

*March 2, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 25, 2021, Gov. Mark Gordon announced that hair and nail salons, barber shops, tattoo and massage parlors and other cosmetology businesses are not required to monitor their customers for symptoms, maintain a record of customers for contact tracing purposes or restrict the number of customers allowed in the facility at one time. Restaurants can reopen buffet and self-service stations. Individuals are permitted to gather in groups of fifty without social distancing.

## Wyoming

*March 2, 2021 – Washakie County*

On February 23, 2021, the State adhered to requests made by Public Health Officer Dr. Amber Moss to terminate the County's mask mandate.

## Wyoming

*February 16, 2021 – Business Operations*

On February 11, 2021, Gov. Mark Gordon announced that effective February 15, 2021, groups of eight will be allowed to sit together in restaurants and theaters. Gatherings without social distance increases to 25 individuals.

## Wyoming

*January 26, 2021 – Business Operations*

On January 21, 2021, Gov. Mark Gordon announced that indoor gatherings had a maximum capacity of 25% or 250 people. Outdoor gatherings have a maximum of 500 individuals.

## Wyoming

*January 5, 2021 – Business Operations*

Effective January 9, 2021, restaurants and bars may serve alcohol after 10:00 p.m. In addition, fitness centers/gyms can have classes of up to 25 individuals.

## Wyoming

*December 15, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On December 7, 2020, Gov. Mark Gordon issued a mask mandate for all individuals in the State. Restaurants and bars are required to close at 10:00 p.m. Gatherings are limited to 10 people.

## Wyoming

*December 8, 2020 – Albany County*

On December 1, 2020, County Public Health Officer Dr. Jean Allais extended the County mask mandate until January 4, 2021. All individuals over the age of 12 are required to wear a face mask.

## Wyoming

*December 8, 2020 – Sweetwater County*

On December 4, 2020, State Health Officer Alexia Harris approved the extension of the County's mask mandate through January 8, 2021.



## Wyoming

*December 8, 2020 – Natrona County*

On December 4, 2020, Health Officer Mark Dowell extended the County's mask mandate through January 8, 2020.

## Wyoming

*December 1, 2020 – Teton County*

On November 30, 2020, District Health Officer, Travis Riddell announced that the County amended its facial mask ordinance. Moving forward individuals are required to wear a mask when in a business and unable to maintain social distancing protocols.

## Wyoming

*November 24, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On November 19, 2020, Gov. Mark Gordon announced that indoors gatherings are limited to 25 people. If social distancing is possible the maximum capacity is 50% up to 250 people.

## Wyoming

*November 24, 2020 – Washakie County*

Effective November 22, 2020, County Health Officer Dr. Ed Zimmerman mask mandate takes effect. Face masks are required to be worn into all retail and commercial businesses.

## Wyoming

*November 24, 2020 – Sweetwater County*

On November 18, 2020, County Public Health Officer Dr. Jean Stachon requires individuals to wear a face mask in public thorough December 3, 2020. Business must post notices stating that face coverings are required.

## Wyoming

*November 10, 2020 – Albany County*

Effective November 6, 2020, per County Health order, individuals are required to wear a face covering when in public until November 30, 2020.

## Wyoming

*November 3, 2020 – Laramie County*

Effective November 2, 2020, a facial mask requirement will be in effect until November 30, 2020.

## Wyoming

*October 6, 2020 – Teton County*

On September 29, 2020, the County Public Health Department extended its facial mask ordinance until October 31, 2020.

## Wyoming

*August 18, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective August 16, 2020, outdoor gatherings may host a maximum of 1000 people with a venue capacity of 50 percent. Indoor gatherings remain at 50 people without restrictions and 250 if social distancing and sanitization measures are diligently incorporated.

*August 4, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

On July 29, 2020, Gov. Mark Gordon announced that indoor gatherings will continue to be limited to 50 people and outdoor gatherings, 250.

## Wyoming

*August 4, 2020 – Teton County*

The County's face-covering requirement has been extended to August 14, 2020.

## Wyoming

*June 23, 2020 – Business Operations*

Effective immediately, long-term care facilities may allow visitors if they are limited to two guests and visits are held outside.

## Wyoming

*June 23, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, 50 individuals can gather in a confined space with no restrictions, and 250 individuals are permitted to attend indoor events with social distancing in place.

## Wyoming

*June 16, 2020 – Safety Precautions*

Effective immediately, indoor gatherings in a confined space may have up to 50 individuals in attendance. Indoor gatherings with social distancing may have 350 individuals.
